TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H. in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Odd Fellows' Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for Memorial Day.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the use of the Smyth Public Library Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred sixteen dollars and fifteen cents (\$616.15) for Town Road Aid, to which the state will contribute two thousand four hundred and sixty-four dollars and sixty-one cents (\$2,464.61).
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for summer maintenance of roads and bridges and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expense of the highway department.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
8. To see what additional charges the town will instruct the Tax Collector to make on poll taxes after October first.

9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.

10. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received the past year.

11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be added to the World War II Memorial Town Hall Building Fund agreeable to the Laws of 1943, chapter 160 and the Session Laws of 1947, chapter 8.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary funds to improve the Chester Turnpike Road and the Tower Hill Road. On petition of Joseph F. McIntire and fifteen (15) others.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to the New Hampshire Veterans' Association for a page of history of the town to be printed in a book and to be promoted by the Association.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for maintenance and improvements to cemeteries, the money to be expended under the direction of the selectmen and superintendent of cemeteries.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for improvements to Moore's Park.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for white pine blister rust control, the money to be spent in co-operation with and under the direction of the State Forestry Department.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$65.00 (1/100th of one per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1949 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and re-

sources of the town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in this Region, or act in relation thereto.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) for painting and repairs to the Fitts Museum.

20. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate money for the same.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls to close at 6 P. M. unless otherwise voted at the meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest Fires — Our Most Shameful Waste

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public — YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION — fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground *is not covered with snow*.
3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT
OF SCHOOLS
Candia, N. H.**

To the School Board of Candia:

It is with a hope for the future and considerable pride in the past to submit to you my third annual report of the schools of Candia. May I express my appreciation for your indulgence and help in the tasks which have been and will continue to be important factors in the educational development of the youth of the town.

In compiling the data for this annual report, it seems to me that the most important problem which has faced the School Board during the past year and will continue to be the immediate problem for the next five to eight years is increased enrollments.

To meet the increase in the number of children for this year, we made two changes in the teaching staff, added a new teacher, and divided grades one and two. The staff for 1949-1950 is:

Lois B. Hazelton, Principal, Grades 5 and 6.

Burt G. Broadhead, Grades 7 and 8.

Ethel M. VonHagen, Grades 3 and 4.

Patricia S. Levandowski, Grade 2

Gladys M. Machacek, Grade 1.

Mabel E. Reed, Music.

Margaret E. Cronin, School Nurse.

William Ford, Janitor.

Dorothy Ford, Lunch Director.

Ellett Seavey, Transporter.

Probably one of the most important forces in America today is the education of the youth of the country. This force will be the deciding factor in the life-blood of the United States and the future of Democracy. It is, therefore, vitally important that in every town and hamlet at this time of the year all citizens receive and digest reports concerning the welfare of its people. It is the purpose of this report to present to you in concrete form the important school costs for 1949-1950 and a few of the probable trends and costs for 1950-1951.

Following the census last year it was discovered that the Moore School in Candia needed more room space to accommodate the number of children who were to enter in September, 1949, for the 1949-1950 school year. Considerable time was spent in working out the needs and the details as to the best procedure for the best interests of the children in as much as there were to be two new teachers to replace Miss Mack and Miss Harding who had resigned.

It was finally decided that we must have another room. With this decision many problems had to be overcome, the most potent of which was the amount of money available in the budget for the necessary building changes including additions, replacements, repairs, and new equipment. In consulting the budget it was found that because the meeting came in March with its adoption, the amounts available in the month of July following were very inadequate to meet the increased enrollment which would be upon us in September.

This presented a very complicated situation. Nevertheless, the children must be housed and the Board began building the room and making all the necessary alterations including a partition, heat, lighting, furnishing, painting, and the hiring of another teacher. The room was completed for the opening of school last September.

But this increased enrollment did not stop at the Moore School. According to law any child who has graduated from the eighth grade in the schools of Candia or any town is entitled to a high school education in a school of his own choosing if there is no such school within his own town. It was found that instead of eleven or twelve attending high school out of the fifteen graduates in June, the entire number was planning and did attend plus seven or eight others who had moved into town during the summer and had never attended our own eighth grade. Since the estimated number had been 35 pupils the count had now reached 46 pupils. If we add to this the fact that the tuition rate, which was estimated at \$170.00 per pupil as based on previous increases, has been increased to \$190.00 at Manchester, \$190.00 at Concord, and \$180.00 at Raymond, it can be readily understood what has happened to the budget set up in March.

During the past two or three years it had become evident that some change was necessary in the transportation problem, but nothing definite was forthcoming until along in the

summer when bids were received and the Board found itself in the position where it was necessary to pay more for the transportation of its children than had been estimated in March. This was due to both the increased cost in transportation itself and the number of children to be transported including the length of the routes.

Any of the above items alone would have made considerable difference in the matter of educational costs in the town due almost entirely to the increased population of the schools, but taken as a total you have already begun to understand the problems the School Board has faced during the past year especially when it knew that there would be a large deficit incurred for the education of the children of the town. The taxpayers of the town should know also that because the School Board was able to anticipate the reduction in State Aid to education made by the 1950 Legislature, the schools of Candia were able to obtain in great degree many of their estimated needs as listed in the budget including books and supplies. Without this foresight, the deficit would have been increased about \$3,500.00.

Let us look at next year's estimated costs especially in the matter of supplies and tuition. Here again we shall have to place the cause on the doorstep of increased enrollments. If, however, the fates are kind to the taxpayer, we may be able to get through the year without too great a change in the physical condition of the schools. This means, nevertheless, that in one or two rooms we shall have a few more pupils which will in turn require more equipment, books, and supplies.

In the matter of tuition, you will find that there will be six graduates from Manchester High School in June. To offset this number we shall have 17 graduates from the eighth grade at the Moore School of which sixteen will probably attend high school. This brings the total number of children who will attend high school in 1950-51 to about 56. We have been notified that the tuition rate at Concord will

be \$250.00 per pupil. Manchester will maintain her present rate of tuition at \$190.00 only through the 1950-51 year. Raymond usually charges the state average which, if past amounts are any indication, will be close to \$200.00 per pupil. Estimating on the basis of \$190.00 per pupil for 54 pupils; one at \$250.00; and one at \$200.00, the least we can hope to spend for tuition is about \$10,700.00. If, however, we figure on the basis of the number of pupils moving into the town during the summer, we may have to add a few more pupils to this total.

In view of the above data, it is not difficult to visualize every item in the budget where increased enrollment has a direct bearing and understand why the schools of the State are increasing their budgets.

In making this brief report, it has been my purpose to point out the school situation that the Board has had to face during the past year and must continue to face for the next few years. It all points to the fact that there are more children who are entering our schools while at the same time the costs remain at a very high level.

Again, may I thank all organizations and individuals who have in any way contributed to the improvement and development of the schools of the town. May this aid continue in order that the youth of the country may be served.
