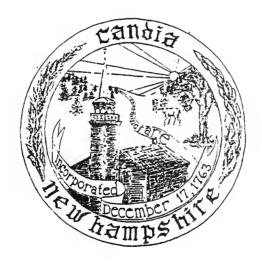

#### AMENDMENT NO. 1

AMEND Article I. Preamble, by adding the following statement taken from NH statutes to the end of aection 1.02, Purpose: "to ancourage existing and proposed agricultural activities, recognizing that agricultural activities are a beneficial and worthwhile feature of Candia's landscape and shall not be unreasonably limited by use of planning and zoning powers or the unreasonable interpretation of such powers."

# AMENDMENT NO. 2

AMEND Article V. Section 5.02. Table of Uses, by reformatting only, by writing the table in line item fashion and by radesignating the symbols by which uses are allowed according to the schedule below:

- " X " to become " A " meaning "Allowed"
- " S " not to change " S " meaning "Special Exception"
- " " to become " N " meaning "Not Allowed"

Complete text of 1991 Zoning Ballot Items

#### AMENDMENT NO. 5

AMEND Article V. Section 5.03 by adding a new section, 5.03B.2. Home Business Office, to allow home business office in the R District subject to certain criteria, the new section in its entirety to read as follows:

- " 5.03 Accessory Uses: The following accessory uses may be allowed subject to the requirements herein. All accessory uses require a Certificate of Occupancy,
  - A. Home Occupation as exists
  - B. 1. Home Office as exists
    - 2. Home Business Office: A home business office located within a single family detached dwelling is allowed in the R District subject to the following:
      - a. use does not require the customer to go to the business office:
      - b. use is an accessory use, in accordance with the definition under 3.52;
      - c. use does not change the character of the dwelling;
      - d. use does not require on-site visible inventory;
      - e. no signs are permitted for this use;
      - f. use is carried out within the dwelling or accessory structure:
      - g. use employs not more than one person not resident on the premises; and
      - h. use does not cause any additional vehicular traffic between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
  - C. Home Shop as exists "

### AMENDMENT NO. 6

AMEND Article XI, Section 11.03 to allow the Planning Board to review and approve a subdivision in its entirety, permitting the development of no more than 9 lots per year, to read in its entirety as follows:

" 11.03 Regulations: During any building year, the Candia Planning Board has the authority to review and approve a aubdivision in its entirety. Limitations on development of lots, currently 9 per year, shall be administered through the building permit process by the Building Inspector.

For the purpose of this regulation, lot shall mean lot. plat, site. or other division of land for the purpose of sale. rant, lease, condominium conveyance of building development. "

### AMENDMENT NO. 7

AMEND Article XIII. Section 13.06A to loosen the requirements for location of neighborhood businesses and professional offices by adding to section 13.06A.1. by deleting sections 13.06A.2 and 13.06A.3. and by adding a new section 13.06A.3, to read in its entirety as follows:

## " 13.06A: Specific Special Exception Uses:

- A. Neighborhood Businesses and Professional Offices in Residential Districts: Those commercial uses identified in Section 5.02B and 5.03B of this Ordinance and specifically referring to this section may be permitted as Special Exceptions in the Residential District provided that:
  - Such uses shall be located on an arterial street as designated in Article III or any other major street if a need for such use can be established due to a density of population in the area.
  - Such uses shall have not an enclosed floor area in excass of 2000 square feet.
  - Such uses shall not change the character of the neighborhood. "

#### AMENDMENT NO. 8

ALLOW the Planning Board to make necessary changes in format, numbering, titles, etc., to properly incorporate these amendments into the ordinance without changing their substance or meaning.

#### AMENDMENT NO. 9

REPLACE existing Article II of the Building Code, Section 2.03. Fee Schedule, with proposed Section 2.03, as follows:

### " Section 2.03 FEE SCHEDULE

#### A. Structures

- 1. Residential minimum fee of \$15.00
  - a. New dwelling: Nine cents (.09) per square foot of finished living area. Six cents (.06) per square foor of unfinished floor and cellar floor area.
  - b. Remodelling: Five cents (.05) per square foor of remodelled or added finished living space. Three cents (.03) per square foot of unfinished added floor space including cellar.
  - c. Accessory structures, whether attached or detached, such as garage, breezeway, shed, barn: Four cents (.04) per square foot of floor area.
- 2. Commercial and Industrial minimum fee of \$35.00
  - a. New atructure: Fifteen cents (.15) per square foot of total floor area including cellar.
  - b. Remodelled structure: Same as for a new structure.
  - c. Accessory structure: Same as for a new structure.

### 3. Other

- a. Building permit renewal: Fifty percent (50%) of the original fee.
- b. Re-do inspections : Twenty dollars (\$20.00) each.

# B. Other Permits

- Fuel Permits: Five dollars (\$5.00) for each inspection of power burners, fireplaces, furnace or oil tank installations.
- 2. Driveway Permits: Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for each driveway permit (includes inspection).
- 3. Certificates of Occupancy:
  - a. with a building permit no fee
  - b. for use or change in use Thirty-five dollars (\$35.00)
  - c. for temporary use of manufactured housing Thirty-five dollars (\$35.00)
- Electrical upgrade or new service entrance Thirty-five dollars (\$35.00).
- 5. Sign permits Fifteen dollars (S15.00). "

### AMENDMENT NO. 10

AMEND Article III of the Candia Building Code by replacing the entire article with a revised building code for residential construction, consisting of the 1989 CABO One and Two Family Dwelling Code, with amendments, deletions and/or changes.

# AMENDMENT NO. 11 (citizen petition)

" Are you in favor of amending the Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Candia to rezone the real estate known and described as Tax Map 413. lot 85.3, being situated on Old Route 101, to the Commercial Zone (Article IV) instead of its present residential zone? "

A copy of the petition and a vicinity map are available for public inspection at the Land Use Office.

## AMENDMENT NO. 12 (citizen petition)

- " Amend Section 5.01 by adding a new subsection, 5.01E as follows:
  - 5.01E Economy Apartments Any single family dwelling existing on the effective date of this section may be converted to add a second dwelling unit on the following conditions as determined by the Building Inspector:
    - a. there shall be only one bedroom in the second dwelling unit.
    - b. there shall be no exterior alterations to the dwelling
    - except as necessary to ensure safe access.

      c. on-site perking for one additional vehicle shall be provided. "

# AMENDMENT NO. 13 (citizen petition)

"Amend Section 14.03 -- Planning Board Review of Site Plans -- by deleting it in its entirety. "

Adoption of 1989 CABO One and Two Family Dwelling Code with the following changes, deletions, additions:

# Add a Section 103.1 to read as follows:

"103.1 Ordinary repairs excluded: Application or notice to the code official is not required for ordinary repairs to structures when repairs do not include the cutting of any structural beam or bearing support, or the removal or change of any required means of egress, or rearrangement of parts of a structure affecting the exit requirements. However, any work done to one and two family dwellings shall be in accordance with the provisions of this code, whether or not a permit is required."

Change Section R-106.3 so that the word "misdemeanor" in the second sentence is changed to the word "violation"; and in the next-to-last sentence and last sentence delete the reference to imprisonment so that Section R106.3 will read as follows:

"R-106.3 Penalty: Any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this code shall be guilty of a violation and each auch person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this code is committed, continued, or permitted, and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punishable by a fine as established by applicable laws."

# Add a Section R-107.1 to read as follows:

"R-107.1 Board of appeals: A Building Code Board of Appeals is hereby established to include five members and two alternate members. Membership shall be by appointment by the Board of Selectmen and shall consist of the fire chief or his designes, a selectman, and three residents of the Town. Appointees of the three residents and alternates shall be filled by a majority of those possessing education and experience in architecture, engineering, and the building trades, and who are qualified by experience and training to pass upon technical questions related to building construction."

Change Section R-109.3 to allow twelve months from the date of issue for commencement of work under a building permit, to allow 24 months for completion of work, and to provide for re-issuance of an expired permit at ten percent of the coat of the original permit fee so that Section 109.3 will read as follows:

"R-109.3 Expiration: Every permit issued by the building official under the provisions of this code shall expire by limitation and become null and void if the building or work authorized by such permit is not commenced within twelve months from the issue date of the permit, or if the building or work authorized by such permit is not completed within 24 months of commencement. Before work can by resumed, a new permit shall be obtained to do so, and the fee therefore, shall be ten percent of the amount required for a new permit for such work, provided no changes have been made in the original plans and specifications for such work; and provided further that such suspensions or abandonment has not exceeded six months.

A permittee holding an unexpired permit may apply for a one-time extension, provided he can show good and satisfactory reasons, and beyond his control, the work cannot be commenced within the twelve month period from the issue date. This provision shall supersede any provisions of the Zoning Ordinance relating to commencement of work on one and two family dwelling units, permit expiration, and fees where there has been no change in the plans and specifications for which the original permit was issued."

Change Section R-110 by adding to the title "and Plot Plan"; by eliminating reference to "drawn to scale"; and by eliminating the entire second aentence of the section, so that Section R-110 will read as follows:

### "SECTION R-110 - PLANS AND PLOT PLANS

When required by the building official, plans shall be of sufficient clarity to indicate the nature and extent of the work proposed and shall show in detail that it will conform to the provisions of this code and all relevant laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations."

Change Section R-111 by deleting the reference for a lath and wallboard inspection, by adding an insulation inspection, and by clarifying other portions of this Section so that Section R-111 will read as follows:

### "SECTION R-111 - INSPECTION

R-111.1 Types of inspections: For on-site construction, from time to time the building official, upon notification from the permit holder or his agent, shall make or cause to be made any necessary inspections and shall either approve that portion of the construction as completed or shall notify the permit holder or his agent wherein the same fails to comply with this code. All inspections are included as part of the building permit fee. However, in the event that an inspection fails, there shall be a re-inspection fee of twenty dollars.

- R-111.1.1 Foundation inspection: The foundation inspection shall include excavations for thickened slabs intended for the support of bearing walls, partitions, structural supports, or equipment and special requirements for wood foundations.
- R-111.1.2 Plumbing, mechanical, electrical, and rough framing: Rough inspection: Commonly made prior to covering or concealment, after fixtures are set.
- R-111.1.3 Masonry inspection: Masonry shall be inspected in the following sequences: For a fireplace At footing, above the smoke chamber, before cap, and after cap. For a chimney At footing, just, above thimble entrance, before cap, and after cap.
- R-111.1.4 Insulation: Insulation shall be installed according to manufacturers specifications and in accordance with the approval granted by the State Energy Office. The building official shall inspect insulation to determine compliance with the State Engergy Office approval.
- R-111.1.5 Other inspections: In addition to the called inspections above, the building department may make or require any other inspections to ascertain compliance with this code and other laws enforced by the building department.
- R-115.1.6 Final inspection: Commonly made after the building is completed and ready for occupancy."

Change Section R-114 by deleting the phrase "provided such continued use is not dangerous to life", so that Section R-114 will read as follows:

### "SECTION R-114 - EXISTING INSTALLATIONS

Buildings and structures in existence at the time of the adoption of this code may have their existing use continued if such use was legal at the time of the adoption of this code."

