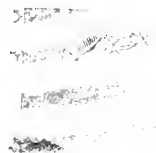

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H., in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Odd Fellows' Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for Memorial Day.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the use of the Smyth Public Library Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred and twenty-one dollars and fifteen cents (\$621.15) for Town Road Aid, to which the state will contribute four thousand one hundred forty-one dollars. (\$4,141.00).

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for summer maintenance of roads and bridges and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expense of the highway department.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.

8. To see what additional charges the town will instruct the Tax Collector to make on poll taxes after October first.

9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.

10. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received the past year.

11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be added to the World War II Memorial Town Hall Building Fund agreeable to the Laws of 1943, chapter 160 and the Session Laws of 1947, chapter 8.

13. To see what action the town will take to tar Tower Hill Road, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a salary for the superintendent of cemeteries.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for maintenance and improvements to cemeteries, the money to be expended under the direction of the selectmen and superintendent of cemeteries.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for improvements to Moore's Park.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for white pine blister rust control, the money to be spent in co-operation with and under the direction of the State Forestry Department.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$66.00 (1/100th of one percent of the Town's valuation based on the 1950 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in co-operation with the 37 other communities in this region, or act in relation thereto.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for painting and repairs to the Fitts Museum.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty dollars (\$60.00) for forest fire fighting tools.

21. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in re-appraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

22. To see if the town will vote to publish in the 1951 Town Report a list of all taxable property by name of property owner, valuation, and amount of tax paid.

23. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate money for the same.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls to close at 6 P. M. unless otherwise voted at the meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest Fire Prevention Pays Dividends

Most forest fires are preventable because someone is responsible for them. State records for 1950 show 94% of 632 fires resulted from human perverseness and carelessness. Refusal to secure the required warden permit before burning; failure to use good judgment, lack of equipment and assistance while burning; carelessness in smoking and poorly conditioned woods equipment (trucks, tractors, etc.) resulted in a total of 6090.6 burned acres with a loss of \$63,949.10 in valuable property.

Fortunately, these human factors can be dealt with because people can be reached. This the local forest warden tries to do by informing his fellow citizens that *EVERYONE MUST*:

1. Secure a written permit to burn in or near woodlands when the ground is not covered with snow.
2. Use good judgment in burning and have enough equipment and assistance to keep fire under control at all times.
3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands and refrain from throwing lighted material from automobiles.
4. Make certain that all equipment used in the woods is in good condition.

His success depends entirely upon public reaction to his appeals. He does his part—the rest depends upon YOU and YOUR compliance with burning requirements.

YOUR care with YOUR fires and YOUR smoking and YOUR care of motive equipment you use in the woods.

It all aids, materially, in reaching the desired goal, the PREVENTION OF FOREST FIRES—because PREVENTION PAYS DIVIDENDS!

February 1, 1951

With continued support so sorely needed for the coming year, may we continue to work as a team for the youth of the town.

State Aid to Education

Since the last report, the State Aid to Education picture promises to be much brighter. The district received \$3,783.14 as state aid during the past year. A year ago the amount was \$7,266.81. This reduction was due, as we already know, to the reduction in the amount voted by the 1949 Legislature. However the State Board of Education is placing before the 1951 Legislature a new State Aid formula which, if passed, will give the Candia School District and any similar town an amount in proportion to its ability to support its schools. According to this bill Candia's share, based on its equalized valuation, would be approximately \$14,960.86. In view of the increased enrollment in the school and because of the immediate expansion necessary, this would seem a must for the Representatives of the General Court.

Enrollments

The following chart shows briefly the actual number of children who have registered in the Moore School from 1946-47 to 1950-51. The last column estimates are from the school census and is the expected enrollment for 1951-52.

