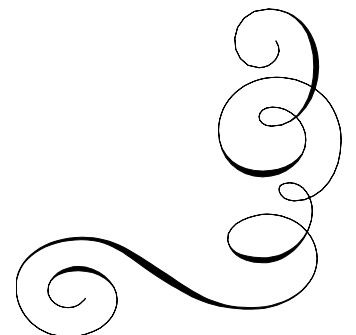
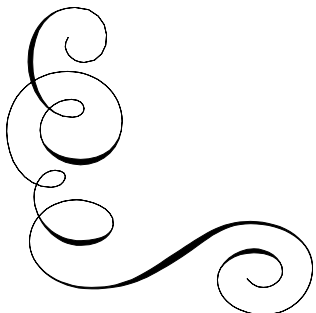

2013 TOWN OF CANDIA WARRANT
State of New Hampshire

(As presented to the Deliberative Session February 2, 2013)

First Session:

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia, on Saturday, 2nd of February, 2013 at 9 a.m. This session shall consist of explanation, discussion and deliberation of the Warrant Articles numbered 1 through 34. The Warrant Articles may be amended subject to the following limitations: (a) Warrant Articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended, and (b) Warrant Articles that are amended shall be placed on the official ballot for a final vote on the main motion as amended.

Second Session:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia on Tuesday, the 12th of March, 2013. This session shall be the Voting Session to act on all Warrant Articles, as amended, including the proposed budget, as a result of the action of the ~~First~~ First Session+. The Polls will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE 1.

To choose the following Town Officers for the year ensuing:

Selectman	3 year term	Vote for Two
Budget Committee	3 year term	Vote for Two
Planning Board	3 year term	Vote for Two

Superintendent of Cemeteries	1 year term	Vote for One

ARTICLE 2.

Are you in favor of the following amendment:

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by petition to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To rezone Map 407, Lots 66 & 71 from residential zoning district to commercial zoning district. Section 4.03 Zoning District. These adjacent lots have existing access from Route 27 in Raymond. Rezoning will allow for rock quarrying, excavation and other commercial uses permitted in the commercial district, which may provide the Town with more tax revenue. (Submitted by petition).

ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (**\$163,500**) for the renovation, septic, and well of the **Smyth Memorial Building (the old library)**, to be used as a community center, and to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$163,500) of bonds and/or notes in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and/or notes and determine the rate of interest. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (3/5 ballot vote required). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an **operating budget**, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Two Million, Three Hundred Thirty Nine Thousand, Five Hundred Sixty Four Dollars (**\$2,339,564**). Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be Two Million, Three Hundred Thirty Six Thousand, Two Hundred Sixty Three Dollars (\$2,336,263) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Candia or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 2) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0)

ARTICLE 5.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred and Seven Dollars (**\$6,807**) in continuation of its support of the **Rockingham County Community Action**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 6.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (**\$4,000**) in continuation of its support of the **Visiting Nurse Association**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (**\$2,500**) in support of **Home, Health, & Hospice**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 8.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-Four Dollars (**\$1,854**) in continuation of its support of the **Lamprey Health Care**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (**\$1,400**) in continuation of its support of the **American Red Cross**. (Recommended

by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (**\$1,400**) in continuation of its support of the **Area HomeCare and Family Services**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (**\$1,250**) in support of the **Child Advocacy Center**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0).

ARTICLE 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (**\$1,000**) in continuation of its support of the **Child and Family Services**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 13.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (**\$1,000**) in support of **Big Brother/Big Sister**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 14.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (**\$700**) in continuation of its support of the **Aids Response Seacoast**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Sixty-Nine Dollars (**\$669**) in continuation of its support of the **Rockingham County Nutrition and Meals on Wheels Program**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (**\$500**) in continuation of its support of the **CASA** (Court Appointed Special Advocates for Children). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (**\$225**) in continuation of its support of the **Retired and Senior Volunteer Program**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 18.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (**\$150,000**) for the sixth and final phase of **Patten Hill Road**. This phase will include the final one inch wearing course of asphalt from Main Street to the intersection of Lane, Depot, and Green Roads, and guard rail replacement at the Abe Emerson Marsh. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. Submitted by the Road Agent. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0).

ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (**\$75,000**) for excess **winter road maintenance**, these funds will not be used unless the operating winter maintenance funds are exhausted. This will be a non-transferable appropriation. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. Submitted by the Road Agent. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0)

ARTICLE 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (**\$20,000**) to be placed in the existing **Revaluation Capital Reserve** fund for the Future Revaluation of the municipality. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0)

ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (**\$55,000**) to cover the reimbursable costs associated with Police activities, including but not limited to **Police Special Details** and grant programs. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0)

ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a **revolving fund** pursuant to RSA 31:95-h for the purpose of **Police Special Details**. All of the revenue received from fees, charges, or other income derived from the Police Department providing public safety services outside of the ordinary detail of police officers including but not limited to public safety concerns in connection with special events, highway construction and other construction projects shall be placed in the fund and the money in the fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year-to-year, and shall not be considered part of the Town's general surplus. The town treasurer shall have custody of all moneys in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon order of the governing body and Police Chief and no further approval is required by the legislative body to expend. Any surplus remaining in the fund, after the payment of the expenses associated with special details shall be used for the purchase of police vehicles and equipment. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1).

ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (**\$50,000**) to be deposited in the **Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund**, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1991 Town Meeting, for the future purchase of fire apparatus and equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6 to 3)

ARTICLE 24.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars **(\$15,000)** to allow the Town to sponsor a **Household Hazardous Waste Day** for Candia residents. The event is to be scheduled for the fall, and is to allow residents the opportunity to properly and safely dispose of household hazardous waste materials that the Recycling Center does not normally accept. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7 to 2).

ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars **(\$100,000)** for the completion of the **closure plan for the New Boston Road Incinerator Site**, with the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 26.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars **(\$6,650)** for the **first phase of updating the Candia Master Plan** per RSA 674:3. (Submitted by the Planning Board) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 27.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars **(\$10,500)** for the purchase of a new **copier/scanner/fax/printer** for the Selectmen's Office. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 28.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety Dollars **(\$127,990)** for the operating expenses of the **Smyth Public Library**. Funds are to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association. The library has no default budget; a no vote means you favor closing the library. (Submitted by the Smyth Public Library Trustees) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 2). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1 with 1 abstaining).

ARTICLE 29.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars **(\$4,000)** for the operation and maintenance of the **Fitts Museum**. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. (Submitted by the Trustees of the Fitts Museum) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0).

ARTICLE 30.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety Thousand Dollars **(\$190,000)** to replace culverts, add under drains, and pave the southeast portion of **Currier Road** from the intersection of New Boston and North Roads to the Deerfield town line. Submitted by the Road Agent. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 5 to 3 with 1 abstaining).

ARTICLE 31.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (**\$17,500**) to the **Candia Youth Athletic Association** for the specific expenses of providing youth recreation programs to the children of Candia. Said expenses to be expended under the direction of the Candia Youth Athletic Association Board of Directors in accordance with the approved budgets. (Submitted by petition). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6 to 1 with 1 abstaining).

ARTICLE 32.

To see if the Town will vote to establish, in accordance with RSA§ 72:27-a and 72:62, an **exemption** from a property§ assessed value, for property tax purposes, when the property is equipped with one or more **solar energy** systems as defined by NH RSA 72:61. Such exemption shall be for 100% of the amount, if any, by which installation of solar energy systems on the property increases the total assessed value of the property. (Submitted by petition).

ARTICLE 33.

Are you in favor of setting the office **hours** the **town clerk** is open to the public as follows:
Monday 8AM-12PM, Tuesday 4PM-8PM, Wednesday 8AM-12PM, Thursday 4PM-8PM, Friday 8AM-12PM, Saturday 8AM-1PM. (Submitted by petition).

ARTICLE 34.

Pursuant to RSA 36-A:1, to see if the Town shall vote to **rescind the adoption of the Conservation Commission**. All funds held by such said commission shall be returned to the general fund of the Town. All future funds from the Land Use Change Tax and any other funds that would be automatically placed in this fund shall instead be placed in the general fund of the Town. All property managed by the Commission will hereafter be managed by the Town. (Submitted by petition).

MINUTES OF THE 2013 DELIBERATIVE SESSION
FEBRUARY 2, 2013

Moderator H. Clark Thyng called the annual meeting to order at 9:01 AM. Invocation was made by Reverend Barbara Sanders. Presentation of the colors was made by the Candia Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Cub Scouts. The pledge of allegiance was led by Selectman Joe Duarte. The Moderator then introduced the Town Officers seated on the stage: Town Clerk Christine Dupere, Deputy Town Clerk Cheryl Bond, Chairman of the Selectmen Joe Duarte, Selectman Dick Snow, Selectman Dave DePuy, Selectman Amanda Soares, Selectman Fred Kelley, SelectmensqAssistant Cheryl Eastman, and Accounting and Payroll Clerk Donna Becker. Moderator Thyng also introduced the remaining Town officers and department heads. Ballot clerks were Robin Gray, Bob Panit, and Joanne Beckwith. Tom Giffen was Assistant Moderator. Non registered persons Police Chief Mike McGillen, Legal Counsel Matt Serge, and Senator David Boutin were allowed to speak since there was no objection from the floor. Rules of conduct were briefly reviewed by Moderator Thyng. Matt Serge, Town Counsel was recognized to explain the 10 percent rule to those assembled.

Moderator Clark Thyng then read the following:

FIRST SESSION:

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia, on Saturday, 2nd of February, 2013 at 9 a.m. This session shall consist of explanation, discussion and deliberation of the Warrant Articles numbered 1 through 34. The Warrant Articles may be amended subject to the following limitations: (a) Warrant Articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended, and (b) Warrant Articles that are amended shall be placed on the official ballot for a final vote on the main motion as amended.

SECOND SESSION:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia on Tuesday, the 12th of March, 2013. This session shall be the Voting Session to act on all Warrant Articles, as amended, including the proposed budget, as a result of the action of the %irst Session+. The Polls will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

To choose the following Town Officers for the year ensuing:

ARTICLE 2.

Are you in favor of the following amendment:

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by petition to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To rezone Map 407, Lots 66 & 71 from residential zoning district to commercial zoning district. Section 4.03 Zoning District. These adjacent lots have existing access from Route 27 in Raymond. Rezoning will allow for rock quarrying, excavation and other commercial uses permitted in the commercial district, which may provide the Town with more tax revenue. (Submitted by petition).

Moderator Thyng explained that a Protest Petition had been received for Article 2 with the required number of registered voters signatures. The petition read as follows: We, the undersigned, are submitting this petition in protest of the proposed amendment to the Candia Zoning Ordinance which will place lots 66 and 71 from residential zoning to commercial zoning. Rezoning will allow for rock quarrying, excavation and other commercial uses.

The area in question is next to a fairly dense residential neighborhood, is in very close proximity to the North Branch of the Lamprey River, abuts the historic Bean Island Cemetery, as well as wetlands. We wish to have the area in Candia remain a residential zone.

ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (**\$163,500**) for the renovation, septic, and well of the **Smyth Memorial Building (the old library)**, to be used as a community center, and to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$163,500) of bonds and/or notes in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and/or notes and determine the rate of interest. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (3/5 ballot vote required). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1). Motion to accept the article as read was made by Amanda Soares, seconded Dick Snow. Diane Philbrick of the Heritage Commission spoke to the article. The building was constructed in 1932 and dedicated as a memorial to Gov. Smyth a resident of Candia. It was erected to be a building of distinction for the community. The library was a very important part of the Town. It was built to be as fireproof as possible. It was placed almost in the geographical center of the community amid many historic buildings. The Smyth memorial Building was recently placed on both the State and National Registers of Historic places. The building should be made available for multiple uses for the community, such as meetings, concerts, museum storage, etc. The Heritage Commission has worked with the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance to come up with a code compliant building. An architect was involved in the design plans. The Heritage Commission was able to get the bids for the work at lower cost. The final figure will be dependent on how

many donations can be received and how many community members can help. There is no water on the site, so the money also includes a well.

Amanda clarified that the Selectmen researched looking at a five year bond and would negotiate a loan with the bank, seeking the best rate and having the least impact on the taxpayers. An estimate of 40 cents per thousand had been made. The Commission felt the building is important and should not be torn down. Mr. Goekjian asked if there was any thought to costs of repairs of the building and was told not at this time. There was further discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **Article 3 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an **operating budget**, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Two Million, Three Hundred Thirty Nine Thousand, Five Hundred Sixty Four Dollars (**\$2,339,564**). Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be Two Million, Three Hundred Thirty Six Thousand, Two Hundred Sixty Three Dollars (\$2,336,263) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Candia or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 2) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Dick Snow, seconded by Fred Kelley. Mr. Snow explained that the departments did a marvelous job keeping expenses down and there will be money coming back to the Town to lower the tax rate this year. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 4 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

Mr. Snow requested that articles 5 through 17 be voted on as a block, seconded by Bob Bruce. There was no objection by the assembly. It was voted by a show of ballots to move the articles as a block..