<u>Change Section R-205</u> ceiling height by adding to the permitted exceptions so that Exceptions in Section R-205 reads as follows:

### "Exceptions

- Beams and girders spaced not less than 4 feet on center may project not more than 6 inches below the required ceiling height.
- All other rooms including kitchens, baths, and hallways may have a ceiling height of not less than 7 feet measured to the lowest projection from the ceiling.
- 3. Ceiling height in basements with habitable spaces may be not less than 6 feet 8 inches clear except for under beams, girders, ducts, or other obstructions where the clear height shall be 6 feet 4 inches.
- 4. In colonial reproduction construction, ceiling heights maybe 7 feet two inches in all other rooms, not included in #2 above.
- 5. In additions and remodeling of existing construction, ceiling heights may be 7 feet where existing ceiling heights do not exceed 7 feet."

Change Section R-206 to add the word "new" before dwelling unit in the first two sentences so that Section R-206 reads as follows:

### "SECTION R-206 - SANITATION

Every new dwelling unit shall be provided with a water closet, lavatory, and a bathtub or shower.

Each new dwelling unit shall be provided with a kitchen area and every kitchen area shall be provided with a sink of approved nonabaorbent material.

All plumbing fixtures shall be connected to a sanitary sewer or to an approved private sewage disposal system. All plumbing fixtures shall be connected to an approved system of water supply and provided with hot and cold running water, except water closets, may be provided with cold water only."

Change Section R-209 to add the requirement for a one-hour fire-rated door with automatic closure and to require 5/8-inch x sheetrock so that Section R-209.1 and 209.2 read as follows:

"R-209.1 Opening protection: Openings from a private garage directly into a room used for sleeping purposes shall not be permitted. Other openings between the garage and residence shall be equipped with solid wood doors with a fire rating not less than one hour and with an automatic closer.

R-209.2 Separation required: The garage shall be completely separated from the residence and its attic area by means of 5/8-inch x gypsum board or equivalent applied to the garage side."

<u>Change Section R-211</u> by adding exceptions to permit doors under 6 feet 8 inches so that Section R-211 reads as follows:

### "SECTION R-211 - DOORS AND HALLWAYS

The required exit door shall be a side-hinged door and not less than 3 feet in width and 6 feet 8 inches in height.

The minimum width of a hallway or exit access shall be not less than 3 feet.

### Exceptions:

- In colonial reproductions, the minimum door height may be 6 feet 4 inches.
- 2. In remodeling existing construction, door heights may be 6 feet 4 inches where necessary to meet existing conditions."

Change Section R-305.1 by deleting from the second sentence the phrase "into an approved drainage system" and substitute with the phrase "as may be necessary" so that the second sentence of R-305.1 reads as follows:

"Drainage tiles, gravel or crushed stone drains, perforated pipe or other approved systems or materials shall be installed at or below the area to be protected and shall discharge by gravity or mechanical means as may be necessary."

<u>Change Section R-305.1</u> by deleting the exception relating to Group 1 solls in its entirety.

Change Section R-402.1 to make provision for native lumber so that the following sentence is added to Section R-402.1 stating as follows:

"Nothing in this part shall prohibit the use of native lumber, whether or not graded."

Section R-503.7 is deleted in its entirety.

<u>Change Section R-602.1</u> to make provision for native lumber so that the following sentence is added to Section R-602.1 stating as follows:

"Nothing in this part shall prohibit the use of native lumber, whether or not graded."

Change Section R-702.1 to make provision for native lumber so that the following sentence is added to Section R-702.1 stating as follows:

"Nothing in this part shall prohibit the use of native lumber, whether or not graded."

Change Section R-803.2 and R-803.3 to make the use of 15 lb. felt paper optional, by adding a requirement for self-sealing ice and water shield, and by deleting the existing first paragraph of Saction 803.3, so that the revised sections are combined and will read in their entirety as follows:

"R-803.2 Slopes: Slopes of 4 inches in 12 inches or greater, and slopes leas than 4 inches in 12 inches but not less than 2 inches in 12 inches: Asphalt shingle roofs may have an underlayment of not less than one ply of No. 15 felt, applied as required in Section R-802. The application of ice and water shield over any heated space shall be required, and shall be applied 1 inch below where the drip edge is fastened, and extend a distance of three feet upward along the plane of the roof. Asphalt shingles shall not be used on roofs with slopes less than 2 inches in 12 inches. In all cases, installation of asphalt shingles shall be in accordance with manufacturer's specifications."

Change Table 903.1 to require that the chimney cap shall be of Portland Cement and waterproofed.

Change Section M-1103 to strike reference to approval by the building official wherever it appears and substitute the phrase "in accordance with manufacturer's specifications", so that Section M-1103 reads as follows:

### "SECTION M-1103 - TYPE OF FUEL - FUEL CONNECTION

Each appliance shall be designed for use with the type of fuel to which it will be connected. Such appliances shall not be converted from the fuel specified on the rating plate for use with a different fuel unless recommended by the manufacturer of either the original equipment or the conversion equipment. The service gas supplier may convert appliances only in accordance with the manufacturer's specifications."

Add to Section M-1304, #3 the words "without exception" so that M-1304, #3, reads as follows:

"3. under a stairway, without exception."

Change Section M-1504 so that the words "or any solid-fueled appliance" is added to the last sentence of exceptions so that the last sentence of exceptions reads as follows:

"Appliances shall not be vented into a fireplace or into a chimney serving a fireplace, or any solid-fueled appliance."

Add to Section M-1516.1 a final sentence to state the following:

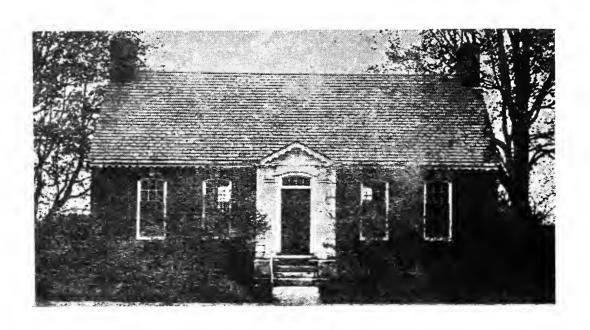
"Connectors used by solid fuel-burning appliances shall not be shared with any other appliance."

Chapters 20 through 25, inclusive, and Appendices D and E are deleted from this code so long as these requirements are covered by mandated State codes.

# Add a new provision as follows:

"Whenever the requirements of this code conflict with the provisions of any other lawfully-adoped code or ordinance, the most restrictive or higher standards will apply."

Submitted by petition of 26 registered voters.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to elect the Town Building Inspector by ballot under RSA 41:2 and RSA 669:17 VIII, effective at the 1991 annual meeting, to perform all the functions of the building inspector by statute and ordinance. Submitted by patition of 56 registered voters.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to require that, effective immediately, only residents of the Town of Candia may serve as building inspector. Submitted by petition of 54 registered voters.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to rescind all previous votes authorizing the Planning Board to review site plans under RSA 674:43 or the former statute RSA 36:19-a. The Town Clerk shall file a certificate with the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds showing this withdrawal of site plan review authority and the date of the vote. Submitted by petition of 53 registered voters.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town of Candia will vote to not expend any monies derived from any source for Town Legal Fees in the Excess of (\$10,000) Ten Thousand Dollars in any one Fiscal year unless such funds are requested by a special Town Meeting for that particular exceptional need. Submitted by petition of 25 registered veters.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to provide tax abatements to families who chose to send their high school students to a high school that does not bill the Town for education tuition.

### FORMAT:

1. The total amount of the abstement shall be \$2,000.00 per student. The Town is currently billed approximately \$6,000.00 per student by Manchester and Raymond; students who attend other schools will save the Town \$4,000.00.

- 2. Individuals seeking an abatement must provide the Town with the following information:
  - Name and address of the student whose tuition has been paid.
  - B. Proof that the student is resident of the Town of Candia.
  - C. Proof of tuition payment.
- 3. Individuals, who sponsor students who transfer from a public high school system to a private high school system during the same school year, will have any abatements if granted prorated according to the number of weeks the student is enrolled in the private high school system.

ARTICLE 10. WHEREAS, Although the right of free expression is part of the foundation of the United States Constitution, very carefully drawn limits on expression in specific instances have long been recognized as legitimate means of maintaining public safety and decency, as well as orderliness and productive value of public debate; and

WHEREAS, There are symbols of our nation such as the Washington Monument, the United States Capital Building, memorials to our greatest leaders, and our flag, which are the property of every American and are therefore worthy of protection from desecration and dishonor; and

WHEREAS, The law as interpreted by the United States Supreme Court no longer accords to the flag the reverence, respect, and dignity to which it is entitled: and

WHEREAS, It is only fitting that people everywhere should join in a forceful call for the restoration of the flag to its proper station under law and decency;

That the voters of the Town of Candis respectfully request the Congress of the United States to propose an amendment of the United States Constitution, for ratification by the states, specifying that Congress and the states shall have the power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States. Submitted by petition of 27 registered voters.

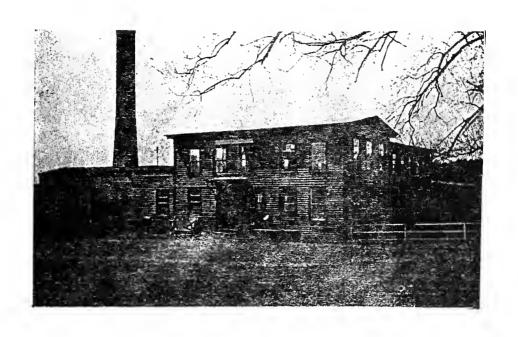

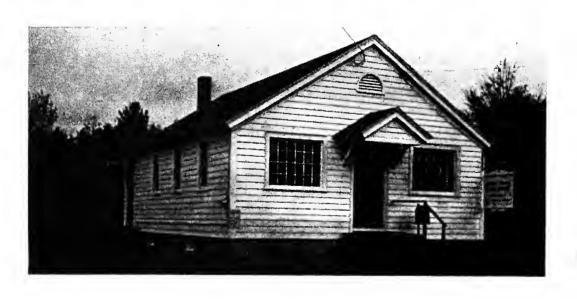

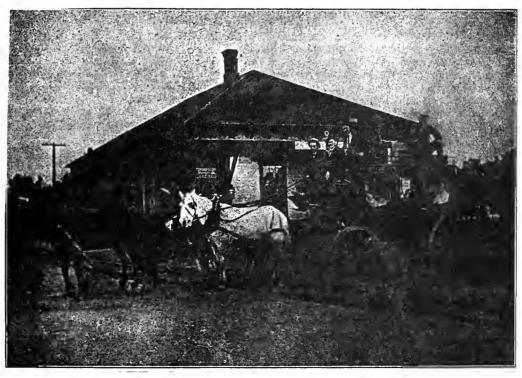

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

This Selectmen's Report will hopefully put into perspective some of the issues which have affected our Town over the past year and which will continue to require attention in the future. We will also report on the progress our Town has made which we hope will meet with your approval.

For Town Meeting in 1990, we proposed a budget that we felt was workable. Before the budget was presented, it had been cut twice and fine-tuned by the Board of Selectmen so that any cuts to that budget would mean cuts in programs or services. The budget was cut by the Town another \$99,000 which resulted in the largest cuts coming from Road Reconstruction. Solid Waste/Recycling, Police Department, Planning Board, Town Officers' Expenses, Office Building Expenses, and the Park Department also received percentage cuts.

As a result of the cut to Road Reconstruction, some much-needed repair work was postponed for another year. The Road Reconstruction line item has taken the largest cuts in the past three years. Road work is an issue that the Town will need to address in the very near future in the form of a Road Bond or some other progressive measure to reduce the Town's liability due to poor roads.