In 1948-49 there were four teachers in the Moore School and each teacher had charge of two grades. This worked out very satisfactorily. However, in 1949-50 the entering class nearly doubled. Two grades for every teacher would not only have placed a burden on the teacher, but reduced the time the pupil could have with the teacher as an individual since there would have been 58 children in grades one and two combined. It was during the summer of 1949 that a new room was completed and another teacher was hired. This was a satisfactory solution for one year. During the summer of 1951, in order to forego more building for one year, grades one, two, three, and four were grouped so as to give each pupil an opportunity to work within his capacity and allow the teacher to aid and encourage those pupils who really needed in the opinion of the teachers, superintendent, and school board, special attention. Although modern educational development encourages and practices such methods, it was not to be, owing to unforeseen circumstances. It was necessary, therefore, to group grades three and four under one teacher with 49 children and grades five and six with 45 children. Of course the classrooms in the present building were not built for any such large groups. There are many factors which make large groups undesirable. You can readily understand what this means in terms of education and the future welfare and living standards of those children involved. It means that each child in such a group receives 1/49th or 1/45th of the teacher's time during the day, week, and year; it means a lack of space to develop directed activity so essential to the growth of children of this age level; it means that the children endowed by nature with more than

average ability will be left almost to themselves to get an education by the "hit or miss" method in order for the teacher to spend a bit longer time with those youngsters who have not received the mental where-with-all through no fault of their own; it means that in both groups — the brighter and the slower — direct attention cannot be given except at various intervals thus setting up problems of work habits involving responsibility detrimental to the American way of life; and it further means that these youngsters will be retarded in growth nearly all their lives because the teacher does not have the actual minutes to plan, aid, and direct each child at this level of learning especially in the most fundamental of all learning — reading.

Let us go a step further. Because of the continued increase in the number of children who will enter our school, these present boys and girls will be moved along to the next grade. Since many of them will have been unable to meet actual grade teaching, and since the teacher in the next grade will be unable to give them the time necessary to meet the standards of this grade, this process will undoubtedly continue until they reach high school, when, because of the lack of fundamental understandings, the learning process will be retarded and parents will wonder just what has happened to the educational system of the town. If a person has a boy or a girl who will enter school within the next five to eight years, be prepared under present conditions, to either face less and less teaching time for that child or make available the necessary housing space, instruction, and adequate materials to which he is entitled even under the pressure of present world conditions.

What Is the Solution?

During the past year the School board has been very much aware of these conditions and have been discussing, developing, figuring, and planning just what should be done as against just what the town could do and still maintain the high standards of the school as exemplified in its graduates.

To aid the members of the board in coming to some conclusion, the expert knowledge and experience of certain members of the State Department of Education were called

in for consultation. Briefly, the following is a result of these deliberations:

1. Build an addition to the present school building.
2. Canvass the town for available buildings suitable for a school including such buildings as the home of the Candia Improvement Club, the Odd Fellows Hall, the Library, etc.
3. Complete or construct two more rooms in the basement of the present school building.

Let us discuss these possible solutions briefly.

1. In discussing the building of an addition, it seemed to be common agreement that this new addition might house an auditorium and the town offices on the ground floor and the lunch program in the basement with available space for storage, etc. Then, too, it was thought possible that two or three classrooms might be constructed in the basement and leave and enlarge the present lunchroom space. For long range planning, this solution is, without doubt, in the best interests of the town as well as the school. However, the board was advised that with shortages of materials, cutbacks, and increased prices, this solution should be abandoned for a year at least although it was pointed out that with continued migration from the cities, school housing conditions will not get any better.

2. In canvassing the town for available space, it was found that there were three or four problems to be met: (a) permission from organizations, individuals, or the town itself to use the buildings; (b) buildings suitable for children and the need for putting them into condition to meet State requirements; (c) cost of such necessary changes which, in the last analysis, would be a temporary solution only; (d) placing children in separated buildings would decentralize the administration, the teaching group as a school, the special activities including music, programs, and similar activities, and a feeling of not "belonging" to the educational system of the town to say nothing of the playground space, the cost of janitor service, toilet facilities, and an adequate water supply.

3. The third, and probably the most satisfactory solution of all, would be the completion of two more rooms in the basement of the present building. There are some drawbacks to this suggestion, but it coincides closely with the long range planning and it does overcome most of the prob-

lems set forth in the second solution. It brings all the children together under one roof; it gives all who desire it, an excellent lunch program; it uses the facilities of the water and toilets; it becomes a permanent fixture to the building and meets with the approval of the State Department; it is based on further expansion because nearly all available space is used; and it promises in the near future a new auditorium where all town functions may be held.