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred and Seven Dollars (**\$6,807**) in continuation of its support of the **Rockingham County Community Action**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars **(\$1,400)** in continuation of its support of the **Area HomeCare and Family Services**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars **(\$700)** in continuation of its support of the **Aids Response Seacoast**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Sixty-Nine Dollars (**\$669**) in continuation of its support of the **Rockingham County Nutrition and Meals on Wheels Program**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (**\$500**) in continuation of its support of the **CASA** (Court Appointed Special Advocates for Children). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (**\$225**) in continuation of its support of the **Retired and Senior Volunteer Program**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

Ken Goekjian asked why some members of the Budget Committee did not recommend these articles. Matt Broadhead, Budget Committee Chair, explained that they had not received information on any of the agencies except for Article 11, dealing with the Child Advocacy Center. Wendy Ducharme spoke for Child and Family Services. Donna DelRosso explained, as Welfare Director, how much these agencies assist the Town. Fred Colbrath Jr. representing the American Red Cross, asked for our continued support. explaining it is a vital mission to the State. Mark Hardy spoke in support of this block of articles. He stated these agencies have impacted his life as well, such as Visiting Nurses. They provide a lot of good for a small amount of money. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Articles 5 through 17 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

Paul LeBlond made a motion to consider article 31 before we consider Article 30 and to place Article 31 on the ballot immediately after Article 29 and before Article 30, renumbering the Articles as necessary. Seconded by Mr. Royer. Mr. Lewis stated he had no problem moving this article before the Currier Road article. Mrs. Soares stated there are many other private agencies that do not ask the Town for money. Mrs. Eastman explained the order of Articles on the ballot is determined by order received. Mr. St. Martin urged the assembly to consider placing this article as requested. Tom Dimaggio stated this is a private organization and moving it up is not fair. Mr. Lewis explained if the Currier Road amount is reduced, the only thing would be the lack of a top coat. A call to question was received. A hand count was requested. Yes:46 No:44: Article 31 will be placed in the order requested.

ARTICLE 18.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (**\$150,000**) for the sixth and final phase of **Patten Hill Road**. This phase will include the final one inch wearing course of asphalt from Main Street to the intersection of Lane, Depot, and Green Roads, and guard rail replacement at the Abe Emerson Marsh. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. Submitted by the Road Agent. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget

Committee by a vote of 9 to 0). Motion was made by Selectman Snow, seconded by Selectman Kelley. Dennis Lewis explained that this needs to be done to finish the project. There were no questions. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 18 will be moved to the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars **(\$75,000)** for excess **winter road maintenance**, these funds will not be used unless the operating winter maintenance funds are exhausted. This will be a non-transferable appropriation. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. Submitted by the Road Agent. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Mr. Snow, seconded by Mr. Kelley. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **Article 19 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars **(\$20,000)** to be placed in the existing **Revaluation Capital Reserve** fund for the Future Revaluation of the municipality. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Fred Kelley, seconded by Dave DePuy. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **Article 20 will be moved to the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars **(\$55,000)** to cover the reimbursable costs associated with Police activities, including but not limited to **Police Special Details** and grant programs. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Selectman Joe Duarte, seconded by Fred Kelley. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 21 will be moved to the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a **revolving fund** pursuant to RSA 31:95-h for the purpose of **Police Special Details**. All of the revenue received from fees, charges, or other income derived from the Police Department providing public safety services outside of the ordinary detail of police officers including but not limited to public safety concerns in connection with special events, highway construction and other construction projects shall be placed in the fund and the money in the fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year-to-year, and shall not be considered part of the Town's general surplus. The town treasurer shall have custody of all moneys in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon order of the governing body and Police Chief and no further approval is required by the legislative body to expend. Any surplus remaining in the fund, after the payment of the expenses associated with special details shall be used for the purchase of police vehicles and equipment. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Selectman Snow, seconded by Selectman Kelley. Chief McGillen spoke, stating he has been trying to establish this for the past two years. It will help with the future purchase of cruisers as well as

other police equipment. Mr. Lazott feels the fund should have a cap on it so it would not be used on things that it should not be. Mr. Goekjian asked that if we passed the preceding article, would this be double dipping? Mrs. Eastman explained both needed to pass for this year only. Mrs. Penfield explained if we establish this fund, we would no longer know what the money will be used for and the Budget Committee would no longer have oversight over this account. **Mr. Goekjian then proposed the following amendment: If this article is adopted, Article 21 would be reduced to \$5,000.00**, seconded by Amanda Soares. Mr. Goekjian explained there should be a little money to start the fund. Todd Allen asked if this amount of \$5,000.00 would be adequate? Mrs. Eastman stated the \$5,000.00 should be enough to start the fund. Deb LeBlond asked would this be enough? Mrs. Eastman explained the revenue would be coming into the fund from special details. The fund would be self funding. Sharon Despathy asked how this would be affecting the 10% rule? Mr. Snow explained it would reduce the amount next year to be raised by taxes. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment by a show of ballots. **Article 22 was amended.**

Discussion then resumed on the amended article. Mrs. Penfield felt this would be a roundabout way to purchase a new cruiser without the Budget Committee's input. Mr. Lazott explained this would not accumulate a huge amount and it is necessary to replace cruisers. Mrs. Penfield pointed out other funds that have been established over which there would be no say. Mr. Goekjian explained the savings accounts are to keep the tax rate stabilized. There was no further discussion, therefore the amended article was moved to a vote by a show of ballots. **Article 22 will be placed on the ballot as amended.**

Moderator Thyng called for a brief recess until 11:00 AM

ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (**\$50,000**) to be deposited in the **Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund**, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1991 Town Meeting, for the future purchase of fire apparatus and equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6 to 3) Motion was made by Selectman Kelley, seconded by Selectman Soares. Janet Wilderman asked why is this listed apart from the Municipal Budget if the Department is part of the Town. Mrs. Eastman stated this is for apparatus only and must be kept separate. It depends on the money being appropriated by the town. It is to save money for a future purchase. Selectman Duarte explained the benefits of putting money aside every year to purchase a very expensive piece of equipment. Chief Dean Young explained it would not create a huge spike in the tax rate. It is a way of saving money ahead of time. Mr. Goekjian explained this is like putting it on lay-away. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 23 will go to the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 24.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (**\$15,000**) to allow the Town to sponsor a **Household Hazardous Waste Day** for Candia residents. The event is to be scheduled for the fall, and is to allow residents the opportunity to properly and safely dispose of household hazardous waste materials that the Recycling Center does not normally accept. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7 to 2). Motion to adopt the article as

read was made by Selectman DePuy, seconded by Selectman Snow. There was no additional discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **Article 24 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars **(\$100,000)** for the completion of the **closure plan for the New Boston Road Incinerator Site**, with the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1) Motion was made by Selectman Snow, seconded by Selectman Duarte. Selectman Snow explained he had a handout available, which featured photos as well as the extent of the cap. He explained the Department of Environmental Services (DES) has mandated that we close the old incinerator site. There are costs associated with every dumpster that leaves the site. The material that in in the ash piles must be disposed of in the most cost effective manner. The buildings will be gone and the materials will be taken away. The Town will need to make a decision. Rick Lazott asked if the DES has given a completion date? Mr. Lazott stated that we have many local contractors that can remove the old buildings and the fencing. Selectman Soares explained we are not following procedures. We need a qualified engineering firm that does random testing to determine what is in those piles. Judy Szot explained she had attended the walk through. The ash pile must be removed, so it has to be tested. The tests are for metal and solubility of the material. If it does not pass the test, it is considered hazardous waste. Don't dig up the land fill. The issue is to determine what the extent of the ash pile and the content of the pile, it will then determine the final cost of the removal. We should do the testing this year. **Mrs. Szot proposed the following amendment: to reduce the amount to \$1.00. The amendment was seconded by Mr. Bowman.** Selectman Dave DePuy spoke in opposition of the amendment. Mr. Snow explained he had done a lot of work. Mr. Goekjian stated you cannot ask someone for a quote for something that is still unknown. We need a professional evaluation of what is contained at the site. Mrs. Penfield explained there are more choices. We need to know what we are dealing with and we do not have the information at the present time. The Towns always have responsibility for hazardous waste. Mr. Lazott feels the amendment is a good thing. Selectman Duarte explained there is a very reputable firm located in Epping. If we take this on ourselves, we have no idea how much this will cost us. There was no further discussion, so a vote was taken on the amendment to reduce the amount to \$1.00. Vote was taken by a count of hands. Yes: 46 No: 25 **Article 25 is amended to \$1.00.** Vote was then taken on the amended article by a count of ballots. Yes: 50 No: 37 **The amended Article 25 will be placed on the ballot.**

A request to restrict reconsideration on article 25 was made by Rick Lazott, seconded by Amanda Soares. Reconsideration is restricted by vote of the assembly.

Dick Snow moved to restrict reconsideration of all the other articles we have voted on so far, seconded by Fred. Kelley. Vote was in the affirmative to restrict reconsideration.

ARTICLE 26.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars **(\$6,650)** for the **first phase of updating the Candia Master Plan** per RSA 674:3. (Submitted by the Planning Board) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1). Motion was made by Fred Kelley, seconded by Amanda Soares. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots in the affirmative. **Article 26 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 27.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars **(\$10,500)** for the purchase of a new **copier/scanner/fax/printer** for the Selectmen's Office. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1). Motion was made by Mr. Snow, seconded by Mr. Kelley. The vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 27 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 28.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety Dollars **(\$127,990)** for the operating expenses of the **Smyth Public Library**. Funds are to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association. The library has no default budget; a no vote means you favor closing the library. (Submitted by the Smyth Public Library Trustees) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 2). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 0 with 1 abstaining). Motion was made by Selectman DePuy, seconded by Selectman Snow. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 28 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 29.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars **(\$4,000)** for the operation and maintenance of the **Fitts Museum**. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. (Submitted by the Trustees of the Fitts Museum) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0). Motion was made by Amanda Soares, seconded Dick Snow. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 29 will be placed on the ballot as read..**

ARTICLE 30.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars **(\$17,500)** to the **Candia Youth Athletic Association** for the specific expenses of providing youth recreation programs to the children of Candia. Said expenses to be expended under the direction of the Candia Youth Athletic Association Board of Directors in accordance with the approved budgets. (Submitted by petition). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6 to 2 with 1 abstaining). Motion to adopt the article as read was made by Mr. Snow, seconded Mr. DePuy. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 30 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 31.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety Thousand Dollars **(\$190,000)** to replace culverts, add under drains, and pave the southeast portion of **Currier Road** from the intersection of New Boston and North Roads to the Deerfield town line. Submitted by the Road Agent. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 5 to 3 with 1 abstaining). Motion was made by Selectman Snow, seconded by Selectman Duarte. Road Agent Dennis Lewis

explained that the gravel road is extremely difficult to maintain. Last year, it was impossible to maintain. \$30,000.00 was spent trying to maintain it last year. Paul Frazier asked if there was any way to ditch the road. Mr. Lewis explained that the more cars that go over the road, the more the mud pumps up through the dirt. Mr. Frazier likes living on a dirt road. Agent Lewis explained that the volume of traffic makes it difficult to maintain a dirt road. Kyle Frazier asked what sections would be paved? Mr. Lewis explained if he thought he could maintain this road in the future as a dirt road, he would, but it is becoming a safety hazard both for fire apparatus as well as school busses. Mr. Lazott spoke in opposition of paving the road. Mrs. Soares asked where Currier Road was in his fifteen year plan. Mr. Lewis explained that paving Currier Road was first on his plan. Sean James explained that as a resident of Currier Road, it is becoming unsafe and he agrees with Dennis. Mr. Snow requested we move the question. Seconded by Mr. Kelley. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 31 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

Deb LeBlond moved to restrict reconsideration of prior votes, seconded by Sean James. It was voted to restrict reconsideration.

ARTICLE 32.

To see if the Town will vote to establish, in accordance with RSA 72:27-a and 72:62, an **exemption** from a property assessed value, for property tax purposes, when the property is equipped with one or more **solar energy** systems as defined by NH RSA 72:61. Such exemption shall be for 100% of the amount, if any, by which installation of solar energy systems on the property increases the total assessed value of the property. (Submitted by petition). The article was moved by Dick Snow, seconded by Fred Kelley. Selectman DePuy explained there were already 82 towns in NH which had voted this in. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 32 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 33.

Are you in favor of setting the office **hours** the **town clerk** is open to the public as follows: Monday 8AM-12PM, Tuesday 4PM-8PM, Wednesday 8AM-12PM, Thursday 4PM-8PM, Friday 8AM-12PM, Saturday 8AM-1PM. (Submitted by petition). Motion was made by Amanda Soares, seconded by Fred Kelley. Motion to Amend article 33 was made by Chris Dupere as follows:, are you in favor of The Town Clerk setting her hours as needed, Seconded by Tom St. Martin. Ken Goekjian stated that something must go on the ballot. Tom Dimaggio questioned if the hours could be changed at a whim. Mrs. Byrd asked to leave the article as it was. Sharon DeWitt asked to let the people here decide. Mr. Snow is not in favor of micromanaging. Mrs. Szot feels we should have something to say about the Clerk's hours. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment by a show of ballots. The article was amended. There was no further discussion. Vote on the amended article was by a show of ballots. **The amended Article 33 will be placed on the ballot.**

Chris Dupere requested that reconsideration of Article 33 be restricted, seconded by Todd Allen. It was voted to restrict reconsideration.