Cuts to the Solid Waste Department resulted in another year of storing incinerator ash and tires on site and postponement of a Swap Shop where "treasures" could be found by our residents. Sooner or later all ash stored on site will have to be removed meaning a considerable expense to the Town at some future date.

Cuts to Town Officers' Expenses meant that we could not upgrade the computer system to store more information. This upgrade will be necessary in 1991 since the system is almost at capacity.

Cuts to the Police Department meant no raises for the officers and no new cruiser. In order to maintain levels of covarage prior to Town Meeting, the officers volunteered to participate in their required training on their own time at no cost to the Town. This showed a real dedication to the Town and it is hoped that they will receive their planned raises in 1991. The cruiser has very high mileage and will continue to require expensive maintenance to remain safe for operation.

But hold on folks, the picture is not all gloom and doom. We are thankful that more of the budget was not cut. The Town showed its support in our recycling strategy and our efforts to repair the incinerator by approving some key warrant articles. A massive overhaul was undertaken to improve efficiency. Resident Gary York contributed his expertise as an engineer in the design of the air system and then volunteered over two hundred hours to oversee the actual repair work and subsequent start-up. Thanks Gary for a job well-done. The repair will allow us to handle the increased amounts of waste coming in at the site. It is hoped that with the approval of funds for the 1991 completion of these repairs, the life of our incinerator will be prolonged another ten years. We also received a matching grant for the purchase of a baler so that cardboard will be recycled in 1991 along with newspapers. Plastic will be next on our recycling agenda.

A smooth transition was made in our Welfare Department from Gale Stanley to Pattie Davis. Gale was a tough act to follow but Pattie is proving herself to be up to the task.

The Revaluation of the Town continues at this time with completion expected in November of 1991. While a very limited number of residents are refusing entry to the appraisers, most are cooperating. Cooperation means a lower total cost to the Town.

Although construction has slowed, efforts in Code Enforcement have been successful. Under the direction of Building Inspector Ron Caswell and ably supported by Selectman Neil Sieminski, a new level of professionalism and fairness has been achieved in the Building Department.

Another area of progress was found in Parks & Recreation. With the tireless efforts of CYAA members and certain other volunteers, the Park received a pavilion donated by Paul Vallee. This pavilion is a donation to the Town for all citizens to enjoy. The CYAA membership also paid for and installed a basketball court for organized and unorganized play. The completion of this court will be in the Spring of 1991. Thank you again to all members of the CYAA who worked so hard to make this program the success that it is.

Due to a judgement that was awarded in an Animal Control case last year, the Board of Selectmen undertook to make sure that all dogs in the Town were licensed and violations address. This was done for the safety of our residents and it is our hope that all dog owners will cooperate with us in 1991. This is the first time in recent memory that an operation of this magnitude was undertaken and we received almost 98 percent compliance.

When it came to our attention that there might be surplus State-owned land in Town, Neil and newly-elected Selectmen Brien Brock, along with Karl Schwalb of the Economic Development Committee, met with State officials to further the Town's quest to acquire this land. It is hoped that the acquisition of this land will be useful in developing the industrial land that was decimated by the new highway.

New developments were taking place with the Fitts Museum with the endorsement of the Museum's application for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. Thanks to former Selectman Don Coleman, Chris Closs, and others including the Museum Trustees, the Fitts Museum Foundation was instituted to further the development of one of the Town's proudest treasures.

The Smyth Library has also received a great deal of support from the Friends of the Library. Progress is being made to enlarge and enhance this valuable resource.

Mother Nature was not too cooperative on Old Home Day last year but the Committee endeevored to persevere despite the cancellation of the parade and the postponement to the following day. Thanks to all who helped to make it the best that it could be. And thanks also to the Volunteer Firefighters who fought valiantly to retain their Softball Champion status. But alas, under the able supervision of Coach Brien Brock (and the umpiring expertise of Neil Sieminski), the Town prevailed for the first time. We hope we can do it again this year!

Thanks to our office personnel, including Diane LaCombe, Judy Lacombe, and Gail Wilson, who did a fine job of running the Town when we Selectmen were not available. A Town Administrator would be nice, but the dedication shown by these three individuals kept us going through another hectic year.

Thanks also to our Recycling Center personnel, including Earl Hardy, Karen Walton, and Bob Ecenarro, who all plugged away at a sometimes unpleasant job. It takes a special kind of person to work at our site and still maintain some level of sanity. Earl was hired this past year and has proven to be a most able choice with his background in Navy engineering. Karen and Bob have made sure that the Town continues to make money at recycling. And thanks to you, the residents, whose cooperation has been an integral part in making it work.

Finally, thanks to all members of boards and committees whose dedication and volunteerism made government of the Town of Candia a possibility. These include the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Incinerator Committee, Codes Review Committee, and Economic Development Committee.

With the upcoming new year, there is concern that the economic downturn will cause problems for us as a community. But no matter what happens, the Board of Selectmen hope to be able to aerve you and halp in any way possible to make Town Government a true reflection of your wishes and commands.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

1990 was another quiet year for the Board of Adjustment. We heard only eleven appeals.

At an administrative appeal regarding personal use of a radio tower, the board reversed a decision of the Building Inspector. All five variance requests were granted. Two were for use of substandard lots as residences. One was to legitimize structures in a set-back and one was to allow an addition in a set-back. Another was to allow one extra unit in a residential cluster development.

Two Special Exceptions were denied. One was to legitimize an apartment in a garage and the other was for a business in a residence. We approved Special Exceptions to legitimize Charmingfare Farm and to allow an oversized sign at Birchwood Plaza.

At our first ever joint hearing with the Planning Board we allowed a change in our original Special Exception for a horse stable on New Boston Road.

With regret, we accepted the resignation of board member Michael Ipavec who served as Vice Chairman on the ZBA for two years.

The Board of Adjustment usually meets on the third Thursday of the month. Anyone wishing more information about appeals to our board is welcome to call or visit Judy Lacombe at the Land Use Office, 483-8588, during regular office hours.

#### REPORT OF THE BUILDING CODE REVIEW COMMITTEE

At the present time in Candia, when a single family or two family house is constructed, the Building Inspector is required by State Law to enforce the BOCA Plumbing Code and National Electrical Code. These codes provide for the uniform application of plumbing and electrical systems and provide minimum standards for health and life safety to the extent of the coverage of these codes—However, when it comes to other elements of the construction of the house, many of which involve life safety and structural considerations, the current Candia code only states that construction standards shall be in accordance with "acceptable practice".

Because the phrase "acceptable practice" leaves much to the imagination, and because many of the elements of a building involve important structural and life/fire safety considerations, and recognizing the need to provide for uniform minimum standards, the Code Review Committee was formed.

Members of the Committee include Fire Chief Leonard Wilson, Deputy Fire Chief Dean Young, Rick Swain, Steve Tur, Mike Santa, Mark Hardy, Bob Baker, and Selectman Neil Sieminski who also acted as a recording secretary. The Code Committee has, throughout the year, worked on a building code for residential construction in the Town of Candia. With a lot of effort and hard work, the Code Committee has prepared a building code that the committee as a whole endorses. This building code is for the structural requirements of one and two family dwellings and would replace the existing section in the Building Code for residential construction, if adopted by the Town.

Key elements of the proposed code are:

- It would not be retroactive to any existing construction.
- It provides flexibility in blending new construction, such as additions to older structures, so that both are compatible.
- It loosens certain requirements for the issuance of building permits.
- 4. It provides for the establishment of a technical Code Board of Appeals to resolve questions of interpretation between homeowners/contractors and the Building Inspector. (This is also intended to provide fairness and flexibility in application of the codes.)

In summary, the Code Review Committee spent hundreds of volunteer hours in developing a code which is endorsed by the Committee as whole, and which should serve to meet the needs of all concerned.

Many thanks to all of the members of the Committee for their time, dedication, and attention to this large task.

#### REPORT OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR/CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

Building activity was on the down side in 1990 with a total of 71 permits issued. New construction included two commercial building permits and seven permits for new homes. There were nine permits issued for residential garages, six for residential additions, two for barns, twelve for accessory sheds, twelve for decks, two for gazebos, one for a well house, two for pools, eight permits for remodeling, six porches, two breezeways, two chimneys, one basketball court, one tennis court, with the remaining ten for electrical service upgrades.

A system of inspection records is now fully in place which allows the public to acrutinize the activities of the Building Department on any individual case. This system of written inspection reports also allows the Town to follow progress on any permit.

Throughout the past year, the building department has worked hard in ways to better its services to the citizens of Candia. It has kept up with all of the new 1990 changes in electrical and plumbing codes to assure that work done for residents is in accordance with these new changes, many of which are in the area of life safety. The Building Department has also worked with the Fire Department in situations involving fire safety.

In addition to processing applications and making inspections, the Building Inspector is charged with enforcing the Zoning Ordinance and all regulations used by Candia's land use boards in processing applications for subdivision, site plan review, variance requests, and spacial exceptions.

One aim for 1990 was the cleanup of junk cars scattered throughout Candia. Since State Law has changed making it possible to enforce the Zoning Ordinance through District Court instead of Superior Court, it has been possible to achieve compliance with the Ordinance for a minimal filing fee with the court. In these instances, the services of our Town Counsel are not needed, so compliance is reached at a low expense to the Town. It is hoped that the cleanup of excessive junk vehicles will compliment the Town's efforts in stimulating new commercial investment.

As a result of code enforcement, some long-standing violations have been corrected through the appeal process of the Board of Adjustment. Other violations remain outstanding and are being pursued in court. In general, code enforcement has resulted in a greater awareness of the Zoning Ordinance.

The Building Department looks forward to continuing a professional level of service to the citizens of Candia, with an approach which attempts to be impartial and reasonable, while providing technical assistance to overcome problems.

#### REPORT OF CANDIA RESCUE - 1990

IN 1990, WE PURCHASED CPR MANIKINS SO THAT CANDIA RESIDENTS COULD ASSIST US IN PROVIDING PROMPT MEDICAL ASSISTANCE IN THE CASE OF CARDIAC ARREST. ANYONE INTERESTED IN LEARNING CPR SHOULD CONTACT RESCUE PERSONNEL. GIVEN THE ECONOMIC CLIMATE, THE ORIGINAL CARDIAC MONITOR UNIT THAT WAS PURCHASED LAST YEAR WAS RETURNED AND A MORE COMPLETE, WARRANTEED USED UNIT WAS PURCHASED INSTEAD. THIS AMOUNTED TO A TOTAL SAVINGS OF APPROIMATEDLY \$3500.00 OF THE TOTAL COST FOR A COMPLETE, NEW UNIT.

CANDIA RESCUE PROVIDES 24 HOUR COVERAGE FOR MEDICAL AID REQUESTS AND ALL EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS AND FIRST RESPONDERS ARE VOLUNTEERS. DURING 1990, RESCUE MEMBERS HAVE CONTINUED TO UPGRADE THEIR SKILLS TO PROVIDE BETTER MEDICAL CARE TO CANDIA RESIDENTS. ALL TRAINING SESSIONS AND COURSES TAKEN ARE ALL TAKEN ON MEMBERS' TIME AND THE ONLY COST IS THE ACTUAL COURSE FEES.