Whatever the solution, it will cost the town and district more funds, not only in the process of building, but also for equipment, new teachers, and books and supplies. It would seem that more and more the district needs the help of the State in the form of State Aid to Education.

The Budget

Before discussing the budget there are one or two facts that should be brought to the attention of both the School Board members as well as the taxpayers of the town.

Every year the State Department of Education furnishes every district average costs both for the cost of instruction and with the cost of operations. These figures are based upon the financial figures or reports of July of each year sent to the department by all districts for checking, correction, and tabulation. This same report must also go to the Tax Commission and must coincide with all Education Department data.

These figures are now available for your study. The average cost of instruction for the entire State was \$107.70 for elementary education for 1949-50. Cost of instruction includes Teachers' Salaries, Books and Supplies, Clerical Expenses, and Administration. The Cost of Instruction for the Candia Moore School was \$80.39 for the same year. The State average Cost of Operations for elementary schools for 1949-50 was \$152.60 not including Tuition, Transportation, Debt Obligations, and Capital Outlay. The comparative cost for Candia for the same year was \$104.45. This shows that the School Board is trying, at least, to develop modern methods in a modern school within the limits of its budget and keep costs within reasonable limits even with the increased costs due to enrollments and expansion over the same period — 1949-50.

In studying the budget, it will be noted that the largest amounts involved are Teachers' Salaries and High School

Tuition. This has always been true in Candia just as it is with every city and town in the State where children are educated. With the increase in the cost of living everywhere, it is only a question of time before salaries must be increased. When the National average is nearly \$3,000.00 and the State average is nearly \$2,500.00 for the regular classroom teacher, every town supporting its schools and hiring modern trained teachers while at the same time requiring these same teachers to take summer and extension courses, must either increase salaries or take mediocre instruction for its children. Gone is the day when "what was good enough for me, is good enough for my children." Youngsters are living today in a very different era — the era of the jet-plane, the television, the stream-lined Diesel engine, the high-powered automobile, the atomic bomb, sulphur drugs, and similar phenomena. In order to understand such a world more and more boys and girls are remaining in school longer which means, for towns like Candia with no secondary school, more and more tuition. Only recently Manchester has increased its tuition rates from \$190.00 to \$250.00 per pupil for 1951-52, Concord from \$250.00 to \$275.00 and other receiving high schools in the vicinity are at this moment discussing tuition increases not only for 1951-52, but also for possible increases for the next five years. This brief discussion shows quite plainly the need for increases in Teachers' Salaries and Tuition in relation to the educational picture.

Retirement is another item in the budget which has increased nearly \$1,000.00. The new Teachers' Retirement Law was not passed until after the March meeting last spring. This makes it compulsory for every district to pay into the Retirement System 6.09 percent of the total salaries paid. Up to last spring the percentage was five. The amount in the budget beginning last July is not adequate enough to pay the retirement obligation of the district this year. Therefore, with no unforeseen changes in the Retirement Law for this year, the amount chargeable to the district will be nearly three times that of a year ago.

Since the district incurred a debt of \$2,200.00 due to the need for expansion a year ago, the amount of \$550.00 plus interest of \$55.00 must be raised to retire a part of that debt. These two items were not even a part of last year's budget.

We now come to the possibility of expansion again about which a large part of this report is made. The district must

decide whether or not it wishes to raise this money in the budget for the necessary construction or incur another outstanding debt to be paid over a period of years. The approximate amount for this work based on the work done a year ago and the probable increase in the cost of materials and labor at the present time would be \$6,500.00.

Other items in the budget have not changed materially except where it was necessary to meet rising costs.

Conclusion

This is the educational picture which faces the School Board and the citizens of the town and district for the coming year. Many loyal citizens are in a better position to understand just what the future population of the town will be within the next 3 to 8 years. If enrollment figures continue to increase, and Candia is not alone in this situation, the town has a major problem to solve.

It is a pleasure to be able to report that the Moore School in Candia continues to be regarded as among the best. For this record may I thank the graduates who have made it possible, the teaching staff for its untiring confidence in the youth of the school, and the members of the School Board for the encouragement and cooperation in their efforts to make the school a living monument of the town.