ARTICLE 34.

Pursuant to RSA 36-A:1, to see if the Town shall vote to **rescind the adoption of the Conservation Commission**. All funds held by such said commission shall be returned to the general fund of the Town. All future funds from the Land Use Change Tax and any other funds

that would be automatically placed in this fund shall instead be placed in the general fund of the Town. All property managed by the Commission will hereafter be managed by the Town. (Submitted by petition). Motion was made by Amanda Soares, seconded by Fred Kelley. The following amendment was moved by Boyd Chivers: To see if the Town shall vote to confirm its continued support of the Candia Conservation Commission. All funds held by such commission as presently authorized by previous legislated bodies shall continue in effect. The amendment was seconded by Tom St. Martin. Betsy Kruse urged supporting the commission because of its many benefits. Judy Lindsey also spoke in favor of retaining the Conservation Commission. Mr. Lazott stated he had signed the petition because he has a problem with how the money is spent. Mrs. Soares stated that she felt that all they seem to want to do is buy pieces of land, with no plan in place. People are getting easements to avoid paying so much in taxes. Betsy Kruse stated the Commission does not make decisions lightly. All their meetings are public and people need to understand how these decisions are achieved by attending the meeting. Mr. Snow stated he would strongly support the defeat of the original warrant article. Mr. Snow suggested we should not accept the amendment, then he will tell everyone to vote no on the original article. There was no further discussion on the amendment. Vote on the amendment was taken by a show of ballots, which were counted. Yes: 44 No: 32 The amendment was adopted. There was no discussion on the amended article. Vote was then taken on moving the amended article to the ballot by a show of hands. **Article 34 will be placed on the ballot amended.**

Moderator Clark Thyng declared the meeting dissolved at 12:52 PM

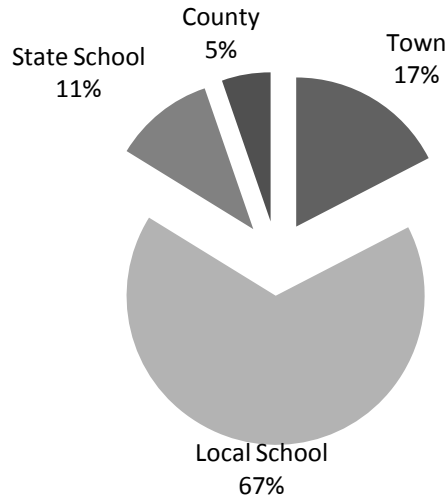

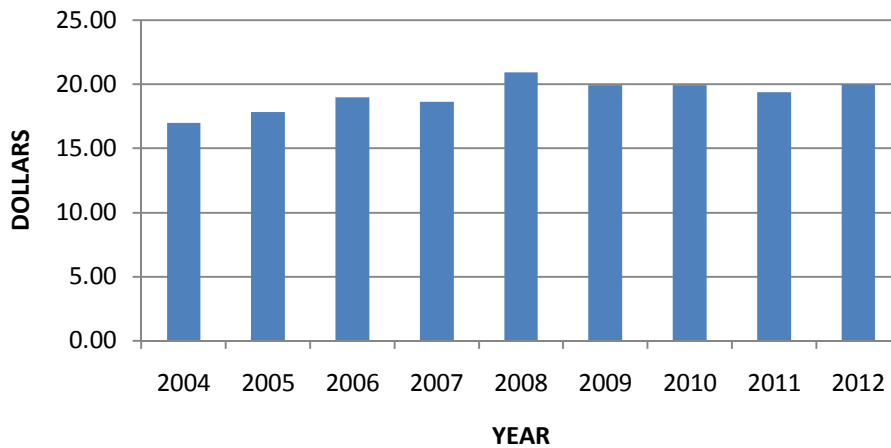

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Selectman David DePuy joined the Board in March. His calm demeanor and ability to reason through the complex issues that come before the Board serve the town well.

The Boston Post Cane was awarded to Edna Brown.

The interior of the town office building was painted and interior lights were converted to more energy efficient models. The resulting savings from this change will be seen for many years to come in the operating budgets.

In these trying economic times, the Board of Selectmen is pleased with the efforts of the Department Heads and the employees to continue to cost-effectively manage their departments. This has ensured delivery of the needed and requested services while keeping in mind the responsibility to keep the tax rate as low as possible. A 3% cost of living adjustment was granted to the employees as of July 1, 2012 to attempt to bring the pay rates more in line with current standards. The employees are vital to the operation of the town and the Board wished to show their appreciation for their efforts and dedication. When it came time to draft the proposed budget for 2013, the Board asked the Department Heads to find the funds for an additional 1.7% cost of living increase effective January 1, 2013 within the proposed budget. This resulted in no additional increase to the proposed budget. This was only possible due to continued fiscally responsible spending by the Departments. The Board voted to use some of the unreserved fund balance to offset the tax rate. This kept the tax rate under \$20.00 per thousand for the fourth year in a row.

The Swap Shop operations have been included under the direction of Chuck Witcher at the Recycling Center. The volunteers that staff the swap shop continue to put in the time to make sure it is available for anyone that wishes to use it.

During 2012, the Food Pantry organizational duties were returned to the Candia Community Woman's Club. This has worked out extremely well. They have been staffing the pantry and ensuring the efficient restocking of supplies. Many thanks to Linda McHugh for spearheading that enormous task.

And finally, thanks to the many people who work to make the town operate smoothly. Candia would not be the wonderful place it is today without the efforts of its elected officials, hired employees, volunteers and generous citizens!

LETTER FROM THE TOWN CLERK

Dear Candia Citizens,

In this, my annual letter to you, I am including items that may help you when you come to the Town Clerk's office to take care of your transactions. Please do not hesitate to call if you have questions or concerns, Cheryl and I will be happy to help you. In case of severe weather, if we have to close our office, it will always be posted on WZID, 95.7 FM and 96.5 FM The Mill.

When doing any transaction at our office, the State now is asking us to put your driver's license number on their copy of your registration as well as on the Title Application if we do one. **Please have your license ready. When renewing your vehicle, or transferring your plates to a new vehicle, you must bring your most current registration.** If you have lost the old registration, you will need to pay \$18.00 for a certified copy. When purchasing a new vehicle, please read over the dealer prepared title application very carefully. There have been many times when two names were supposed to be on the paperwork, but it was completed with only

one. We cannot add any additional names to dealer prepared applications or make other corrections.

Our E-Reg program is becoming more popular every year. With this program, you can register your car on line as long as it is a renewal with no changes from the previous year's registration, and you lived in Candia. Remember to have your old registration next to you as you do your renewal on your computer, as you will have to insert information on the screen. The payment is by E-Check. Cheryl and I try to have a one or two day turnaround, so we can get your registration back to you promptly.

We also offer the E-Dog program, which allows you to license your dog on line as long as the rabies certificate has not expired. To use this feature you will put in last year's dog license number, but leave out the zeros. For example, if your license number was 12-0034, you would put 12-34 in the E-Dog screen. **By State Law, all dogs must be licensed by April 30. Our 2013 Dog Licenses are now available!**

Please remember that if you have more than six vehicles to register at a time, and there are many other customers waiting in line, you should make arrangements to pick them up later and leave two checks: one to the Town of Candia, and one to the State of NH-MV. We will process them when we are closed to the public, and phone you when they have been completed. You will receive a photocopy of your checks with the amounts as well as your new registrations. In order to keep the lines running smoothly and our customers happy, please make prior arrangements with us when you have many vehicles to register.

There will be one election in Two Thousand Thirteen. The Town Election will be held on March 12, 2013. You will be voting on Town and School articles as well as Zoning. Remember the polls are always open from 6:00AM to 7:00PM. If you are going to be out of town before any election, please contact me. I will give you an application for an absentee ballot which you will fill in and return to me. When the ballots come in, I will mail you one or you can apply for one in person,

Candia will be celebrating its 250th Anniversary this year. We have the following items for sale at our office to commemorate the event: Semiquincentennial Calendars featuring photos of Candia's Historical Sites-Then and Now, for \$10.00, and pewter ornaments for \$20.00 featuring the Candia Town Seal. We also have several copies of "The Candia Collection" written by Dorothy Purington of Candia selling for \$22.00. This book features interesting facts and anecdotes of our town as well as beautiful photographs of historic significance. The newest item is the book, "Water Powered Mill Sites in Candia, New Hampshire" documented by Diane Philbrick and Jim Lindsey. This book has wonderful drawings and photographs both in black and white and color and sells for \$20.00. Please stop by our office and see these items.

It's hard to believe this is my twenty-ninth year as your Town Clerk, and even more incredible is that in the first six years, the office was in my home and all registrations and titles were typed and dog licenses were hand written - no computers! FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 2012, the Candia Fire Department responded to 356 calls and as you can see from the Response Summary; our members respond to and resolve many types of incidents. The Fire Department is comprised of forty-three members and relies on the commitment of its members for the hours required for emergency responses, training, maintaining certifications and readiness, and maintaining the apparatus, equipment and the fire station.

The Fire Department members want to thank the Candia residents who at the 2012 Town Meeting supported both of the Department's warrant articles. The first warrant article was our request to add \$50,000 to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. The purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund is to allocate money annually so that when new apparatus or expensive equipment must be purchased, the required funds are available. The Department needs to replace its ageing rescue vehicle and the Capital Reserve Fund is the means which will allow this to happen. During 2012 the Department began evaluating different options for the new rescue vehicle and will make a decision in 2013 on how to proceed. The second warrant article authorized \$40,000 for a stipend system for Fire Department members. For 2012, each member's stipend was based on his/her attendance at emergency calls and training sessions and helped offset the out-of-pocket costs of participation.

In 2012, the Department continued its smoke detector drive where smoke detectors were available to town residents upon request. We will continue this effort in 2013 and we encourage residents who do not have smoke detectors to take advantage of this program. If you need smoke detectors, simply stop at or call the fire station. Please check frequently that your smoke detectors work properly and change their batteries at least twice a year. We also recommend that residents have carbon monoxide detectors installed in their homes.

In 2012, the Fire Department placed in service a Polaris off-road vehicle which will be primarily used for incidents in wooded areas for search and rescue and patient or equipment transport. This vehicle was purchased with funds from the Department's operating budget, a State of NH grant and a donation by the Candia Volunteer Firefighters Association. The Department also placed in service a new air bag system donated by the Candia Volunteer Firefighters Association. These air bags are used to lift heavy objects and have already been used for this purpose at an emergency call.

For 2013, we are submitting one warrant article for your consideration, again asking that you authorize adding \$50,000 to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. We need to continue to build the Capital Reserve Fund with annual contributions so that funds are available when needed. We ask that you please support this warrant article.

The members of the Fire Department look forward to serving the residents of Candia throughout 2013. We wish you and yours well and thank you for the support that you provide.

BURNING REGULATIONS

Written permits must still be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden or a Deputy Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times, except when the ground is completely covered with snow. However, it is illegal to burn anything except for brush and clean, untreated wood. The burning of any construction and demolition debris, household garbage, plastic, painted or stained wood, or any other material is strictly prohibited at any time of the year. Violation of this regulation or kindling a fire without a permit can result in fines up to \$200.00

Permits will not be issued for kindling or open fires between the hours of 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM unless it is raining steadily and the Fire Warden or Deputy Warden has issued a permit. Permits for properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season. Fireplaces and/or campfires must meet the State of New Hampshire regulations and be inspected by a Warden prior to use. Please see the regulations at the fire department website at www.candiavfd.org.

Permits can be obtained by calling the Fire Department Duty Officer pager at 639-7179 and leaving a voice message with your name, address and call back number. Permits are normally issued between 4:00 and 6:00 PM daily. After 6:00 PM permits will not be issued.

No permits will be issued for any location unless the location has been issued a valid address and the number is posted with 4+ reflective numbers on both sides of a mailbox or 4+ post permanently installed at the entrance to the property. Additional information can be obtained at the fire department website.

SMOKE DETECTORS HELP SAVE LIVES

Properly installed and maintained smoke detectors can save your life in the event of a fire. Please remember to test and clean your smoke detectors at least annually. Batteries should be changed twice a year (such as when you change your clocks). If you have any questions or need a smoke detector and cannot afford one, please contact the fire department at 483-2202.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

In 2012 we had close to 5,000 citizen contacts including offenses, arrests, and traffic stops. This does not include pistol permits, dog license entries, etc.

We continue to investigate a fairly large amount of thefts and burglaries. We appreciate residents keeping a watchful eye on one another. Please report any suspicious vehicles or persons immediately. Through investigative efforts, we have made several felony arrests throughout the year. We have also increased our efforts on fighting illegal drug activity in Town. We have worked with the Rockingham Sheriff's Drug Unit and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration on these drug cases.