WE WOULD ONCE AGAIN LIKE TO THANK THE RESIDENTS OF CANDIA FOR YOUR CONTINUED SUPPORT. WE WOULD ALSO LIKE TO THANK THE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT, CANDIA POLICE DEPARTMENT AND DEREK'S AMBULANCE SERVICE FOR THEIR CONTINUED SUPPORT IN 1990.

# REPORT OF THE CANDIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Candia Volunteer Fire Bepartment responded to 101 calls in 1990. These responses are broken down as follows: 36 vehicular accidents. 10 mutual aid calls, 8 fire alarm activations. 6 chimney fires. 6 vehicle fires, 6 wires fires, 6 good intent calls, 5 prush fires. 4 assist the rescue. 3 smoke investigations, 2 propane leaks, 2 lllegal burns, 1 structure fire. 1 electrical fire. 1 mattress fire. 1 boiler maltunction. 1 haz-mat incident, 1 search and 1 assist the police.

The Fire Department is proud to announce that four members successfully completed State of New Hampshire Firefighter Level 1 Certification and one other member successfully completed Career Level Certification, the third of four levels of qualification in the State of New Hampshire. These above certifications are done over-and above regular Fire Department training on their own time evenings and weekends.

In 1990 the Fire Department applied for and received a one time Energy Grant from the State of New Hampshire Governor's Energy Office for energy conservation improvements. Work done at the Fire Station included all new replacement windows and storms, improvements to the heating and hot water systems, new and increased insulation. Over and above the Energy Grant measures, the Fire Department did extensive other work to the building and property which included rebuilding both stairways, refinishing the meeting hall floor, completion of the building exterior and paving. The Candia Fire Station is one of several buildings in town that the citizens can be very proud of and are always welcome in.

The Officers and Members of the Candia Volunteer Fire Department wish to express our sincerest thanks to the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Ladies Auxiliary for their continued support both financially and morally.

The Officers and Members of the Candia Volunteer Fire Department also wish to express our grateful appreciation for the support shown us by the citizens of the Town of Candia in the past year. We look forward to your continued support and cooperation in the future.

#### REPORT OF THE CANDIA YOUTH ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Candia Youth Athletic Association (CYAA) was formed to provide the children of Candia, N.H. with athletic and social activities that will promote healthy bodies, keen minds and fairminded competitive attitudes, thus enabling them to prepare for productive adult lives as citizens of their community, state and nation.

At the present time, CYAA offers three different sports for children: Baseball, Soccer and Basketball. Approximately 40% of Candia's youth participate in these sports. This can be compared to a 20%-30% participation rate in surrounding areas such as Exeter and Manchester. For an average fee of \$18.00 per child per sport, players receive at least 30 hours of interaction. CYAA is proud to provide such high value to its community's children. The Board of Directors, Coaching Staff and other volunteers are committed to promoting sportsmanship, skill development, the competitive spirit and most of all FUK.

Funding of CYAA comes internally from registration fees, concession stand income and creative fundraising like the Cow Chips, Jail and Bail and Trade Show. These monies are then used to: defray Town expenses at Moore Park, maintain and upgrade park facilities, update team equipment and uniforms, cover all insurance costs and offer in-service training programs for the volunteer coaching staff.

In the past two years, CYAA has successfully completed the following major projects at Moore Fark: a new bathroom facility, new field lighting, new bleachers, rennovation of concession stand and equipment room, the installation of a baseball batting cage and proper field maintainence for Grade A Certification Play. #### REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission would like to thank our voters for the adoption of our article which allows the Commission to retain our unexpended balance of funds and place it into a conservation fund. The creation of this fund gives the Town, as a whole, an opportunity to acquire additional conservation land. Conserving our land today will benefit all of us tomorrow. The Conservation Commission looks forward to seeing this fund grow and any gifts of money or conservation easements will be greatly appreciated.

We continue to look for ways to improve the Town Forest on Flint Road and the forty acres off from Old Boston Road. Trails have been widened and cleared to make it easier for all residents to use. Your support for these projects are welcome.

Some laws that have been passed in 1990 which might be of interest are listed below:

- 1. HB 1339 requires public utilities to offer landowners the option of the utility's cutting vegetation at the landowner's expense instead of their using herbicides to clear and maintain utility rights-of-way.
- 2. HB 746 establishes a task force on solid waste reduction and recycling and authorizes a privately-funded study thereon.
- 3. HB 1427 requires the Department of Environmental Services to adopt rules on the maximum allowable contamination in plastics using the recycling logo to indicate recyclable material to ensure that such plastics are indeed recyclable.

I feel these are steps in the right direction and hope we continue to seek new ways to protect our planet.

The Conservation Commission meets every third Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at the Town Office Building. Meetings are open to the public and we encourage you to attend.

#### HEALTH OFFICERS' REPORT TOWN OF CANDIA

I would like to take this opportunity to briefly outline the duties and responsibilities of a health officer.

In New Hampshire, health officers are appointed by the Director of the Division of Public Health usually following the recommendation of the town selectmen. It is the health officer's duty, under RSA 128.5 to "enforce the public health laws and regulations and shall make such sanitary investigations as may be directed by the local board of health or as may be required by the Division of Public Health Service." Candia does not have a formal board of health but I do receive health concerns and complaints from the Selectmen, police and school but primarily from residents directly.

The public health laws and regulations are too extensive to report here but pertain to communicable disease, food sanitation, solid and hazardous waste, mobile home parks, camping areas, day care, foster care to name a few. The Department of Public Health has a staff of experts to assist the local health officers whenever necessary.

The following is a brief listing of health concerns addressed in 1990 in Candia.

#### REPORT OF THE CANDIA PLANNING BOARD - 1990

The year of 1990 was noteworthy in that the Town of Candia decided to elect its Planning Board starting in March 1991. Thus, it is possible that the Board, which has remained stable for the last 2 to 3 years, may change aignificantly next year, depending on the voting. As it happens only a few new people, 3 or 4, have shown an interest in serving on the Board, and only 1, Bill Stergios, has attended regularly to get a perspective on the activities of the Board and to become familiar with the Town's regulations and ordinances. Therefore, it has again fallen on the "veteran" members of the Board to continue serving the Town another year. There was only one change: Brien Brock replaced Neil Sieminski as the Selectmen's representative on the Board.

Fortunately, the Candia Planning Beard, like other planning boards throughout the state, has had much less to do because of the slow economy in New Hampshire during 1990. There were very few new applications to the Board regarding development proposals. We had discussed several long-term projects in the past which should be addressed in the future. However, because of the possible change in the composition of the Board after the election, we felt that atarting new projects might be a waste of time. The new Board might have a significantly different approach to Town planning. Therefore, in between processing those few applications we did receive, we concentrated on finishing planning projects we had already started.

#### REVISIONS AND UPDATES

As usual, much of the Board's time in January and February was devoted to work sessions, refinements, and public hearings required for the development of zoning ordinance updates. In fact, the record number of proposed changes to the ordinance, 30, resulted in considerable extra work of this nature.

As it turned out, only 13 of the 30 proposed amendments were voted in. However, one of these was the upgraded cluster zoning ordinance. Suppequently, the Board created a new set of subdivision regulations to complement the new ordinance.

A new practice was instituted this year whereby the Planning Board has a method of holding a joint hearing with the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Via this practice, the Town has a mechanism for expediting applications which come before the Planning Board and must be referred to the ZBA. We only had one opportunity to put this into practice. However, the result was an expedited approval of the Onksen horse boarding facility on the night of the joint hearing.

#### **APPROVALS**

In its review capacity, the Board approved 25 new lots in 1990. At first glance, this may appear as an increase. However, 8 of these were phases of developments previously presented to the Board. Also, 6 were lots which were only "legitimized" due to a title problem associated with the original subdivided lots. As it happens, these were sold several years ago without being properly subdivided and recorded at the Registry of Deeds.

Thus, only 11 lots were created as a result of brand new subdivision.

Thus, especially with the new elections, there is plenty of opportunity for more to participate to the betterment of the Town of Candia. The Board meets the first and third Wednesday of every month. Call 483-8588 for more information.

#### PUBLIC HEARING ATTENDANCE

As noted last year, the attendance at public hearings continues to improve. In addition, we held an open house this year which was also well attended. We hope for the continued interest of Town citizens in the planning process. It is only by this direct dialogue that the process can truly reflect the wishes of Candia's citizens, and, conversely, that the average citizen can really begin to understand the process.

### LAND USE ASSISTANT

In spite of the reduced activity coming before the Planning Board, the Land Use Assistant continues to be very busy assisting both the Town Code Enforcement Officer and the Board of Selectmen with various land use matters. This position continues its extermely worthwhile service to the Town of Candia.

#### TOWN MEETING

Again, several proposals are on the ballot, including 3 petitions, for Town Meeting this year. As always, we urge all voters to educate themselves and become well informed on the various issues. Carefully weigh all sides of each issue, and then come and cast your well-informed vote on Tuesday, March 12, 1991. #### REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Police Department has been very busy in 1990. We have been involved in several investigations that have lasted several weeks. The latest of these investigations has involved working with Bedford and Auburn Police Departments. We are currently in the court process to get a conviction for a recent burglary. Our conviction rate has been very good this year. We hope to continue to reduce the burglary rate through convictions as we have this year.

The Department received 1139 hours of training this year to keep us in line for certifications and to expand the Department capabilities to allow us to handle more of our own investigations. This is important as the other agencies we have been depending on are cutting back in the service they can supply us with. Most of the training was done on the officers own time even though it was mandatory so we would have morely available to keep the cruiser on the road.

It is a normal sign when the economy gets bad the rate of crime increases. We are proud to be able to say that in part due to the concerned effort of the members of the Department our crime rate has gone down. This is the second year in a row that our total cases is less than the year before. Last years total being 1512 cases. I know this is a small decrease but when compared to increases all around any decrease is good.

I would like to thank the members of the Department for their support this year and we look forward to being able to serve you in the coming year.

#### SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE

It was another busy year at the Candia Recycling Center as the committee addressed ways to improve the operation of the incinerator, to institute cost-cutting measures, to establish maintenance procedures, and to improve and expand recycling programs.

The combination of a failed air system and inoperative stoking ram was causing slow and incomplete burning of trash as well as excessive use of the afterburners. After researching various options, the incinerator was shut down for two weeks in November to install a completely new air system, repair the stoking ram, rebuild the doors to prevent air leaks, and repair the existing air controls. In 1991, if funds are available, inadequate electrical controls will be replaced further improving the efficiency of the new system. There will be an increased effort to provide proper maintenance on the repaired incinerator in order to avoid such extensive repairs and the costly hauling of trash to a landfill during down time. Residents can play an important part in reducing incinerator repairs by properly separating their trash. Glass and metal objects damage the inside lining (refractory) of the incinerator. Separation of recyclable glass bottles and aluminum cans is important for our recycling programs but glass-like items and metals of all kinds except food cans must also be removed to avoid costly repairs. The Board of Selectmen are sending warning letter to residents found not separating correctly.

Besides helping the environment, the recycling programs at the Center continue to be a cost effective method of disposal although theft, a problem at ours and many other recycling facilities, reduced battery and non-ferrous scrap metal income. \$6,349.00 was returned to the town from the sale of recyclables, up from \$3,747.00 in 1989. Because recycling means that the landfilling of 131 tons of glass and metals and the incineration of 15 tons of newspaper was avoided, the town saved over \$11,000.00 in avoided costs for a net savings of over \$17,500.00. A detail of recycling income appears at the end of this report. In Candia recycling does pay! Newspaper and tire recycling do not provide income nor does composting but an improvement in composting procedures will provide residents with lots of free compost this apring. A \$5,000.00 grant from New Hampshire the Beautiful plus \$5,000.00 matched by the town will be used to purchase a baler for cardboard. Corrugated cardboard recycling, due to begin in the spring, will reduce the volume of trash to be incinerated and, if current market prices hold, will return income to the town.

New sticker permits were available all year from the Town Clerk when vehicles were registered. The old oval red bumper sticker is no longer valid. If you do not have a new sticker, contact the Selectmen's Office because no one will be allowed to use the Center without one. Residents cooperation in obtaining and displaying the new sticker permit will help us to monitor users, not so much to allow residents in as to keep nonresidents out. None of us should have to pay the cost of burning other town's trash.

The two full-time employees of the Center, Operator Earl Hardy and Assistant Operator/Recycling Coordinator Karen Walton, took and passed state mandated operator training courses.

The committee members continue to keep informed on solid waste issues by attending workshops, visiting other facilities, reading publications, and talking "trash" to anyone who will listen. We have a new member this year, Gary York and welcome anyone interested to join the committee or attend meetings which are usually the 2nd and 4th Thursday nights every month.

Special thank go to Paul Vallee and Ron Severino for volunteering time and equipment.

The Solid Waste Committee and the staff at the Center appreciate the support townspeople have given to our efforts to improve the operation of the Candia Recycling Center.

#### REPORT OF THE WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The Town of Candia, through its Welfare Department, offers temporary assistance for basic needs. It is operated under specific State and Town guidelines which regulate the expenditure of monies.

This year, Candia assisted twenty-eight (28) families which translated to sixty-six (66) people. Assistance took the form of clothing, food, fuel, medicine, shelter, and repair work. Candia is fortunate to have an active clothing exchange and Food Pantry (which accepts donations of food and monies year-round).

We are also lucky to have a caring and generous town. At Thanksgiving and Christmas over fifty (50) families received food baskets, clothing, holiday wreaths, and gifts. I wish to extend a special thanks to the families, local companies, Jr. Women's Club, Lions Club, and the Boy and Girl Scouts who made donations of time, services, food, and shelter.

If you need assistance or can offer assistance, you can be leave a message for me with the Selectmen's Office during their regular office hours (8:00 to 3:00).

Hank Dufresne, President, CEO Derek's Ambulance Service Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. (RCCAP) is a private, non-profit corporation. Our mission is to serve the multitude of needs of Rockingham County's low-income residents by assisting them in coping with the hardships of poverty, giving them the tools to lift themselves out of poverty and seeking to eradicate the root causes of poverty. RCCAP has been addressing these needs for more than twenty-five years.

The Greater Raymond Community Action Center is an outreach office of RCCAP which serves residents of Candia and 14 other communities, and as such acts as Candia's central resource for information regarding all available human services. RCCAP also offers intake, clinic and distribution sites in over half of the county's thirty-seven communities for the application and provision of various Community Action services.

Community Action provides a wide range of services which are unduplicated elsewhere in the county. Most of these services meet immediate, critical needs and all have a direct and positive impact on people's lives. The following services were provided by Community Action to eligible residents of Candia from July 1, 1989 through June 30, 1990:

56 households received Fuel Assistance, a program which provided a financial grant of up to \$450 to assist with energy-related expenses.

B homes were weatherized through the Weatherization Program, which provides high quality materials and trained labor to weatherize homes in order to reduce heating costs and conserve energy.

- 11 children were provided meals from private family day care homes which participate in the Rockingham Family Day Care Program.
- 1 child care referral was arranged through the Child Care Resource and Referral Program, which compiles current data on all available child care options, provides child care referrals to employees of participating companies as well as to the general public, and expands the supply of quality child care by recruiting, training and assisting new providers.
- 1 child was enrolled in Head Start, a comprehensive early childhood development program designed to meet the needs of low-income and handicapped children and their families.

19 women, infants and children received help through the WIC Program, which offers supplemental nutritious foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding support and health care referrals to pregnant women, nursing mothers, infants and children up to the age of five.

106 food packages were provided through the Surplus Food Program, which distributes USDA surplus food to eligible households through periodic mass distributions.

2 households received Crisis Assistance, a program which provided a one-time financial grant for the payment of rent, mortgage, electricity or fuel for those in emergency situations.

2 children were enrolled in Camp Sebago, a week-long overnight summer camp for low-income children between the ages of 7 and 12.

In addition to these major programs, much of our staff time is devoted to working with people who come to us seeking help. During the past year, we received 161 calls or visits from Candia residents, many of which were crisis calls involving fuel or utility problems, the lack of food or clothing or general financial needs. By working closely together with local and state welfare administrators, fuel and utility companies, other human service agencies and interested clergy and civic groups, we are able to link those in need with the services available to them.

Since the services we provide greatly relieve the towns we serve of the full financial burden of providing for the needs of their low-income residents, we ask every community we serve to make a financial contribution to our agency based upon the level of service we have provided to its residents. The amount we request equals 4.5% of the total dollar value of services we provided during the previous fiscal year, which means that we request \$4.50 for every \$100.00 we provided in direct services.

From July 1, 1989 through June 30, 1990, Community Action provided \$63,770 in services to Candia residents. We are therefore requesting the town of Candia to contribute 4.5% of this amount, or \$2,870. The town of Candia has contributed to our agency for many years, and we extend our appreciation to you for your continued support.

Dear Selectmen.

The Rockingham Nutrition Program, also referred to as "Meals-On-Wheels", respectfully requests funds from the town of Candia to help in providing meals to your elderly and handicapped residents.

The Nutrition program continues to provide hot, nutritious noon meals at a local center, and delivers the same meals to those residents who are homebound. We have age, disability and/or income criteria for meals service. These criteria are adhered to and reevaluated during service. Our clients range from those who require short-term service while recuperating from an operation to those who need long-term service as a result of chronic disability.

Our primary service is the hot noon meal, which is geared to the dietary needs of older people. A typical meal consists of: sweet & sour meatballs, boiled potatoes, green beans, multi-grain bread, chocolate cake and milk. We offer salt restricted and diabetic substitutes when needed. The purpose of the meals is to enhance the health and well-being of the older or handicapped person. Eating a balanced diet when one is alone, sick and alone, old and poor, or no longer able to drive, can be very difficult. Medical problems and the associated costs are hastened by improper or poor eating patterns. "Meals-On-Wheels" has proven effective in combatting these problems by providing hot, appetizing meals for those who might otherwise not bother. And all too often, malnourished older people must be institutionalized at great cost, both emotional and financial.

In addition to the hot noon lunch, the Nutrition Program may also provide a lighter dinner meal, weekend and holiday meals. These are delivered to homebound clients who have little or no outside support. About 12% of our clients receive 2 meals per day for 365 days of the year. More typically, a client receives only the main meal at noon. Over the course of a year, however, a typical client may receive 250 or more meals. Last year the Nutrition Program fed 30 Candia residents. Of these 30 Candia residents, 26 are "Title III" clients, and supported through the Older Americans Act, agency fundraising, and town support. For town support for Candia meals, the Nutrition Program requests \$650, from the town of Candia, counting 26 clients multiplied by an annual amount of \$25, per client.

In Candia. In addition to these 26 clients, 4 low income. disabled clients were also served. Partial payment was made for these clients through the Title XX program, which has been partially matched by Rockingham County, whereas the Title III clients are town and agency locally supported.

Last year we requested and received \$25.00 for each person served by the Nutrition Program in Candia. This funding from your town and other communities throughout our service area has enabled us to continue serving residents in spite of the rising costs of gasoline. food, paper products and other related expenses. In many other parts of the State, cutbacks in funding and increased costs have forced programs similar to ours to cut back on meals, resorting to waiting lists for meals-on-wheels delivery, or closing mealsites for one or two days per week. It is our sincere hope that by continuing your town's contribution to the Nutrition Program our services to your elderly and handicapped may continue without interruption or delay.

We have been serving Candia residents since 1980. We try to keep our requests reasonable, our costs under control, and our service good. We appreciate your consideration of the meals program request. If you need any additional information, or have any questions, please contact me at the listed address. We will follow up to ensure our compliance with your town's procedural rules.

# REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

All dues-paying members of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission are offered a wide range of services, resources and technical assistance by a professional planning staff who, from time-to-time, are assisted by specialized consultants on an as-needed basis. Under the direction of your representatives, the staff develops and carries out planning programs that require a regional perspective, as well as those which pertain more directly to your community.

Local planning assistance requests are generally received from your Planning Board and/or the Board of Selectmen. With the concurrence of the Commission, certain general studies are conducted, notifications made and training workshops held that are considered essential for all member municipalities.

Services that were performed for the Town of Candia during the past year are as follows:

- Provided testimonies, some in support and some in opposition, to the House and Senate committees of the 1990 Legislative Session on a few bills which pertain to planning and zoning. SB 337; SB 358; SB 359; HB 1121; HB 1119; and HB 1375 dealing with impact fees deserve a special mention.
- Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture meetings. These meetings were attended by Candia officials.
- Conducted a six-hour training workshop for the planning board members. The Candia Planning and Zoning boards were invited to that workshop.
- 4. Using the GIS-ARC/INFO, prepared a computerized map for the town showing the developmental constraints. The Planning Board has been provided with a copy of the map, and the soils data has been stored in the electronic files of the Commission.

#### TOWN REPORT

Visiting Nurse Association of Manchester & Southern New Hampshire, Inc.

The Visiting Nurse Association has been providing the residents of Candia with a full range of home health services since 1965. The VNA Board of Trustees and staff take this opportunity to reaffirm their commitment to excellence in health care, and to the provision of services designed to ensure that being cared for at home is safe, comfortable and convenient.

Over the past year the VNA has forged ahead with new endeavors. In January of 1989 the VNA formally acquired the former Greater Manchester Child Care Association (GMCCA) to insure that affordable quality child care services would continue to be available in our community. Shortly after the acquisition of the center, a major renovation project of the physical facility began. From March to the present, hundreds of skilled tradesmen representing 13 labor unions and many local businesses have come forward offering time and materials for the project.

The VNA's programs have continued to thrive and expand. VNA home care and community health services are provided through its affiliates.

VNA Home Health & Hospice Services, Inc. is Medicare and Medicaid certified, provides intravenous and enteral therapies; skilled nursing care; physical, occupational and speech/language therapies; nutrition counseling and medical social services; certified home health aides; Hospice care for the terminally ill; and long term care for the elderly and the handicapped. Medical equipment, such as beds and wheelchairs, is also available. Payment for service includes health insurance, and private payment. Fees are explained to our patients at the first visit to the home and for those unable to pay the usual fees, adjustments are made on an individual basis.

<u>VNA Personal Services. Inc.</u> provides private duty nurses, home health aides, homemakers, companions, personal care assistants and child care in the home.

VNA Community Services, Inc. provides free Immunization Clinics for all age groups monthly and Free Blood Pressure screening clinics. Watch your local paper for date and place. Foot Care clinics are held monthly at our 194 Concord Street office by appointment and blood pressure checks are done weekdays from 1:30 - 4:00 p.m. Occupational Health programs are provided to business and industry on site. Parent-Child Health Services include the Teenage Pregnancy Program, the Parent-Baby (ad) Venture Program for children at risk of abuse and neglect, the Child Care Connection for child care providers, and the Training Program concerned with preventing drug and alcohol use among adolescents in high schools.