Another area of concern is the amount of fraud calls that we have been receiving. Some residents fell victim to these scams and were out thousands of dollars. We encourage anyone who receives a suspicious phone call, letter, or e-mail to report it to the Station and we can check into the matter.

Our Officers have continued to receive updated training. Some of the classes attended this year were: Post Traumatic Stress Disorder Training, FBI Officer Safety and Awareness Training and Interview Training. These are in addition to our mandatory firearms and first responder trainings.

Again, we continue and strive to be involved with the community. We have a close working relationship with the Henry Moore School and our Officers have been teaching classes on life skills (bullying, drug education, gun safety, etc). In light of the recent school shootings, we have been meeting with the Principal and staff to review and update the emergency response plans. We will also be conducting drills with the school.

We appreciate the Rockingham Lodge (Candia Masons) providing the annual D.R.E.A.M. Breakfast that supports our program at the school.

We are submitting two warrant articles this year; Article 21 is our annual article that is asking for \$55,000 for our Police Special Details. This article provides the necessary funds for the police traffic details. This fund is fully reimbursed by the vendor of the detail and not the tax payer.

Our second article, #22, is for a revolving detail fund. This fund is for providing a way to accumulate funds from traffic details in order offset the purchase of a police vehicle and police equipment. An amendment was added at the Deliberative Session to reduce the previous article to \$5,000, thereby reducing the amount appropriated. This fund will be sustained by the vendor of the traffic detail.

We would also like to point out that warrant article # 11 for the Child Advocacy Center (\$1250.00) is supported by the Candia Police Department. The Center provides a safe environment for the evaluation of alleged physical and sexual abuse for children ages 3-18.

We asked that you please support these three warrant articles.

On behalf of the staff and officers of the Candia Police Department, we thank the Candia residents for their continued support.

RECYCLING CENTER

The Recycling Center staff would like to take this opportunity to thank all residents who support our recycling efforts. The financial benefits from our recycling programs are demonstrated in physical revenues as well as reduced land-fill fees. Through our recycling programs, the Recycling Center generated **\$53,629.58** which will be deposited into the Town's general fund. The Town also had approx. **\$29,306** in avoided land-fill expenses due to your recycling efforts. These figures reflect hard work and a lot of dedicated recycling from both the residents and the staff.

The Recycling Center is open to all Candia residents and recycling is mandatory in order to use the facility. Recycling is something residents can do which has a direct effect on lowering taxes. Permits are available at the Recycling Center located at 29 Deer Run Road during normal business hours.

Household Hazardous Waste Day was held in September and was well received. This important event allows residents to properly and safely dispose of materials not normally accepted. I urge you to support the warrant article in March asking the residents to approve **\$15,000** to fund the Household Hazardous Waste Day event in the fall of 2013.

We would also take this opportunity to thank all of those folks who have volunteered at the swap shop. There is a group of dedicated individuals, who, all year long staff the swap shop in order to have it open for use by all of the residents. I encourage everyone to stop in say hello and take it or leave it.

The staff at the Recycling Center is ; Chuck Whitcher Facility Operator, Joey Lamarche recycling attendant, Roy Tomlin recycling attendant and John Kebler recycling attendant. We are looking forward to another successful year in 2013.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

As we bring to a close another year, we are compiling the necessary documents needed to recover funds expended in the wake of Hurricane Sandy. Hurricane Sandy struck the East Coast back in October and caused extensive damage from New Jersey north. The impact to our area was primarily wind and power damage. Much of the town experienced tree and power line damage. Some areas were without power for several days.

The emergency responders from police, fire and road agent mitigated situations to the highest standards possible. There were no reported injuries or deaths related to the disaster in our community. Also the cooperation of the Board of Selectman and the school staff are recognized during this event.

Thank you for a job well done.

This was not the only disaster in 2012. In February a wind event caused wide spread damage to much of the region. Many of the communities surrounding Candia experienced tree and power line damage. Somehow, Candia had very little actual damage to our infrastructure. The power interruptions we had were due to downed trees and wires from surrounding towns.

It is recommended that everyone be prepared for disasters. Some of the items you should have available are food and drinking water for two or more days, toiletries, personal medications, a good flashlight with extra batteries, a radio, a way to charge a cell phone. Many people are installing back-up generators in their homes. This is a good option but remember to have it installed correctly.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The winter of 2012 was a quiet one in terms of snow, ice, and wind which was a welcome change from some of the past few winters. We were fortunate to miss the brunt of tropical storm Sandy with only minimal damage, mainly from downed trees due to high winds, and no substantial flood damage. This gave the highway budget more funds to use in other areas of road work. We were able to do some much needed improvements to Old Deerfield Road and to Stump Street. However, we did experience one of the worst mud seasons ever on some of our gravel roads. Currier Road was especially hard hit. It became impassable at times. This is strictly due to the volume of traffic on the road. The only real solution to this problem is to upgrade to pavement. We have included this in the town warrant this year. We wish we could retain the rural character and charm of a dirt road, but with the increased traffic demands it maybe the time for Currier Road to be paved.

We also completed the last major excavation of the Patten Hill Road project which had several drainage issues to be addressed and lots of ledge to contend with. The project went well and now only leaves the wearing course of pavement to be added for project completion. As with any road project, some inconvenience is likely. We tried our best to keep this to a minimum and wish to thank those people who live and travel on Patten Hill Road for their patience during the project.

The 2013 road project, if funding is approved, will be the completion of the Patten Hill Road project. This includes the final wearing course of asphalt over the entire length of road and guard rail replacement at the Abe Emerson Marsh. We will also be doing work on the easterly end of Critchett Road. This will include grinding of existing asphalt, culvert replacement, ditching, and repaving. This work will be done using money from the asphalt maintenance line. It's not clear if the funds will be adequate to complete the project to the town line, and if not, it will be completed next year.

I would like to remind residents of a few rules that can make the Highway Department's job more efficient and help keep our roads safer for all:

- Please reduce speed and yield to oncoming snowplows on the road!
- Do not follow too closely behind plow trucks, as they may back up at intersections, and we cannot see you there!
- Please do not plow your snow into the road and do not push it across the road.
- Do not park any type of vehicle within 10 feet of the roadside.
- Please note that all driveway culverts are the sole responsibility of the property owner to maintain, per RSA 236:13VI.

In closing, I wish to thank the various contractors, who through everyone's combined efforts, has made our projects reach completion on schedule and within budget, resulting in greater cost savings to the town. We hope to be able to do road reconstruction in this manner in the years to come.

SMYTH PUBLIC LIBRARY

During 2012, almost 13,000 residents visited, and they borrowed almost 500 items per week-- nearly 26,000 books, magazines, audiobooks and DVDs. The library now houses almost 27,000 separate items, most of which can be borrowed.

For the fifth year in a row, in the interests of the difficult economy, and unprecedented among other town departments, the library again asked for no increase in its annual budget. We also ran a third annual Food for Fines month, and donated cash and several boxes of food to the Candia Food Pantry. Our volunteers Ted Michalek, Carol & John Baer, and Marji Mason again provided hundreds of hours of free, cheerful help. In March, residents overwhelmingly voted 903 to 217 (80%) to continue to fund another year of library services.

Our energy conservation program, begun in 2010, continued a third successful year in 2012. It involves leaving lights off in areas of the library not being used, and careful monitoring of room temperatures for both environmental and economic reasons. Patrons were fully supportive of the program and are in the habit of turning lights on and off as needed, with great savings for both the earth and our budget.

More than 2000 e-books and audiobooks were downloaded during the year. We are among a group of libraries who together purchase limited user rights to these books, and then offer them to our patrons, just like we've done over the years with regular books. The download program is fully funded by *The Friends of Smyth Library*.

An average of 26 patrons (including 47 and 49 on separate days) enjoyed our special winter hours on Sundays from 1-4pm from January through April.

During July and August, we hosted the 2nd annual Summer Music Series on six consecutive Wednesday nights at the Pond Park gazebo behind the library, which featured a wide variety of popular music. Between 75 and 100 people attended each of the events. The Friends of Smyth Library provided major funding. The Candia Woman's Club, the Candia Garden Club, Paul Vallee Construction, Dave Paprocki Mechanical Concepts, New England Duplicator, Liquid Planet, and Car World also helped with funding. 28 local families joined The Friends of the Concert Series and made critical cash contributions toward expenses. No budget funds were used. Refreshments were organized and served by Pattie Davis.

In 2012, former librarian Edna Brown donated a planter for the entrance circle, which overflowed with beautiful purple petunias all summer. Canny Griswold made a major cash donation. (All major donors are recognized on the special *Gifts* plaque near the magazine rack.) The Garden Club made a substantial cash donation toward our gardening books collection. Volunteer Tim Wallace installed a parking sign and provided valuable advice building repairs. Deb and Jeff Marion donated a free-standing entrance sign. The popular free pass to *Fuller Gardens* in Hampton was again provided by the *Candia Garden Club*. Resident Jack Beard hosted a 7th annual Beatles film and music program. Gwen Paprocki again shared her Certified Therapy Dog Simon in the *Simon Says Read* Storytime sessions. Dayle Smyrl and Mary Caddy maintained the summer Reading Garden, and the library made its parking lot available to the Lights on the Hill event for a park-and-ride arrangement. Several avid readers made nice donations toward the book and audiobook collections.

We began a 1-2 year-old Toddler Storytime and continued to offer our long-running regular Storytime, now serving 3-4 year olds. Both are hosted by Pattie Davis. Pattie also organized our 2nd annual Scarecrow Contest just prior to Halloween, which again featured several inventive scarecrows on our front lawn. She also hosted monthly 3rd and 4th grade Book Reading Clubs, which meet after school at the library. Our 6 week non-competitive Summer Reading Program was enjoyed by dozens of Candia children, and hundreds of books were read.

The *Friends of Smyth Library* annual Book & Bake Sale was held in October and raised more than \$1,400. Thanks to the Girl Scouts and Linda McCabe for running the bake sale. All funds generated were used to pay for the Summer Concert Series, the Downloadable e-book and audio book program, several children's programs, the free monthly BookPage magazine, and free passes to the *Seacoast Science Center* and the *Currier*. We are again indebted to the *Friends* for their critical financial support. Special thanks again to Friends George and Eileen Denoncourt for moving and storing all our Book Sale books, and to the co-presidents of the Friends, Wendy Ducharme and Pat Larkin for all their work.

A scanner was added to our public copier and fax services in 2012. Free 24/7 wireless internet access continues to be available, within the building during operating hours and outside all the time.

The Fitts Museum had a record number of visitors in 2012, coming from as far away as California, Wisconsin and Alabama. The season began in May with a special exhibit featuring documents, flags and artifacts related to Candia's military, including a 13-star flag that was originally displayed during Abraham Lincoln's second campaign. The cellar floor was cleaned of large rocks and dirt and the addition of moisture barrier and crushed stone will help eliminate dampness in the building. By opening day 2013, the nine window sash across the front of the building will have been completely restored, including the addition of storm windows.

Two new trustees joined the museum in 2012; we greatly appreciate the enthusiasm and expertise that Jim Lindsey and Ron Severino add to the board.

PLANNING BOARD

In April of this past year we were saddened by the passing of long time Planning Board Chairman Mary Girard. Mary was an extremely dedicated and respected member of the Board having served for 20 years including 17 years as Chairman. She will be sorely missed.

We had other changes to the Planning Board this year with Alternate Stephen Bradley being appointed to fulfill the remainder of Mary Girard's term. Planning Board members Judi Lindsey and Ginny Clifford were re-elected to the Board with Ginny serving as Vice-Chair. We also welcomed back Fred Kelley as the Select Board Representative and Mark Siemonsma was appointed as an Alternate.

The Planning Board members have been busy this year despite a continued slowdown in applications. In absence of applications, we have focused on reviewing and updating the Town's Zoning Regulations, Land Development Documents, Earth Excavation Regulations, Master Plan and Capital Improvement Plan. This review takes place at Zoning Review and Revision Committee meetings that anyone from Town is welcome to attend. Our ongoing initiatives include:

- Capital Improvement Plan. The Capital Improvement Plan is an important part of Candia's planning process which aims to identify and work towards addressing deficiencies in existing public facilities and to anticipate and meet future demand for capital facilities. At the Planning Board's request, the Select Board has established a Capital Improvement Plan Committee. The Capital Improvement Plan Committee will work in conjunction with the Planning Board to identify and prioritize capital improvement projects for the Town.
- Master Plan. We have begun the process of updating the Town's Master Plan which was adopted in 2004. The Master Plan is a planning tool for the long-term vision of our Town and is used by the Planning Board to guide our initiatives. Two documents prepared by the Conservation Commission (Open Space Plan and Natural Resource Inventory) as well as a new Energy Chapter were adopted by the Planning Board.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT/CODE ENFORCEMENT

The year 2012 brought a slight increase in construction projects compared to 2011. Although there were not many sizable projects, there were many smaller projects completed throughout the year in our community. Permits issued in 2012 came in at 239 resulting in 452 inspections performed by our department.

Sixteen Code Enforcement issues were resolved while some are still pending resolution.

I would like everyone to understand that the purpose of all the many and sometimes confusing regulations are to assure the health and safety of our citizens, the structural stability of our buildings and the proper and safe operation of the systems that support the occupancy of these structures.

During 2012 your Building Department issued 239 new permits and renewed 36 permits. A breakdown of building activity in our community is as follows:

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Commission updated its goals and objectives early in the year. They are posted on our website (see link below). In conjunction with the Planning Board, we purchased a rack to hold some of the maps that have been created for recent Town projects. The rack is housed in the conference room, offering easy access to all who would use the maps.

We led two walks on Town owned properties managed by the Commission. The first walk occurred at Hemlock Drive Town Forest, where we had authorized forestry work. Charlie Moreno, our consulting forester, led the walk and talked about the forestry work conducted at the site. The second walk was to Kinnicum Pond. It was led by former Conservation Commission member, Dick Weeks. We plan to host more walks in the coming year.

Thanks largely to the efforts of Dick Snow, we completed two conservation easements on Critchett Road. These easements will help protect an undeveloped corridor from the Deerfield Town line to the wetlands just north of the North Branch River near Bean Island. This corridor helps to assure that wildlife have a viable route to travel between some of the habitats they need for survival. This, in turn, helps maintain balance in the ecosystems contained there. We all benefit from the fresh air and clean water produced by healthy ecosystems such as these. As expressed in our goals and objectives, our mission is to conserve the viability of Candia's natural resources as the Town grows by maintaining a network of undeveloped lands throughout Candia, which also connects to neighboring towns.

Two of our commissioners, Ellie Davidson and Deb Levesque, have been working on the Upper Lamprey Scenic Byway project with representatives from Deerfield and Northwood. The application for designation of this route should be submitted to State officials in early 2013.

The Commission will publish a newsletter, which explains more about our activities. It will be included in the Boy Scout packet with this town report. We also have a web site, www.candiaconservationcommission.org. Jim Dimaggio has helped to maintain our site and we extend our thanks for his time and expertise.

The Conservation Commission meets on the third Tuesday of every month at 7 p.m. in the Town Office Building. Anyone interested in conservation is invited to join us.

SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has a wide range of services and resources available to help dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants selected for their specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of appointed representatives the Commission staff designs and carries out programs of area-wide significance mandated by New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local projects which pertain more exclusively to your community.

Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of the Planning Board and/or Board of Selectmen. The Commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects that are of common interest and benefit to all member communities, keeps officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation, and in conjunction with the New Hampshire Municipal Association offers training workshops for Planning and Zoning Board members on an annual basis.

Services performed for the Town of Candia during the past year are as follows:

- 1) Conducted population, dwelling unit and employment projections from 2010 through 2050 at a five-year increment based on 2010 U.S. Census data;
- 2) Road Safety Audit: The SNHPC staff is assisting the Town with a RAS application for the intersection of NH 43/Main Street/Raymond Road, and the intersection of NH27 (High Street)/Raymond Road. The SNHPC provided collision diagram, Annual Average Daily Traffic (AADT), and turning movement count data;
- 3) Coordinated Upper Lamprey Scenic Byway meetings: Assisted with mapping, writing of Byway Nomination & Corridor Management Plan, outreach to towns;
- 4) Provided support to the Regional Trails Coordinating Council; Provided meeting notes, wrote/edited the Strategic Plan, coordinated logo development with the NH Institute of Art, explored the possibility of trail expansion into Candia;
- 5) Food Shed mapping for all towns in the Region;
- 6) Updated the Base map for Candia;
- 7) Conducted traffic counts at eighteen (18) locations in Candia, including one location requested by the Town, and forwarded the data to the Town's Board of Selectmen;
- 8) Represented the interests of the Town on the Region 8 Regional Coordinating Council for the Statewide Coordination of Community Transportation Services Project;
- 9) Hosted a Welcome Reception in Manchester for Candia legislators and other legislators from the region on December 4, 2012;
- 10) Provided information, data and organized project meetings involving Candia residents, planning board members, and town officials to participate in the Granite State Future Statewide and Moving Southern New Hampshire Forward regional planning project.

This three-year project seeks public input in developing and presenting a vision for the future for the region and state;

- 11) Facilitated the Southern New Hampshire Region Community Preparedness Program and provided plan updates and public service announcements for member communities;
- 12) Compiled building permit data and certificate of occupancy permit records to record dwelling unit totals from all municipalities in the region and prepared a summary Land Use Report;
- 13) Continued to update the Livable Walkable Communities Toolkit to incorporate livable, walkable community principles into local, state and regional planning programs, policies and statutes;
- 14) Organized and facilitated several Municipal Planners Roundtable and Natural Resource Advisory Committee meetings for Planning Department staff and planning board members on a variety of planning topics both local and regional. These meetings were held on March 21, June 20, September 26 and December 20, 2012;
- 15) Drafted Developments of Regional Impact Review Guidelines for use by all communities in the region;
- 16) Encouraged and facilitated energy planning among all communities in the region by offering energy audits on municipal buildings and developing energy chapters in town master Plans through the Energy Technical Assistance Program (ETAP);
- 17) Completed an energy chapter to be added to the town master plan;
- 18) Provided monthly information to the Candia Planning board regarding upcoming meetings, project and grant updates, webinars and other training opportunities through the planning commission's quarterly Newsletters, monthly Media Blasts and periodic E-bulletins;
- 19) Organized and offered both Zoning Board of Adjustment and Planning Board training to town officials and board members held on November 5 and 12, 2012;
- 20) Involved town residents, planning board and other committee representatives and town officials in the statewide and regional Broadband Infrastructure mapping and planning project. This project helped to implement many local broadband surveys, conduct broadband stakeholder and sector meetings, and identify underserved areas within the community;
- 21) Developed a new program initiative referred to as the ReadySetGo! Southern New Hampshire Certified Site Program for all municipalities located within the region. Program details and participation requirements will be presented to all municipalities in the region in 2013;
- 22) Completed and closed out the region's FY 2010-2013 EPA funded Brownfields Community-Wide Assessment Grant for assessment of brownfields sites located within all the region's municipalities. Participation in the program was offered to Town of Candia and town officials participated on Advisory Committee;

- 23) Facilitated a Source Water Protection Workshop for all municipal officials and planning board members in Candia and all the region's municipalities at the SNHPC office;
- 24) Provided recommendations and cost estimates to update the Town's Master Plan;
- 25) Reviewed and offered recommendations to update the Town's earth excavation regulations;
- 26) Worked with Town staff on economic development facts and figures, including updating Candia's Economic Assets Profile.

MINUTES OF THE 2012 DELIBERATIVE SESSION
FEBRUARY 11, 2012

Pastor Barbara Sanders led the prayer prior to the opening of the annual meeting, urging those assembled to work together for the benefit of the community and to respect the opinions of the speakers as they presented their viewpoints.

Moderator H. Clark Thyng opened the Annual Town Meeting Deliberative Session at 9:07AM. The Candia Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Brownies presented the Colors followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. The Moderator then introduced those who were seated on the stage: Town Clerk Christine Dupere, Deputy Town Clerk Cheryl Bond, Fred Kelly Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Carleton Robie Vice Chairman, Joe Duarte, Amanda Soares, and Dick Snow Selectmen, Selectmen's Assistant Cheryl Eastman, Administrative Assistant Andria Hansen, Payroll and Accounting Clerk Donna Becker and Town Counsel Bart Mayer.

Also introduced were the following Town Officers: Animal Control Officer Steven Bradley, Tax Collector Candy Stamatelos, Treasurer Kathleen Philbrick, Chair of the Budget Committee Lyn Chivers, Chair of the Conservation Commission Betsy Kruse, Emergency management Director Bob Panit, Fire Chief Dean Young, Treasurer of the Fitts Museum Janet Lewis, Health Officer Dave Murray, Chair of the Heritage Commission Diane Philbrick, Chair of the Planning Board Mary Girard, Chief of Police Mike McGillen, Road Agent Dennis Lewis, Chair of the Smyth Public Library Trustees Deb Spezzafarri, Superintendent of Cemeteries Jerry Becker, Chair of the Supervisors of the Checklist Candy Stamatelos, Chair of the Trustees of Trust Funds Dave Labbee, and Chair of the Zoning Board of Adjustment Boyd Chivers. The Moderator also

thanked Principal Robert St. Cyr, Vice Principal Michelle Lavallee, and Linda Byrne and the Moore School staff for setting up the equipment.

Since there was no objection, the following non-registered persons were allowed to speak for informational purposes: Counsel Bart Mayer and Police Chief Mike McGillen. Moderator Thyng explained a few basic ground rules for the meeting. Articles One and Two which are the Election of Officers and the Zoning amendments will not be discussed, since they will be on the ballot for the March election.

First Session:

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia, on Saturday, the 11th of February, 2012 at 9 a.m. This session shall consist of explanation, discussion and deliberation of the Warrant Articles numbered 1 through 36. The Warrant Articles may be amended subject to the following limitations: (a) Warrant Articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended, and (b) Warrant Articles that are amended shall be placed on the official ballot for a final vote on the main motion as amended.

Second Session:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia on Tuesday, the 13th of March, 2012. This session shall be the Voting Session to act on all Warrant Articles, as amended, including the proposed budget, as a result of the action of the ~~first~~ First Session+. The Polls will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE 1.

To choose the following Town Officers for the year ensuing:

ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Two Million, three hundred thirteen thousand, eight hundred sixty-one dollars (\$2,313,861). Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be Two Million, Three hundred twenty-nine thousand, nine hundred sixty-six dollars (\$2,329,966) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Candia or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in

accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Carleton Robie, seconded by Amanda Soares.

Selectman Joe Duarte amended Article 3 to read Two Million Three Hundred Thirty Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Sixty One Dollars and no cents (\$2,338,861.00), seconded by Richard Snow. Mr. Duarte explained that he felt it was time to add a 3% Cost of Living increase for the employees, who have not had a raise since 2008. Mr. Duarte felt it was time to reward the employees for doing a great job. Mrs. Chivers asked why this was not included in the original budget presented to the Budget Committee. Mr. Duarte explained that the numbers that were given to the Budget Committee were done before the Board realized that they were going to be in such good financial shape. Mrs. Byrd stated that she recalled that the employees received bonuses for the last two years, and she felt it was misleading not to mention that.. Mr. Duarte explained that it was a 1% increase last year, and it was important to reward the employees. Rick Lazott agreed with Selectman Duarte. As a former Selectman, he stated the employees workload had increased. Judy Szot stated the school budget went up last Saturday, which would increase property taxes \$125.00 per \$100,000.00 and felt it was wrong to bring this up at the last minute. Boyd Chivers wished to object to this amendment. We have a five member board of Selectmen and he did not feel one person should change the entire budgeting process. Carla Penfield agreed with Mr. Chivers. This matter should have been brought to the attention of the Budget Committee. If the budget is increased, it does not compel the Selectmen to spend the money on salary increases. Mr. Duarte again stated he brought this up because he feels this is right. Mr. Robie stated the Select board has worked hard to keep the budget level funded. They have paid bonuses to reward the employees. They have also established a fund to help families with medical problems to pay the deductible. The economy seems to be coming around. He feels the request is reasonable.

A request to call to the question was made by Mr. Robie, seconded by Mr. Penfield. The motion to call the question passed. Vote on the amendment to Article 3, with the new amount of \$2,338,861.00 was done by counting raised ballots. Yes: 48 No: 41 The amended amount carried. Mr. Robie requested that the votes be counted again because of the close number.. A request for secret ballot was received with the required signatures of registered voters present at the meeting. In order to allow time for voting, and the ballots to be counted, the Moderator recessed the meeting at 9:41AM to reconvene in 15 minutes.. Vote on the amendment: Yes: 66 No: 51 The amendment carried. Discussion then resumed on the amended amount of \$2,338,861.00.