<u>VNA Child Care Center</u> provides a full-range of state-licensed child care, tailored to each child's needs. Programs include Infant/Toddler (ages 6 weeks to 36 months); Preschool (ages 3-5); and Kindergarten (age 5). The center also provides Extended Care, which is a before and after-school program for children grades 1 through 6, and special full-day programs during some holidays, school conference days, and school vacations. The summer session provides creative, fun programming for children ages 3 to 11. As needed, VNA also offers families a continuum of coordinated health and social services, both directly from the VNA and through working arrangements with other community resources.

Town appropriations, grants, United Way allocation and donations are a vital part of the funds that help to defray the cost of unpaid services. A representative(s) of the town of Candia serving on the VNA Board of Trustees are Helen Kendall, Randy Sherman and Sharon Cholette.

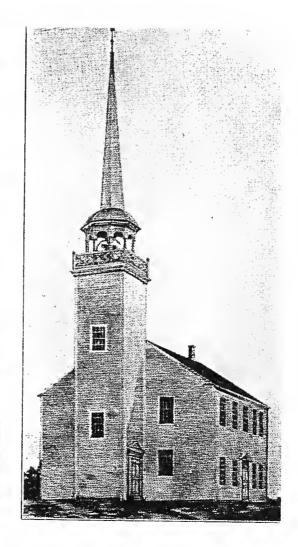

Dear Candia Residents.

The year nineteen hundred ninety has once again brought changes in the functions of the Town Clerk's Office. After moving the office from my home, and then to the old Goff's Showroom, we are now settled into the new Town Office Building at 74 High Street. The new facility enables us to have access to the many departments, all housed together in the same building, instead of going to separate locations when dealing with the various Town Offices. I will now endeavor to inform you of any changes in legislation this past year, which may affect you, as well as listing documents you will need to perform various transactions.

The Municipal Agent Program continues to be very popular with registrants of motor vehicles. You may obtain new plates here for passenger vehicles with a gross weight of 8000 lbs. or less, as well as renew registrations and obtain decals for passenger vehicles, motorcycles, trailers, and tractors. The fee, which is set by our State legislature, is \$2.00 per transaction. Effective January 1, 1990, you are no longer able to obtain 20-Day Plates from Municipal Agents. You must now go to Concord or any Motor vehicle Substation.

Many persons are still waiting till the end of the month to register their vehicles, and are encountering long lines, and long waits. I would like to encourage you to come in the middle of the month. If you have four or more registrations to renew, please call me ahead of time, so I can have them ready for you. It is frustrating for those who are in line, to see someone renew six or seven registrations at a time, especially on the last few days of the month. Again, I must emphasize, if you do wait till those last two or three days, expect a long wait. No matter what the town, or even the State Motor Vehicle Substations, this seems to be a universal problem!

To process your registrations more quickly, please have the following ready: Your Resident Tax Receipt, copies of your old registrations, and if you are going to transfer plates to a new vehicle, either the Title or Certificate of Origin (if the vehicle is under ten years old), or a complete Bill of Sale (model, make, serial number, year of manufacture, color, number of cylinders, and body style.) If you are paying by check, you may make your checks out to the following: Town of Candia, and if you are getting plates or decals from this office, State of N.H.-M.V., and Municipal Agent, Candia.

We are having an increasing problem with Bad Checks. There is a \$10.00 bad check fee on all returned checks, as well as any bank fees incurred. I attempt to notify the person responsible for the check by phone; if this is not satisfactory, a certified letter is then mailed, giving the party two weeks to correct the

problem. If the check is still outstanding, an Administrative Complaint is filed with the State of New Hampshire, which can result in the loss of registration and plates. A complaint is also filed at this time with the Candia Police. In many cases, future checks are not accepted as payment unless they are certified bank checks.

We still have many unlicensed dogs in the Town. State Law reads that any dog over three months of age must be licensed in the town where you reside. In order to license your dog, you must present your Rabies Certificate and if the animal has been spayed or neutered, your certificate for that as well. The Town also has a Leash Law, making it illegal for dogs to roam at large. Unrestricted animals have created some genuine problems, running singly or in packs, to persons, domestic livestock, and wildlife. Please keep your dog penned or leashed. Current dog fees are as follows: Neutered Males or Spayed Females: \$4.50, Unaltered dogs: \$7.00.

Marriage License fees have also increased this year. The cost of a license is now \$40.00. To obtain a license, you must show photo identification. Both parties must be over the age of 18, unless a waiver is obtained from a Justice of the Probate. One of the parties must be a resident of the town where the intentions are being filed, or if both persons are from out of state, the must be married in the town where the license is obtained. Blood tests are not required, however, this year you must read a specially prepared pamphlet on AIDS and sign an affidavit on the license. Both parties must be present to apply for the license. There is a three day waiting period before the license can be given to the contracting parties, and the license is good for ninety days from the date the intentions were filed.

If you need to obtain a copy of a Vital Record (birth, death, or marriage) you must go to the clerk of the town where the event occurred and the document was issued. I often have new parents seeking a copy of their child's birth certificate, however, they must go to the actual town where the birth took place.

Dear Citizens of Candia:

I am including the following information as a preface to the pages regarding the Vital Records for the past year for the Town of Candia. This is an attempt to clarify the confusion regarding the duties of the Town Clerk when recording and reporting Vital Records, (births, marriages and deaths), for the Town Report. According to the Bureau of Vital Records of the State of New Hampshire, the Town Clerk is responsible for those events which occur in his or her town.

For example, if a person, whether resident or nonresident, is pronounced dead in the Town of Candia, I must record that death, issue copies of the death certificate, and send a report of that death to the State Bureau of Vital Records. However, if the person, even if he or she has been a lifelong resident of Candia, dies in another town, then it is the responsibility of the clerk of that town to send me an informational copy of that death for my records, but the clerk in the town of occurrence is the only person who may issue certified copies in that instance.

Most times, if the death occurs outside the Town of Candia, the clerk in the town of occurrence will send me an informational copy for my records. There are times, however, when this does not occur, and unless I am informed by a family member or another person who has knowledge of that death, I am unaware of it and the name will not appear in the Town Report. It is especially difficult to receive death reports when the person has died out-of-state.

I hope this information may help you better understand the situation, and I apologize if I have omitted someone in this year's Vital Records Report. If an omission has occurred, please contact me, and I will make certain that the information is included in next year's report.

#### 1990 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### CANDIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE

MARCH 17, 1990

The Annual Town Meeting for the Town of Candia, New Hampshire, was opened by Moderator A. Ronald Thomas at 9:07 A.M. in the cafetorium of the Henry W. Moore School. Prior to opening the business portion of the meeting, Selectman Donald Belcourt presented awards to the following recipients: Arthur Sanborn for his hard work and dedication on the incinerator committee, Gale Stanley, for six years of dedicated service as Welfare Administrator, and Donald Coleman, outgoing selectman, for six years of service to the Town of Candia. Moderator Thomas then introduced those persons seated at the front table: Town Clerk, Christine Dupere, Selectmen Donald Coleman, Donald Belcourt, and Neil Sieminski, Selectmen's Secretary, Diane LaCombe, and Town Counsel Barton Mayer.

A motion was made by Linda Thomas to consider Article 22 first, as Sarah Hubbard, from the visiting Nurse Association, and speaker to the article, would not be able to remain for the duration of the meeting. Motion was seconded by Barbara Bowman. When voted upon, the motion PASSES.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy-Two Dollars and no cents (\$4,772.00) to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association of Manchester and Southern New Hampshire, Inc. to defray the costs of the Agency's activities in the Town. Motion to accept the Article as read was made by Helen Kendall, seconded by Linda Thomas. Vote was by a show of hands. ARTICLE 22 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$2,500,000.00) for the purpose of reconstructing town roads and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$2,500,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter #33); and to authorize Town officials to invest said monies and furthermore, to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain, and accept federal, state or other aid and donations, if any, which may be available for said project and to

comply with all laws applicable to said project; to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof. Motion to indefinitely postpone Article 4 was made by Neil Sieminski, seconded by Donald Belcourt. Vote was by a show of hands. THE ARTICLE IS INDEFINITELY POSTPONED.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to hold our Selectmen:

Donald Coleman, Chairman

Donald Belcourt

Neil Sieminski

and former Selectman, Charles Bowman, personally and financially accountable for any amount of fines or fees we may incur because of the poor judgement they used regarding the improper disposal of ashes and solid waste at our incinerator site and at the brown Road sand pit. Submitted by petition. THE ARTICLE WAS RULED OUT OF ORDER. Mr. Mayer, Town Counsel explained that the Town Meeting is acting as a legislative body and could not act in a judicial capacity. This Article was inconsistent with the Town's previous vote adopting RSA 29. He advised that the article is unlawful and should be ruled out of order. Mr. Bowman wished to have his name publicly cleared, however, a motion by Boyd Chivers, seconded by Don Belcourt failed to pass. ARTICLE 5 IS RULED OUT OF ORDER.

ARTICLE 6: We the undersigned voters of the Town of Candia hereby PETITION to see if the Town of Candia will vote to Repeal, Power to Review Site Plans and Site Plan Review Regulations, such as authorized by (Article 28) by a vote at Town meeting on March 14, 1986 and as recorded in the County of Rockingham Registry of Deeds in BK 2610 pages P2791 thru and inclusive P2809 and also BK2606, P0132 recorded on June 2, 1986 and as authorized by (Article 2) by a vote at Town Meeting on March 15, 1989 and as authorized by NH Revised Statutes Annotated Chapters 674:43 and 674:44. Submitted by petition. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Richard Gilbert and seconded by Richard lazott. A lengthy discussion both for and in opposition to the article then ensued. A request to move the question was made by Earle Goodno. The request was passed, and those assembled moved to a vote on Article 6. A petition to vote by Secret Ballot had been received for this article, VOTE ON ARTICLE 6: YES: 169 NO: 221. ARTICLE 6 FAILS.

John Beane made a motion that the meeting consider Article 35 next, seconded by Diane laCombe. The vote to consider Article 35 PASSES.

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$4,000.00) for the repair of three (3) chimneys and also to point up the bricks in the Fitts Museum. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the trustees of the Fitts Museum. Mr. Beane made a motion that recognizing the present financial climate of the Town, he wished to amend the article to read as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$2,000.00) for the repair of three (3) chimneys and also to point up the brick work in the Fitts Museum. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the trustees of the Fitts Museum. Seconded by Susan Young. There was no discussion, and when moved to a vote, ARTICLE 35 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 7: We, the undersigned voters of the Town of Candia hereby PETITION to see if the Town of Candia will vote to ABOLISH the office of Land Use and Land Use Assistant and the budget for the same office and designate said duties to their respective departments; Selectmen, Planning Board, Building Inspector. Submitted by Petition. Motion was made by Ron Hadley to abolish the land use office and the budget for this office, seconded by Rick lazott. A petition for vote by Secret Ballot was received for this article. Results were as follows: YES: 149 NO: 234, ARTICLE 7 FAILS.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to change the procedure for establishing a Planning Board from appointed members to elected members as provided by NH RSA 673. In effect to provide equity in the zoning procedures. By petition. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Clarence Blevens, seconded by Ron Hadley. Following a lengthy discussion, both in support and in opposition to the article, a motion to move the question to a vote was made by Ron Hadley, seconded by Sue Young. The motion passes. Vote was by Secret Ballot, as a petition request had been received. Results of vote on Article 8: YES 190 NO 166 ARTICLE 8 IS ADOPTED. THE PLANNING BOARD WILL BE ELECTED.