Rob Jones wished to amend the dollar amount to \$2, 351, 561.00. Seconded by Paul Chiesa. Mr. Jones explained this amount would be used for the Candia Youth Athletic Association (CYAA), since the original CYAA petition article was not placed on the ballot due to a lack of the required number of signatures. Selectman Robie explained that this was not budgeted for and there is not a line item in the Town budget for the CYAA. Mr. Goekjian requested an opinion from Town Counsel. Attorney Mayer explained that one would have to look at the budget to see if there is a specific line item that this could fit into. For example: is there a recreation line where this could be placed? \$12,000.00 cannot be taken for example, out of the road repair budget which would not have been approved for that spending. If there is an area of the budget that the amount could fit in, then it would be possible; otherwise it would not be appropriate.. Mrs. Penfield questioned if we could legally support a private organization. She also pointed out that the Selectmen are not compelled to use this money for the CYAA. Mr. Jones explained they were hoping it could be part of the Parks and Recreation budget. There has been some

discussion with Selectman Kelley regarding a partnership with the Town. Mr. Lazott gave the opinion that this should be a separate warrant article. Paul Chiesa stated this is for mowing, fertilizing, aerating and snow removal. He felt that we needed to be competitive with surrounding communities. Nicole LaFlamme discussed giving money to private organizations, explaining that we already have that precedent with the service organizations we assist. Mrs. Jordan does not feel this should be part of the Town budget. There is no budget line item for this. Judy Szot stated all the articles Ms. LaFlamme spoke about were warrant articles, and this should have been placed on the warrant as well. Mr. Jones motioned to call the question, and also requested a secret ballot, seconded by Nicole LaFlamme. The motion carried to call the question. A request for a secret ballot with the required signatures was presented, therefore the vote was taken by Secret Ballot. The votes were tallied, Yes: 61 No: 56 The amendment passed. The amended amount for Article 3 is Two Million Three Hundred Fifty One Thousand Five Hundred Sixty One (\$2,351,561.00) Selectman Robie explained that if the default budget passes, funds will not be available for this amendment. Discussion resumed on the amended article 3. There were no further comments. Vote on the amended Article 3 was by a show of ballots. Article 3 will be placed on the ballot as amended. Mr. Snow moved to restrict reconsideration on the article, seconded by Todd Allen. It was voted to restrict reconsideration of Article 3.

Moderator Thyng recognized Amanda Soares to move articles 4 through 13 as a block, seconded by Carleton Robie. There was no objection from the legislative body to do so. The moderator then read the articles to the assembly. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by raising the ballots. Articles 4 through 13 were adopted and will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred and Seven Dollars (\$6,807) in continuation of its support of the Rockingham County Community Action. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Selectman Soares, seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 4 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 5.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$1,850) in continuation of its support of the American Red Cross. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Selectman Soares, seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 5 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 6.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700) in continuation of its support of the Aids Response Seacoast. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Selectman Soares, seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 6 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) in continuation of its support of the CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates for Children). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget

Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Selectman Soares, seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 7 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 8.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Sixty-Nine Dollars (\$669) in continuation of its support of the Rockingham County Nutrition and Meals on Wheels Program. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Selectman Soares, seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 8 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) in continuation of its support of the Visiting Nurse Association. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Selectman Soares and seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 9 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$1,400) in continuation of its support of the Area Homecare and Family Services. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Selectman Soares, seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 10 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$225) in continuation of its support of the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Selectman Soares and seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 11 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) in continuation of its support of the Child and Family Services. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Selectman Soares and seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 12 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 13.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800) in continuation of its support of the Lamprey Health Care. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Selectman Soares, seconded by Selectman Robie. Article 13 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 14.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be placed in the existing Town Office Building Maintenance Trust Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Fred Kelley, seconded by

Amanda Soares. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of hands. Article 14 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in the existing Revaluation Capital Reserve fund for the Future Revaluation of the municipality. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Carleton Robie, Seconded by Amanda Soares. There was no discussion The vote was taken by a show of ballots. Article 15 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) for the fifth phase of reconstruction on Patten Hill Road. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Dick Snow, seconded by Carleton Robie.. Mr. Lewis explained what has been done to date. Mr. Thyng praised Dennis Lewis for the great job this year keeping snow off the roads, which was met with a round of applause from the assembly. There was no discussion on the article. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. The article will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Five Dollars (\$125,955.00) for the operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library. Said funds are to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 0 with 1 abstaining) Motion was made by Carleton Robie, seconded by Dick Snow. Deb Spezzaferri wished to amend the article as a point of clarification, to read: that a no vote means there would be no money to operate the library. The amendment was seconded by Al Hall. Mr. Byrd felt that people would know that, and that the amendment would be a waste of time. Mrs. Spezzaferri explained that this amendment would clarify this for all the voters. Mr. St. Martin stated he found it astounding that someone would object to providing additional information to the voters. He supported the amendment. There was no further discussion on the amendment. Vote was taken by a show of ballots and the amendment to Article 17 was adopted. There was no discussion on the amended article. Vote was taken by a show of hands. Article 17 will be placed on the ballot as amended.

ARTICLE 18.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) for excess winter road maintenance, these funds will not be used unless the operating winter maintenance funds are exhausted. This will be a non-transferable appropriation. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Dick Snow, seconded Carleton Robie. Mr. Snow explained this amount, which includes labor and salt, was used completely this year. Mr. Lewis explained any money not used for winter maintenance goes back to the taxpayer. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of hands. Article 18 will move to the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000) to cover the reimbursable costs associated with Police activities, including but not limited to Police Special Details and grant programs. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Selectman Duarte, seconded by Selectman Soares to accept the article as read. Mr. Byrd asked if this was reimbursed. Selectman Robie explained it is a wash item. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of hands. Article 19 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to be deposited in the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1991 Town Meeting, for the future purchase of fire apparatus and equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Mr. Robie, seconded Mr. Duarte. Fire Chief Dean Young explained this was to put money away for the future purchase of apparatus. Mr. Byrd asked how much is in the fund now and was told it was around \$213,000.00. Chief Young explained with all the new regulations on trucks, such as emissions, have caused prices to go up. Capt. Jim Wilson stated that last year, they had to purchase a new forestry vehicle because the old one was so costly to maintain. Engine 1 should be replaced in 2016, which will cost about \$600,000.00 We are planning to order the new rescue vehicle this year. Mr. Byrd asked if the existing truck had any resale value. Capt. Wilson replied that it did not have much resale value. The old vehicle is very tired and the Department is putting a lot of money into repairs. Tom Dimaggio asked what the life expectancy of the new vehicle is. Mr. Wilson replied at least 20 years. There was no additional discussion. The vote was taken by a show of ballots. The article will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) to allow the Town to sponsor a Household Hazardous Waste Day for Candia residents. The event is to be scheduled for the fall, and is to allow residents the opportunity to properly and safely dispose of household hazardous waste materials that the Recycling Center does not normally accept. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Amanda Soares, seconded by Fred Kelley. Amanda explained it is a great program. Residents are not happy when we don't have this. Jeanette Miller felt that the program should be advertised better. There was no additional discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. Article 21 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) for the Fitts Museum. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Dick Snow, seconded Amanda Soares. Mr. Snow stated it is a wonderful museum and urged people to visit. The Museum is in the process of building a shelter for the antique hearse which has been acquired. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of hands. Article 22 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) and to place said funds in the expendable trust fund known as the Playground Maintenance Fund, established pursuant to RSA 31:19-a at the March, 1998 Town Meeting. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) The motion was made by Dick Snow, seconded by Joe Duarte. Mr. Snow explained the playground equipment has been there since 1998. Some of it is beginning to wear out and must be replaced or repaired. The playground also must periodically be resurfaced. One of the slides must be repaired as it has become a safety hazard. The playground gets a lot of use. There was no further discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. Article 23 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 24.

Are you in favor of limiting Kindergarten at the Moore School to a half day session? Submitted by petition. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 1). Carleton Robie explained this article should have been on the school ballot, it will be a non-binding vote. The motion was made by Carleton Robie, seconded Amanda Soares. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of hands. Article 24 will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a compensation system for the active members of the Town of Candia Volunteer Fire Department and raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) to fund this system for the calendar year 2012. Member compensation will be based on attendance at emergency calls and department sponsored training. If this warrant article is approved, starting in the year 2013, funding for this system will be reflected as a line item in the Fire Department operating budget. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6 to 2 with 1 abstaining) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Carleton Robie, seconded by Joe Duarte. Chief Young explained that his job is to take care of the tax payers but also the members of the Fire Department. He cited that it takes three days for Department members to recertify. The money would help compensate for gas, wear and tear on their vehicles, etc. It would help to help to defray the out of pocket costs for the members. It would only be used for calls and training. Based on last year's calls and training, the compensation would be \$10.00 for an hour. Tom St. Martin stated he has always supported the Fire Department and supports this article as well. Is there going to be transparency in the payment? Mr. Robie explained the Department does a very good job on logging the calls and bills would be paid through the Selectmen's office. Rudy Cartier urged the adoption of this article. He had requested this four years ago, when he was Chief. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of hands. Article 25 will be placed on the ballot as written. The Department was thanked by the assembly for the great job they do.

ARTICLE 26.

To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thirty-Nine thousand, six hundred seventy dollars and sixty-four cents (\$1,539,670.64) for the payment of Regular Education High School Tuition only. If this warrant article is accepted a like sum will be reduced from the school budget. Submitted by petition. (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 0). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Carleton Robie explained this will also be a non-binding vote, as it was supposed to be on the school ballot, but was submitted to the Selectmen's Office in error. The motion was made by Carleton Robie, seconded by Amanda Soares. The Article will be null and void regardless of the vote. Mr. Snow moved to amend the article to zero dollars and zero cents, seconded by

Tom St. Martin. There was no discussion. Vote on the amendment by a show of hands carried. There was no discussion on the amended article. Vote was taken by a show of hands. Article 26 will be placed on the ballot as amended to zero dollars and zero cents.

ARTICLE 27.

To see if the town will vote to rescind the adoption of the Budget Committee in accordance with RSA 32:14,V. Submitted by petition. (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 0 with 1 abstaining). Motion to accept the article as read was made by Dick Snow, seconded by Joe Duarte. Rudy Cartier. moved to amend the article to be effective April 1, 2012, seconded by Ken Goekjian. When consulted, Town Counsel Bart Mayer explained he did not have a problem with the amendment, but it will be subject to review to make certain that it would not be inconsistent with the statutes. Mr. Cartier explained the RSA was not clear. Mr. Robie spoke in favor of the budget committee. There was no further discussion on the amendment. Vote on the amendment was by a show of hands. The amendment was adopted. Mr. Cartier explained we have a budget committee and SB2. We do not need a Budget committee to tell us how to vote. Mrs. Byrd explained the Government Center puts out a publication that calls the Budget committee an arbiter between the departments wants and the residents ability to pay. Mrs. Jordan feels we need a balance and appreciates someone looking out for the interests of the citizens. Rick Lazott feels it brings awareness of what is going on in town. Ken Goekjian stated the Budget Committee has a lot of authority over the budget. The committee approves a budget and the bottom line can only be changed 10%. Amanda stated the people like having checks and balances. They make sure things are correct and the best possible budget is being presented. John Penfield requested to call the question, seconded by Ingrid Byrd. The assembly voted to call the question by saying aye. The vote on the amended article was by a show of ballots. Article 27 will move to the ballot as amended.

ARTICLE 28.

To see if the Town will vote to retain, in accordance with RSA 41:14-a, the existing buildings on the Old Incinerator Site, for storage purposes and such other uses as the town may determine at future town meetings, with only such actions to them under the approved Closure Plan as are explicitly and specifically mandated by DES in their approval of the Closure Plan. Submitted by petition. (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 0 with one abstaining). Motion by Selectman Snow. Seconded by Selectman Duarte to accept the article as read. Al Couch then spoke to the article. He had been a volunteer on the Solid Waste Committee for over 20 years. He explained the cost to remove the building would be quite high, the removal is not required by the DES, the site would look good if we came up with a closure plan. Mr. Couch presented a rendering of what the site would look like. The current plan calls for the building to be removed and moved to the cemetery. It costs a lot of money to rebuild an old building, and they don't go back together very nicely. The money that would be used to move these buildings would come from the closure money, which are limited funds used for the closure of the site. The buildings could be useful to the Town where they are now situated. Mrs. Soares stated these costs are estimates. The money is not set in stone. The building would be set up in the Holbrook Cemetery for the storage and repair of the cemetery equipment, and costs would be coming from the Cemetery Funds. The old concrete pads will not be coming up, dirt will be put over them. Rudy Cartier explained that the Town did not vote to tear down the buildings last year. The Candia Garden Club had wanted to use the facility for storage and would maintain the outside of the building. He felt there was a lot of false information that was given out last year. We should be looking at that site and see the potential. We need to look at the options. Offers of assistance by Mr. Cartier, with over 20 years of experience with this type of closure along with several other experts in the field, at no cost to the Town, were all refused. There's no hurry to do anything, we need to do it right. Mr. Duarte felt the community needs to

make a decision. William Byrd asked how many names were on the petition and could it be viewed. He was told it was a public record, and he could view it. Judy Szot asked why it was illegal to put an article in to keep people out. Mr. Lazott, who has been a life-long resident of the Town, said he shot rats at the dump as a kid with his Dad. There is a lot of stuff buried there that we don't know about. He feels we should close it and leave it as a residential area without spending a lot of money. Brian Miller asked if the old swap shop could be moved as a whole versus disassembling the building. Amanda explained when she was voted in in 2010, she took it upon herself to take care of the problem. Carla Penfield called the question, seconded by John Penfield. Ingrid Byrd wished to thank Amanda for the work she has done. The assembly was in favor of calling the question. Vote was then taken by a show of ballots. Article 28 will be placed on the ballot as written.

A motion was received by Kim Byrd, seconded by Carol Jordan to consider articles 29 through 36 as a block. There was opposition to consider these articles as a block. The Moderator ruled these should be considered individually since they are significantly different. Carla Penfield moved to override the moderator's decision, seconded by Ingrid Byrd. The vote to override the Moderator was by a counted show of hands Yes: 36 No: 24 The Moderator's decision was overruled. Discussion then resumed on moving the articles as a block. Tom St. Martin explained that the business of voting things in blocks actually came from the State Legislature. It was modeled after the Legislature's Consent Calendar. The way the calendar works is you are offered a block of things which can be voted on en masse, but any member who has a particular item that they want to vote specifically on, can petition to have that article pulled off the Consent Calendar and voted separately. Betsy Kruse felt that SB2 allowed people to discuss the reasons for the warrant articles. This is the forum to understand the reasons behind the individual articles and then, perhaps, discuss them with others. This is a good rationale for reinstating the Town Meeting. Sue Demanche felt the dialog was important and voting the articles as a block was valueless. Judy Szot felt that once the articles were moved as a block, there was no reason why individual articles could not be discussed.

Vote was then taken to move the articles as a block: Vote was taken by counted ballots. Yes: 33 No: 26 Articles 29 through 36 will be considered as a block.

The motion was made by Dick Snow, seconded by Amanda Soares to accept articles 29 through 36 as written. A motion to move the question was made by Mr. Bowman, seconded by Ingrid Byrd. The Moderator felt there is a lot of stuff here that needed to be discussed, therefore, he overruled Mr. Bowman. Motion to overrule the Moderator's decision was made by Ingrid Byrd, seconded by John Penfield. A vote by show of ballots was taken to overrule the Moderator. The vote failed. The Moderator's ruling stands and we moved to discussion of the articles. A motion was made by Carol Jordan to limit the discussion to a total of 30 minutes on all the articles. This was seconded by Carleton Robie. Vote was taken by a show of hands, the discussion was limited to 30 minutes. Mr. Snow then referenced the individual articles to explain them. Selectman Snow explained these articles are not raising additional funds, but are rather an attempt to create a more efficient government, Sue Demanche wished to discuss the hours of the Swap Shop, stating that presently, the Board of Selectmen voted to open it only on Sundays. Mrs. Demanche explained that there are volunteers that are willing to work and people are upset that it is not open more frequently. Linda Bergeron also agreed with Sue, and has also volunteered to work at the Swap Shop. She does not feel being open one day a week is enough. Fred Kelly discussed the change in dates referred to in Article 35. Giving as an example, at the meetings he has attended in Concord with attendees from all over New Hampshire, over 95% have March elections. Peter O'Neill discussed Article 36, stating he is the closest abutter to the wetland and there is no access. Rick Lazott asked if the money for Article 30 would be coming out of the revenues received for recyclables. Mrs. Soares replied that

presently, the money collected goes back into the General Fund. Mr. Lazott asked what the asking price is for the property discussed in Article 36. Mr. Robie explained there is no figure at this time. The property would have to be assessed. It was Mr. Lazott's feeling that the property in question was junk, with no frontage and no road and a third party such as Bear Paw would have oversight on Town owned property. Mr. Snow commented by saying there would be a public meeting on the twenty first of February at 7:00PM in the Town Office Meeting Room. At that meeting, there will be a presentation on why the property is valuable from a conservation standpoint. Ingrid Byrd stated that any time a fund gets established, such as in Articles 29 through 32, and money from whatever is paid into that fund, it gets taken out of the General Fund. The money should go to offset taxes. Also, regarding Article 33, Mrs. Byrd gave several examples of where people could volunteer other than the Swap Shop, such as the Planning Board or other Town committees. Mrs. Byrd also felt that if the Town went to an April election calendar as suggested in Article 35, you would be asking the Town Departments to operate for four months without knowing what the appropriations are going to be for the whole year. Mr. Snow explained the money in the Recycling Fund, for example, would be available for the use of the Recycling Center, and that this would encourage more recycling. Mrs. Soares felt the best way to promote recycling would be pay-per-bag, Judy Szot felt that if the money in the fund of Article 30 were used for the Recycling Center, then why not leave it the way it is now and avoid another layer of government. Brian Miller was opposed to Article 35, which would change the date of elections from March to April. As he is self-employed, this is a much better time of the year for him. Candy Stamatelos asked how much money was given back to the Town to defer the tax rate. She stated it has been zero for the last three years. Mr. Robie explained the money has gone to the unreserved fund balance, to increase it in case of emergencies. In 2009, the unreserved fund balance was \$500,000.00, which was quite low. The current balance is \$1,226,000.00. Judi Lindsey wished to address Article 36, the Conservation Commission article. Mrs. Lindsey stated it gives the Commission an opportunity to access grant money from the State to help protect the water. It is very important to protect the aquifer for the future. Rudy Cartier discussed Article 33, stating that presently the Swap Shop is open on Sundays only and there are many citizens who can't get there on that day. It should be available to the Townspeople every time the center is open. Mrs. Soares replied that the number of volunteers has dropped off, but if they have more people to volunteer, then they will consider opening the Swap Shop additional times. Following discussion vote was taken by a show of ballots to move articles 29 through 36 as a block. The vote was in the affirmative, so the articles will be placed on the ballot as written.

ARTICLE 29.

To see if the Town will vote to establish, in accordance with RSA 31:95-h, a Public Safety Special Detail Revolving Fund for the purpose of providing public safety services by municipal employees or volunteers outside of the ordinary detail of such persons, including but not limited to public safety services in connection with special events, highway construction, or other construction projects. All revenues received from Police Special Details shall be deposited into the fund. Appropriations, donations, gifts, bequests, or grants specifically designated for the fund or consistent with the purpose of the fund may also be deposited into the fund. The money in the fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year, and shall not be considered a part of the town's general surplus. Mr. Byrd asked how many signatures were on the petition - Judy Szot stated there were 99 signatures on the petition. Mr. Byrd does not think that there should be a greater number of signatures on the petition than there are people here tonight to vote on this amendment and change the intent of what it was meant to do.

Sharon Dewitt stated that last week we brought down the \$ amount to one dollar for the dump article. This is what SB2 does. We are not voting on this just bringing it to the ballot to be voted on.

Judith Szot stated that last year this was submitted to the town in error and that is why it is here this year. The people wanted to vote on it last year and were unable to have their vote count because of this. You are taking a fundamental right away from the people. They have stated they want a half -day kindergarten. They have a right to have it on the ballot as originated. Moderator Thyng stated that at last years Town Deliberative Session he informed the body that the article was submitted to the town in error and placed on the wrong ballot and would not be counted. Mrs. Szot stated they have a fundamental right to petition their government.

Mrs. Szot also stated that on the petition two people wrote let me vote on this article, this is what we want. It sends a bad message when you cannot do this. Mrs. Szot also stated that after receiving legal counsel she thought that this would be binding if passed. Deb LeBlond stated that they understood what Mrs Szot wanted, but the school board members are the ones that make the final decision on what needs to be done when it comes to curriculum. Mrs. LaFlamme stated that this is would not be binding and that the RSA had changed. There does not have to be an article to put kindergarten in as half day that would be determined by the School Board. It would be the same as adding or making any other changes to the curriculum. At this point legal council was asked to explain to Mrs. Szot what the outcome would be if this article was accepted.

Council was asked to address the RSA. Attorney Leslie wanted to know what the exact question was. Mrs. Szot replied, explaining what their purpose was in asking for half -day kindergarten.

The legal council stated that if it goes on the ballot as written the school board would not be obligated to go by it. The only reason it was put on there the first time was so the school would be able to get funding. It was for an entirely different reason. By matter of law the school must have a kindergarten now and this would not be binding. Mrs. Szot stated they are not asking for kindergarten to go away just changed to half day as the voters expressed last year that they wanted. Attorney Leslie stated it is not a decision that the school board has to follow, it is advisory only, whether the amendment is put in or not. He suggested that having this added, may save on a future law suit being brought on the town. Deb LeBlond responded that it is better if those voting knew that it was non-binding and only for advisory purposes. Ingrid Byrd asked to move the question. A vote was taken on the amendment by a show of ballots. The article was amended. There was no further discussion. Vote on the amended article by a show of ballots. **The amended Article 8 will be placed on the ballot.**

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I am pleased to make my seventh annual report to the Candia School District. Having completed my seventh year as your Superintendent of Schools, I continue to be impressed with the commitment to excellence that is practiced daily by teachers, parents, support staff, the school administration and, most importantly, our children. In turn, I thank the Candia community for its support of public schooling and for the high expectations that are held for the school district.

This past year, the District has struggled with issues associated with our high school students. Numerous reports from parents indicate that class sizes at Central High School have exceeded acceptable levels. Your School Board has aggressively advocated for our high school students and continues to pursue all avenues needed to address the issue. To date the issue has not been resolved. However, the Board will continue to work with the Manchester School District and will invest whatever time and effort it takes to ensure our youngsters receive the educational services that are outlined in our tuition agreement.

During the 2011-2012 school year our curriculum focus continued in the area of Language Arts. Grades K-2 completed the third year of implementation of the new core reading series, *Imagine It!*, while grades 3-5 used the program for the second year. Students have responded well to the systematic and explicit instruction provided through this series.

Phase III of our Language Arts review took place in grades 6-8. As part of the process, teachers conducted an in-depth review of the new Common Core State Standards. These standards are research and evidenced based, aligned with college and work expectations, rigorous, and internationally benchmarked. A review group of teachers and administrators selected Holt McDougal *Literature, Common Core Edition* for implementation beginning in the 2012-2013 school year. Mathematics will be the next area of curriculum review.

Students in grades 3-8 continue to participate in NECAP (New England Common Assessment Program) assessments in mathematics, reading, writing and science. Students in all categories and subcategories must score proficient at a targeted percentage for a district to make Adequate Yearly Progress. Although the Candia School District met the whole school target for performance in 2011, one subgroup missed the target in mathematics. The administration and faculty have developed a plan to address student performance in this area.

The Candia School District also uses NWEA, DIBELS, and other formative assessments to give a more complete picture of student progress. Upon completion of each benchmark, teachers meet in grade level teams to analyze results, determine best instructional practices, and provide re-teaching or enrichment experiences.

The Candia School District believes that 21st Century learning enables our students to be academically competitive in the global community. Education must challenge students with rigorous, personalized academic experiences, foster innovation and creativity, and embrace emerging technologies. To support our school community in achieving these goals, the SAU #15 school districts of Auburn, Candia, and Hooksett are in their third year of an improvement process known as *Good To Great: Living The Vision*. Workgroups have been created for each of these areas to review current research, articulate 21st Century expectations, and create an action plan to achieve desired results.

As we look toward the future, our efforts and commitment will be focused on implementing the Common Core State Standards. These standards, adopted by the NH State Board of Education in July 2010, were developed under the sponsorship of the National Governors Association and the Council of Chief State School Officers. The standards define the knowledge and skills students should have within their K-12 English Language Arts and Mathematics education so that they will graduate from high school able to succeed in college and careers and to be internationally competitive.

The Common Core State Standards are not intended to be new names for old ways of doing business. They are a call to take the next step. They include more rigorous content and application of knowledge

through problem solving and critical thinking skills. In addition, New Hampshire along with 24 other states has selected the Smarter Balanced Assessment to replace the NECAP beginning Spring 2015. This computer adaptive assessment including performance tasks will demonstrate student progress toward these standards.

The implementation of the Common Core State Standards will result in a significant shift in how we educate our students in the Candia School District. Over the past few years we have begun to lay the foundation for full implementation of the standards beginning in the 2013-2014 school year. A comprehensive math curriculum review and textbook adoption will take place during the 2012-2013 school year. It is also expected that our faculty and administrators will require significant and ongoing professional development over the next few years as we change our practices to meet the new rigorous demands of the standards.

This is an exciting time in education and we look forward to working with our students and their families to ensure their current and future success.

The boys and girls lavatories in the 1936 wing were completely renovated during the summer of 2011 which also allowed us to ensure they are handicap accessible. During the 2011-2012 school year a generator was installed on the school site. During the 2012-2013 school year the Town and School District worked together to connect the school fire pump system to the generator. That project was completed and the school can now run during emergencies as the Emergency Shelter for the Town. Also, a uranium mitigation system was installed during the April School Vacation week and the Server Room was relocated and climate control was installed to help prolong the life of our servers. During the April vacation work began on the replacement of the boiler. Heating control valves were installed during this time in order to expedite the project as this is a major project that will take quite some time to complete and we want to ensure it is ready for the next heating season. The boiler plant portion of the work and installation of the energy management head end system was scheduled for June as school would no longer be in session. This work was completed and the calibration will occur once the heating season starts as that is a requirement of getting that part of the project completed.

In closing, I have nothing but positive feelings about the Candia School District and our future. Thank you for allowing me to be your Superintendent. I am so proud of our teachers, our administrators, and most importantly our youngsters. A special thanks to Assistant Superintendent, Marge Polak and Business Administrator, Karen Lessard for bringing their unique talents to the District and to the Candia School Board for representing the community so well.