ARTICLE 9: We, the undersigned voters of the Town of Candia hereby PETITION to see if the Town of Candia will vote to change the cost of procuring copies of information and documentation from town records as available for the price of .10 cents per

copy page, single side, with the option of reduced size copies if desired. Submitted by petition. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Clarence Blevens, seconded by Rick Lazott. After a brief discussion, article 9 was put to a vote by a show of hands. ARTICLE 9 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

#### FIREARMS IN PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Firearms prohibited. It shall be unlawful to carry a firearm in any building while that building is being used by the Town of Candia for public purposes, including meetings.

Firearms defined. Firearms shall include pistols, revolvers, or any other weapon defined in RSA 159:1 and rifles and shotguns.

Penalty; any person found in violation of this bylaw shall be subject to a civil fine in the amount of One Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$1,000.00) for each offense as provided in RSA 31:39, III.

Exception. This ordinance shall not apply to Federal, State, County or Local Law Enforcement Officers.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Don Coleman and seconded by Don Belcourt. A request to move the question, after a brief discussion, was made by Rick Lazott., seconded by Diane LaCombe. The vote to move the question passes. When voted on by a show of hands, ARTICLE 10 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable general trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Incinerator Maintenance Fund, for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the incinerator and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) to be placed in this fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend such funds as required. Motion was made by Donald Belcourt, seconded by Donald Coleman. Following discussion, the article was voted on by a show of hands. ARTICLE 11 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) to be used for recycling and further to use these funds or part thereof for any matching grants that may become available for recycling. Motion was made by Don Belcourt, seconded by Don Coleman. It was explained that this amount would be used to establish paper and plastics recycling. Vote was by a show of hands. ARTICLE 12 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Seventy-Eight Dollars and no cents (\$678.00) to be paid to the Rockingham Planning Commission for the Towns' participation in the spring collection day of the 1990 Rockingham County Household Hazardous Waste Collection program. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Don Belcourt and seconded by Janet Manter. Vote was by a show of hands. ARTICLE 13 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00) for the purchase of a crawler/loader tractor to be used at the Candia Recycling Center and further to use these funds as part thereof for any matching grants that may become available for recycling. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Donald Belcourt and seconded by Donald Coleman. When put to a vote, ARTICLE 14 FAILS.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provision of RSA 31:95-c to restrict revenues from the Candia Recycling Center to expenditures for the purpose of recycling programs. Such revenue and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Candia Recycling Fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in such fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of the revenue. THIS ARTICLE WAS DECLARED OUT OF ORDER, SINCE A PUBLIC HEARING WAS REQUIRED BEFORE IT COULD BE VOTED UPON AND NONE WAS HELD.

ARTICLE 16: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption? The optional veteran's exemption is One Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$100.00), rather than Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$50.00). Submitted by petition. Motion was made by Donald Coleman,

seconded by Donald Belcourt. A Ballot Vote is required by the State. YES: 226 NO: 90 ARTICLE 16 IS ADOPTED.

Since there was no objection, Article 21 was advanced in order.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars and no cents (\$2,475.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Lamprey Health Care. Motion was made by Don Coleman and seconded by Diane laCombe. When put to a vote, ARTICLE 21 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 17: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35, IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service-connected total disability? The optional disability exemption is One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,400.00), rather than Seven Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$700.00). Submitted by petition. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Don Coleman and seconded by Don Belcourt. A Ballot Vote is required by state law on this article. Results of the vote: YES: 241 NO: 41 ARTICLE 17 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty-Eight Dollars and no cents (\$15,858.00) for the purpose of purchasing a police cruiser. Chief Gatcomb moved the article to read as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Fifty-Three Dollars and no cents (\$15,053.00) for the purpose of purchasing a police cruiser. Motion was seconded by Don Belcourt. A petition request for secret ballot was received on this article. Results are as follows: YES: 62 NO: 255 ARTICLE 18 FAILS.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Six Hundred Forty-Seven Dollars and no cents (\$8,647.00) to the Candia Police Department for the additional money needed to hire two full time police officers. Motion to accept the article as read was made by James Gatcomb, seconded by Mr. Lucas. A petition request was received to vote this article by secret ballot. Results of the vote: YES: 83 NO: 240 ARTICLE 19 FAILS.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$5,500.00) for the purpose of conducting an external audit of Town financial records and procedures. Motion made by Donald Coleman, seconded by Donald Belcourt. Vote was by a show of hands. ARTICLE 20 FAILS.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town of Candia will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars and no cents (\$1,325.00) to be paid to the Rockingham County Nutrition Program to help provide meals to Candia's older and handicapped residents. Motion was made by Don Coleman, seconded by Don Belcourt. Vote was by a show of hands. ARTICLE 23 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-One Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$21,000.00) for the purpose of hiring a Town Administrator to report to the Board of Selectmen. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Don Coleman, seconded by Neil Sieminski. This article received a petition request for a secret ballot. YES: 14 NO: 306 ARTICLE 24 FAILS.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the New Hampshire Municipal Budget Law, NH RSA, Chapter 32, and to authorize the Town Moderator to appoint six at-large members of the Budget Committee in accordance with the provisions of NH RSA, Chapter 32:2. Submitted by petition. Motion to adopt the article as read was made by Charles Bowman and seconded by Rudy Cartier. Comment was made that though the first year, the members would be appointed, in the future, they should be elected. After lengthy discussion, the article was moved to a vote by Secret Ballot, required by State statute. Results are as follows: YES: 30 NO: 286 ARTICLE 25 FAILS.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy-One Dollars and no cents (\$1,971.00) to the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Helen Wilson, seconded by Don Belcourt. Vote was by a show of hands. ARTICLE 26 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to accept the "Candia Town Office Maintenance Fund" under the provisions of RSA 31:19.

Also to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00), which represents the balance on the town office building budget, to be added to said trust fund. Income from fund to be spent under the directions of the committee formed for the Trust. Submitted by petition. Motion was made by Ron Severino, seconded by Don Belcourt to indefinitely postpone the article. ARTICLE 27 IS INDEFINITELY POSTPONED.

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-Six Thousand, Six Hundred and Eighteen Dollars and no cents (\$86,618.00) for the complete revaluation of the Town and to authorize the withdrawal of Fifty-Six Thousand Five Hundred Ninety-Six Dollars and no cents (\$56,596.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of Thirty Thousand Twenty-Two Dollars and no cents (\$30,022.00) to come from general taxation. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Donald Coleman, seconded by Donald Belcourt. It was explained that the total amount must be appropriated before the revaluation could begin. Following a brief discussion, motion was made by Neil Sieminski to move the question, seconded by Rick Lazott. Motion passes. The vote on article 28 was by show of hands. ARTICLE 28 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) to Candia Rescue for the purpose of providing primary emergency medical services in the Town of Candia. Said funds are to be expended under the direction of Candia Rescue and be disbursed to Candia Rescue by April 15, 1990. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Rudy Cartier and seconded by Les Cartier. Jon Godfrey requested to amend the article as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) to Candia Rescue for the purpose of providing primary emergency medical services in the Town of Candia. Such funds to be expended under the direction of Candia Rescue. The amendment was seconded by Ingrid Byrd. Vote on the amendment to delete April 15, 1990 FAILS. When voted on, ARTICLE 29 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$38,000.00) for fire suppression and prevention for the Town of Candia. The monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. and to be received in full on or before April 30, 1990. Motion was made by Len Wilson, seconded by Don Belcourt. Mr. Wilson explained that the increased budget reflected maintenance of communications and telephone equipment. Jon Godfrey wished to amend the article as

follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$38,000.00) for fire suppression and prevention in Candia. The monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. Amendment was seconded by Ingrid Byrd. Town Treasurer, Shirley Erving, explained once again that the more money she is allowed to invest and the longer she is allowed to invest it, the more interest is made for the Town. After a lengthy discussion, Daniel Jaskolka requested that the question be moved to a vote. This was seconded by Charles Bowman. The move to a vote passes. A petition was received to vote on the amendment to Article 30 by Secret Ballot. Results are as follows: YES: 115 NO: 191 THE AMENDMENT FAILS. There was no further discussion on the article. Request for a secret ballot was withdrawn, so vote was by a show of hands. ARTICLE 30 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town of Candia will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of funding the construction of a substation to house fire apparatus and equipment. Further to see if the Town of Candia will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$50,000.00) to be deposited in this fund. Motion to accept article 31 to read as follows was made by Len Wilson: To see if the Town of Candia will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of funding the construction of a substation to house fire apparatus and equipment. Further to see if the Town of Candia will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Three Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$33,000.00) to be deposited in this fund. Motion was seconded by Rudy Cartier. Chief Wilson then explained the proposed substation would be constructed in the High Street, Merrill Road vicinity. The reserve fund would be used to reduce the tax impact when new equipment would have to be purchased. A petition for vote by Secret Ballot had been received on this article. YES: 116 NO: 175 ARTICLE 31 FAILS.

ARTICLE 32: We, the undersigned, hereby PETITION to see if the Town of Candia will vote to direct the Representative to the General Court to introduce legislation to change the name of Route 101, a Class One Highway, beginning at the Candia-Auburn Town line in the west and terminating at the Candia-Raymond Town line in the east, to the RICHARD BRUCE JOHNSTON-FRANK ALLEN INDYK HIGHWAY, for the purpose of recognizing two of Candia's sons who gave their lives in the Vietnam Conflict. A standing count is requested so the New Hampshire State legislature might see the interest of the Town at large. Submitted by petition. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Bruce Conroy, seconded by Irvine Whitcomb. When put to a vote, ARTICLE 32 FAILS.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$38,000.00) for the operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library. These funds to be used for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library. These funds to be expended under the direction of the trustees of the Smyth Public Library Association of Candia. Motion was made by Linda Thomas, seconded by Charles Bowman. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of hands. ARTICLE 33 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$3,600.00) for the purpose of installing a fire alarm system in the Smyth Public Library. These funds to be expended under the direction of the trustees of the Smyth Public Library. Mrs. Thomas moved that article 34 be accepted as read, seconded by Alan Cote. After brief discussion, vote was taken by a show of hands. ARTICLE 34 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 36: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$15,000.00) for the purpose of installing air conditioning in the Town Office Building. Mr. Coleman made the following motion: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$12,750.00) for the purposes of installing air conditioning in the Town Office Building. Motion was seconded by Mr. Belcourt. Petition for a Secret Ballot was withdrawn, voice vote was taken on this article. The Nays have it, ARTICLE 36 FAILS.

ARTICLE 37: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,200.00) for the purpose of compensating the Deputy Town Clerk. Said funds will allow for an increase in the hours the Town Clerk's office is open to accommodate rush periods. Motion was made by Chris Dupere to read as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$900.00) for the purpose of compensating the Deputy Town Clerk. Said funds will allow for an increase in the manpower during the hours the Town Clerk's office is open to accommodate rush periods. Seconded by Don Belcourt. A standing vote was taken on this article, since outcome could not be determined by a show of hands. YES: 136 NO: 142 ARTICLE 37 FAILS.

ARTICLE 38: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$2,050.00) for the purchase of fireworks to be displayed at the 1990 Old Home Day celebration. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Donald Coleman, seconded by Donald Belcourt. Following brief discussion, vote was taken by a show of hands. ARTICLE 38 FAILS.