As principal of Henry W. Moore School, together with the staff, we welcomed four hundred three students in September of 2012. I am pleased to announce the newest members of our staff for this school year. They are:

We have three new custodians who keep our school clean: Mr. Arthur McDonough, Mr. LeeRoy Goodman and Mr. Bob Healey.

The S.A.U. wide reorganization plan is well underway and involves teachers, parents, community members, school board members and administrators. This year, I have had the privilege of co-chairing the combined Instruction, Curriculum and Assessment Teams. This plan will be instrumental in moving our schools toward 21st century learning requirements. The major focus of each team will continually be re-visited and revised as the school system adapts to an ever-changing world.

This is the fourth year of implementing the Imagine It+Reading Program. Grades K-5 are following the program. Teachers have reported higher assessment scores at the beginning of the school year. The program focuses on fluency, phonemic awareness, vocabulary, and writing comprehension.

The eighth grade-culminating project is a strong component of our curriculum. Students in eighth grade are required to present their work to parents, school board members and community members. Topics in previous years included stem cell research, year round schooling, data statistics and probability ratios, comparing professional sports teams, music and its influence on education, the effects of video games in children and brain development. This year we look forward to project based learning with direct connections to solving real world problems. As an example, a group of students will organize and host a marathon to benefit the Children's Hospital at Dartmouth (CHAD).

Several grade levels at the Moore School have requested to participate in the Math Pilot Programs. Our school had the highest participation rate in the School Administrative Unit with eight teachers in six different grade levels comparing Go Math and Math In Focus programs.

In October, students in grades three through eight participated in the New England Compact Assessment Program (NECAP). In 2010, the State Department of Education adopted the Common Core State Standards. The anticipated timeline from the State Department of Education suggests that the last NECAP test will be administered in 2013 with transitional items. Students' knowledge of the new Common Core State Standards will be measured using the Smarter Balanced Assessment System in 2015. The 2013-2014 school year will consist of full implementation of the Common Core State Standards as we transition from the Grade Level Expectations in Reading and Math. We continue to use the Northwest Educational Association (NWEA) assessment twice yearly to track student performance and growth as well as tailoring instruction to meet individual needs. A second round of testing is scheduled for May of this year, to record growth and create benchmarks for the fall of 2013. The Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) have been administered to students in kindergarten through fifth grade. This assessment provides useful data to regular and special education teachers as a tool to inform instruction.

As always, each year I have the privilege of interacting with parents, students, and community members as the Principal of the Henry W. Moore School. I have a great deal of confidence in our staff, school board, administration and the community, to meet the individual needs of every Candia student.

Moderator Thyng - Article 1, the election of Officers, and the articles placed on the ballot today will be voted on in the election on March 13, 2012.

(Recommended by the School Board) (Not Recommended by

the Budget Committee) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Kim Royer and seconded by Nicole LaFlamme.

Discussion on the article:

No discussion being needed, the article was moved to a vote. Article 2 was adopted unanimously by a show of hands.

- (2) Shall the District vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant, or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purpose set forth therein, totaling seven million, eight hundred forty-one thousand, eight hundred thirty-six dollars (\$7,841,836)? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be eight million, two hundred twenty-one thousand, eight hundred thirty-four dollars (\$8,221,834), which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Candia School District, or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (This article does not include appropriations in any other warrant articles.) (Recommended by the School Board) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) Motion to accept the article as read was made by Deb LeBlond and seconded by Nicole LaFlamme.

Discussion on the article:

Deb LeBlond motioned to amend the article to change the amount to eight million, two hundred sixty-seven thousand, five hundred, fifty-two dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$8,267,552.89). Nicole LaFlamme seconded the motion. Deb spoke to the motion to amend, stating it was to bring the total back to the original amount that was requested by the School Board.

Lynn Chivers, Chairman of the Budget Committee spoke to the motion to amend. She stated that they came up with this figure by looking at several things, the economy, the inflation rate, the surplus from last year as well as other items and the Budget Committee thought that the figure they came up with was workable. . She spoke about some of the reductions the Budget Committee used to come up with their figures, such as the full time kindergarten being added into the budget. The Budget Committee felt that this should have been a Warrant Article so that the townspeople could vote on it. Also the salary line, since five teachers will be retiring that are at the top of the pay scale and only four teachers will be replacing them at a lower pay scale. The school board is suggesting two additional school buses, for \$ 90,000 and we thought that was a lot of money for something with an insignificant educational impact, high school tuition reduction line. We asked the SAU to give them historic information and for the past ten years there was an average of 17 students per year that were anticipated to go to high school and did not. She stated they had received different information three days ago and hopefully by the end of the meeting they would find out why. There was a \$255,000 surplus last year in that line item so they felt a \$140,000 reduction in this line was not unreasonable. Looking at the overall budget they thought a six percent (6%) increase over the past two years was too much. Our economy has not increased. Deb LeBlond responded she was not going line by line but the budget is made up of two parts; there are discretionary and non-discretionary, the ones that are contracted and those are not. She stated that without the increase they would be \$47,000 short of meeting their contractual obligations. That says it all.

Glenna Jean Wilson stated she still did not understand. Federal Funds, why are we adding funds?

Deb LeBlond responded that federal funds were grants.

Mrs. Byrd tried to explain federal funds . something we get from the Feds but what you have to do to accept and spend the money you have to have it in your budget and agree to spend it. It is a wash item. Mrs. Penfield explained that if the federal government gives us money it has to be shown in our budget in order for us to accept it, we do not have to raise it just show it. Ms. Wilson asked why the increase in the budget. Deb LeBlond responded by discussing the differences between the Budget Committee and the School Board on some of the line items in

the budget which included the retirement, salary, Social Security, and Spec Ed costs. Mrs. Byrd explained what was asked for and the Budget Committee Level funded, they considered everything, they made suggestions where cuts should come from. It is the administration who has the final say on what the cuts are in line items. Ms. Laflamme stated the Board is not trying to confuse anyone. She explained the process of how the budget is decided starting with the principal and his team then to the SAU, then to the School Board. Pieces of this puzzle are very important with costs that we have no control over. When Federal Funds are involved it is tricky. It is not an issue about busing but about their children's education. Nicole discussed the bus, kindergarten and replacement of five retiring teaches with four and the difference in pay and the effect this would have on their decisions for the figures they came up with the budget. She stated that they would appreciate the support for the school board and it was time to invest in our children and community.

Rick Zang explained he was on the first kindergarten committee and became spokesperson for the kindergarten and their push for it. It was always for half day and not a full day. Apparently the school board is legally allowed to do what they are doing, instead of putting it into a separate warrant article so that the people could vote on it at elections in March. Everyone should get to vote on anything that is a big deal such as the kindergarten issue. Secondly with the budget, research does not support that the increase in more classes and smaller sizes does not always prove to be a smarter choice, they are expensive. There are other things that are more important to get in the school system. We need to make choices how we spend our money. The teachers' salaries are one of the bigger expenses, fewer teachers, and larger classes. He is not against paying the teachers good salaries.

Kathy Allen explained that one increase is special education a \$151,000 increase that is a federally funded mandate.. High school there was an overage last year decreased this year and last year. The variance may not be there. Teachers' salaries have been increased.

Candy Stamatelos questioned when the school requests funds to operate do they get the whole lump sump. The answer was monthly. When they report to the Dept. of Revenue what figure is reported, the whole amount or what was spent to figure the tax rate? It is the figure that is approved at the vote in March.

Amanda Soares one of the bus drivers for Candia stated that there are a large amount of children that are driven to school by parents. A lot of times her bus is empty. The statement that the children are always sitting on buses for a long time is not really accurate. We have to take into consideration of all community members who can't make ends meet.

Emily Roster spoke regarding the busing,. A lot of people drive their kids to school due to the fact they have to sit outside so long if they are on an early bus. She supports the school board and how tirelessly they have worked on this budget.

She encourages them to vote for the amendment

Michelle discussed the full time kindergarten. Having parents pay if they want a full day kindergarten, this could be an option.

Carla Penfield commented on what Dr. Zang was saying, regarding the teacher/child ratio of 11 to 1. They also have the support staff that is also in the building. There are 36 teachers and 400 students.

Ginny Clifford, also an educator, commented on the class sizes and do we want to put classes together and have very large classes? Also do we want all brand new teachers or do we want some with experience? She discussed the differences in the budget in different line items. She thought the new way of education was in technology but that is where some of the cuts were.

Boyd Chivers questioned what were we amending? Moderator Thyng answered it was the dollar amount. Mr. Chivers wanted to know why there was a \$929,000 difference for 2013. Has enrollment gone up? There is a 20 pupil increase 419 children in school. Last year 399. How much is contractual and how much do we have to come up with. Last year made it on \$7,030,000. Why the difference? Dr. Littlefield stated you are looking at last year expenditures with next years needs. He stated that some of the costs that would be different and what is contractual and if all the monies are not spent it is returned to help offset the tax rate. The School Board is asking for an additional 959,000. What are they planning on doing with it? Deb LeBlond, replied, a lot of it is special ed, retirement, salary increases, social security and fees we have to encumber that the state is no longer doing. \$7,581,000. is what we have to pay out with no other expenditures. Did the budget committee take into account these figures? Mrs. Byrd had a correction on the attendance number of 419 students. Kindergarten students were being counted as full time and they are not, 400 if you do not count them. In grades 1 -8 there were 381 students and we gained four students since October.

Lynn Chivers stated the School Board was never given discretionary and non-discretionary figures. Salary lines she could not recognize, so could not comment on them. High school includes every high school student and some may not choose to go to public high school. She

stated what items the Budget Committee did not touch in the budget and the ones they did touch were set at last year's amounts.

Sharon DeWitt commented on the high school line . if you take graduating 8th graders then there are already their 149 students. The line item is clearly short.

Rudy Cartier wanted to congratulate the Moore School staff on the good job they do .He wanted to discuss how much the budget is increasing. What the school is asking for this year is a \$172,527 difference. This is a 2.2% increase to the current operating budget. Cost of living increased by 1.6%.

Frank Albert stated that one of the first things people look at is the school system. Candia is at least above average. We don't have to spend more money to do that. Look at the school, but they also look at the real estate taxes you are paying. Which are more important?

Todd Allen was tired of hearing about the figures from last year. \$550,000 was left over and they are not spending our money without having knowledge of what they are doing. Support the school and stop the silliness.

Eric Shifflett questioned the budget committee difference for each tax paying home if we accept the budget committee's recommendation as opposed to what the school board is asking for.

Lynn Chivers asked this very question from the selectman. The answer she received was an extra \$500,000 would be \$1.25 per thousand on tax rate. .

Robert Patrick asked how did they come up with the dollar amount for high school student enrollment next year? Mrs. Chivers answered the SAU and school board came up with a figure and we decreased that amount as it does not always come out to that figure due to some students not enrolling in that school.

Robert Patrick stated that you should look at the worst-case scenario as opposed to the best. He asked to move question to a vote.

There was further discussion regarding what the anticipated surplus would be this year. The School Board responded by saying they did not think there would be a surplus. The Budget Committee stated they thought there would be a potential overage.

Dr. Littlefield's response was he could not allow misinformation to the group. He stated that this is a small budget compared to what he has done in the past and feels he is able to make the decisions that need to be made and that the statement that \$817,000 is a surplus is incorrect and wrong, it can't be defended and is misleading. The reports that are being given to the Budget Committee are being misread. It's an error and he is sure that are not trying to mislead you. He stated he was just a little over halfway through the budget cycle. I cannot answer this question, if I gave you an answer to that I would be misleading you.

The motion was made by Robert Patrick to move the question and seconded by Mrs. Byrd. Vote taken to vote on the amendment on Article 3. Motion carries by a show of hands. Mrs. Penfield requested a secret ballot to vote on Article 3 with enough signatures on request.. Moderator Thyng stated we would be voting on the amendment, changing the dollar amount from \$7,841,836.00 to \$8,267,552.89.

The moderator asked if while we were waiting to get the results of the secret ballot for Article 3 and would they like to consider moving to Article 4. The motion passed with a show of hands.

That would mean that \$25,000 would be added to the amount already existing. Having no further discussion the article was moved to a vote. Article 5 was adopted unanimously by a show of hands.

Moderator Thyng announced the results on the amendment to Article 3.

The motion was moved to a vote and unanimously passed by a show of hands.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Candia School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2011, which collectively comprise the School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of Candia School District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

As discussed in Note 12 to the financial statements, management has not recorded the long-term costs of retirement health care and obligations for other postemployment benefits in governmental activities. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that those costs be recorded, which would increase the liabilities and expenses of the governmental activities. The amount by which this departure would affect the liabilities, net assets, and expenses of the governmental activities is not reasonably determinable.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matter discussed in the preceding paragraph, the government-wide financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the governmental activities of the Candia School District as of June 30, 2011, or the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended.

In addition, in our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Candia School District as of June 30, 2011, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended and the respective budgetary comparison for the general fund and the grants funds in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's Discussion and Analysis (pages 3 through 9) be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Candia School District's basic financial statements. The individual fund financial schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. They are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain

additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the financial schedules themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America.