ARTICLE 39: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use of the Town Office Building Meeting Room or rooms to be made available for the use of non-municipal organized groups on an availability status for the purpose of conducting organized meetings as may be requested by such organizations. BY Petition. Motion was made by Clarence Blevens and seconded by Rick Lazott. Donald Belcourt amended the article to read: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use of the Town Office Building meeting Room or rooms to be made available for the use of nonprofit organized groups on an availability status for the purpose of conducting organized meetings as may be requested by such organizations. The amendment was seconded by Tommy St. Martin. A standing vote on the amendment was taken: YES: 139 NO: 127 The amendment passes. Following further discussion on the amended article, it was put to a vote. ARTICLE 39 FAILS.

ARTICLE 40: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended balance of its annual appropriation, said funds to be placed in a conservation fund as authorized by RSA 36-A:5. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Neil Sieminski and seconded by Charles Bowman. It was explained that this would set up a trust fund for the Conservation Commission. Following a brief discussion, Thomas Clark asked to move the question, seconded by Denise lazott. The vote to move the question passes. When voted on, ARTICLE 40 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 41: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain 50% of the current use tax change, said funds to be placed in a conservation fund as authorized by RSA 36-A:5. Neil Sieminski made a motion to indefinitely postpone the article, seconded by Don Coleman. It was voted to INDEFINITELY POSTPONE ARTICLE 41.

ARTICLE 42: To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Seventy-Two Thousand Five Hundred Eleven Dollars and no cents (\$972,511.00). Mr. Belcourt moved: To see

if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Sixty-Four Thousand Five Hundred Eleven dollars and no cents (\$964,511.00). Motion was seconded by Don Coleman. Mr. Byrd wished to amend the money amount to Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Five Hundred Eleven Dollars and no cents (\$750,511.00). Seconded by Judy Szot. Following a lengthy discussion, Mr. Byrd decided to withdraw his amendment, seconded by Mrs. Szot. Mr. Byrd then introduced the following amendment: To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Seventy-Two Thousand Five Hundred Eleven Dollars and no cents \$(872,511.00). The motion was seconded by Judy Szot. Following further discussion, a request to move the question was made by Boyd Chivers, seconded by Rick Lazott. The vote to move the question passes. Vote on the amendment to Article 42 was taken by Secret Ballot. YES: 197 NO: 36 THE AMENDMENT PASSES. Following brief discussion, the amended article was put to a vote. Request for a Secret Ballot was withdrawn, therefore vote was by show of hands. THE AMENDED ARTICLE 42 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 43: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, pursuant to RSA 31:95-b. Motion by Don Coleman, seconded by Don Belcourt. Vote was by show of hands. ARTICLE 43 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 44: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to accept such funds as are made available to the Candia Forest Fire Warden, under the Rural Development Act of 1972, Title IV. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Don Coleman, seconded by Don Belcourt. There was no discussion. Voice vote was taken on the article. ARTICLE 44 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 45: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes. Motion was made by Donald Coleman, seconded by Donald Belcourt. Voice vote was taken on this article. ARTICLE 45 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 46: To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year. Don Coleman made the motion to accept the article as read, seconded by Neil Sieminski. There was no discussion. Voice vote was taken on this article. ARTICLE 46 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 47: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or convey by auction or advertised sealed bids, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed. Pursuant to RSA 80:42. Motion by Don Coleman, seconded by Neil Sieminski. The article was voted on by voice vote. ARTICLE 47 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 48: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The following persons were nominated and voted in to these traditional positions:

Viewers of Fences: Gilbert and Priscilla Lane

Scaler of Timber: William Byrd

Hog Reeve: Boyd Chivers

It was requested by Richard Snow, Auditor, that the Auditor's Report be included in the minutes of the Annual Town meeting. They will be attached as an appendix to the meeting minutes.

Susan Young presented a Good Neighbor Ordinance to the Selectmen. A copy of this will also be attached as an appendix to the minutes.

Mr. Lazott noted that our representative to the State Legislature was neither present at the School District Meeting nor the Town meeting. He felt that our representative did not know what we needed or wanted because of his absence, and we were not receiving the representation we had elected him to give.

Motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Donald Coleman and seconded by Donald Belcourt. The meeting was declared adjourned at 7:40 P.M.

I want my statement to become a permanent part of the record of this meeting. I stand publicly accused and am entitled to have my name cleared. Otherwise, the record of the 1990 Town Meeting will show only the accusation. Thank You.

Dear Sirs.

We have carefully examined the financial books and records of the Town of Candia for the fiscal year ending 31 December 1988, and compared them with the annual financial reports. Our examination was done using generally accepted auditing practices, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. In our opinion, with the exception of the following items, the financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Town of Candia at December 31, 1988 and the results of its operations for the year ended. Enclosed please find your copy of the NH Department of Revenue Administration form MS-60.

The "Cash on Hand January 1, 1988" figure from page 3, part VI of the Annual Town Financial Report (MS-5) did not agree with the "Cash on Hand December 31, 1987" from the previous year's report. The correct figure should be \$876,492.39, which would increase the "Revenue Grand Total" figure on your MS-5 by \$712,856.33.

The beginning balances of the tax collector's "Summary of Tax Accounts" and "Summary of Tax Sale / Tax Lien Accounts" report (MS-61) did not agree with the ending balances from the year preceding. Our report of the tax collector's Accounts (MS-60 - Sheets 5 thru 8) was adjusted to compensate for the differences by increasing the "Uncollected Taxes - Prior Years" by \$6,698.72 and "Unredeemed Taxes (Others) - End of Year" by \$2392.29. These adjustments would be reflected as an increase in the Asset portion of the Balance Sheet on your MS-5.

The following comments abould be reviewed for possible action, either to conform to state standards or to improve the reporting of the town's financial transactions.

1. We are pleased with the progress made in 1988 on recording payments in your computerized accounting system. We were also pleased to hear that you will be recording receipts in the system for the 1989 fiscal year. The availability of a check register printout for the first half of the year significantly improved the ability to trace payments to the original vouchers. However, many of the problems discussed in last year's audit still exist. The inability to combine payments to a single vendor, across accounts, resulting in multiple payments to the same vendor in the same payment period, is a fundamental weakness in the system. Excessive voided checks and tighter control of the stock of blank checks continues to be a concern. Having to manually annotate the check number(s) on each original voucher during the audit process needlessly delays the audit.

- 2. Our review of your records found a number of small problems, significant only by their frequency. The management of public funds demands an attention to detail significantly greater than in the private sector. We believe that more management attention should be focused on the basic policies and procedures used to monitor and control the Town's financial affairs. Several payments made in January, 1988 appeared to more properly belong in 1987, in particular a \$30,000 payment for paving materials for Patten Hill. The DRA and generally accepted accounting principles call for liabilities to be accounted for in the period in which they become payable. Several official documents, including tax abatement forms and the copy of the MS-5 that we were given, were undated. Original vouchers were, in some cases, missing or inadequate. We were unable to adequately reconcile abstement records with the tax collector's records. We again found vouchers for welfare payments that identified the recipients, a possible breach of confidentiality statutes. The mileage allowance again exceeds the IRS standard. Several instances were noted where it appeared that the Town should be filing IRS 1099-MISC forms. Our understanding of the IRS regulations is that municipalities are now required to file 1099-MISC forms for any payments for services exceeding \$800.00 in a calendar year to anyone not a corporation. The penalties for not filing appear to be significant and we recommend that you review this area for 1989, as the Town is acting as it's own contractor in the construction of the Town Office Building.
- 3. During our review of the payments, it again appeared obvious that no formal procedure exists for having the departments review payment vouchers prior to their final review and approval by the selectmen. The current reviews by the police chief and highway agent should be formalized and extended to all the departments, particularly the incinerator. The Incinerator committee has made significant progress in improving the incinerator area, perhaps they could be drafted for this task.
- 4. We were again disappointed by the lack of a direct deposit program for the tax collector, town clerk, and other receipts. There appears to be the opportunity to gain significant amounts of interest on the "float" that is being moved thru non-interest-bearing accounts. We believe that it would be prudent management to re-establish an account under the control of the Town, for direct deposit of remittances to the treasurer by town officials, using electronic fund transfers, if necessary. Remittances to the treasurer should be made on a more frequent baais, preferably daily.
- 5. The fees collected by the town clerk for bad checks, by law, go to the General Fund. Inasmuch as the town clerk works on a fee basis, and has to do all the work recording and tracking bad checks, it is recommended that the selectmen review this area.
- 6. It is considered desirable by the Department of Revenue Administration that towns have a cash management program. It is again recommended that you institute a formal cash flow monitoring program that budgets the amount of cash required for payments, on at least a monthly basis, in conjunction with the School District, to allow the treasurer to maximize the return on investments and to minimize the costs of borrowing funds in anticipation of taxes. The recording of 1989 receipts in the computerized accounting system will hopefully also allow you to address this basic problem of cash frow management.

- 7. No verification was done of the town clerk's motor vehicle permit log because of the manual process used to control and file them. Consequently, we were unable to perform what we would consider as an adequate inventory of the motor vehicle permits. We have been in contact with the Department of Safety, and are attempting, in conjunction with the town clerk, to get a computerized file of the monthly permits, as a first step towards automation.
- 8. The road agent's checking account no longer appears to serve any useful purpose. We recommend that it be closed and payments be made directly to the vendors.
- 9. Development of the computerized detailed inventory listing of the securities being held by the trustees of trust funds is essentially complete. The trustees now have a viable system that can be used to provide them with the information that they need to more effectively manage and control their assets.
- 10. The records of the cemetary superintendent show the receipt of a bequest for use in the Holbrook Cemetary. We are unaware of any vote by the selectmen accepting this bequest, or of the Town Meeting authorizing the cemetary superintendent to accept gifts and bequests in the name of the Town. While we understand the concern of the cemetary superintendent about the selectmen getting their hands on the money, we recommend that all gifts and bequests to the Town be formally reviewed and accepted by a vote of the selectmen.
- ll. Inasmuch as two of the auditors are also trustees of the Smyth Public Library Association, with one of them serving as treasurer, we do not feel that we have the degree of independance necessary to adequately audit the library's accounts. The accounts of the library were reviewed by the third auditor.

  - To serve as a liason between residents and the various boards (by way of a Citizen's Suggestion Box).
  - To welcome new residents to the community by supplying the information they need (by way of a Candia Care Package.)
  - 5. To establish a sense of community spirit, regardless of political or personal opinions.

WHO:

A three-member committee-Selection to be left up to the Selectmen's discretion.

#### CANDIA CARE PACKAGE

#### PROCEDURE:

- The committee will try, to the best of its ability, to secure a list of new people and families that move into the Town of Candia.
- 2. The committee will get a Candia Care Package to the new families. This package will contain pertinent information to help the new residents to become members of the community.
  - a. Town office hours and phone numbers.
  - b. School hours and phone numbers.
  - c. Various board meetings, dates and phone numbers.
  - d. Town map.
- The committee will try to secure information for anyone who requests it.
- The committee will try to offer help to anyone in the community who requests it.

PURPOSE: To make information available to all interested residents.

#### COMPLAINTS

PROCEDURE:

 If a party has a complaint against another party, the committee is notified and a hearing date is set. (No anonymous complaints will be accepted.)

- All parties mentioned in the complaint <u>must</u> be present at the hearing.
- The complaint is discussed with the committee acting as the mediator.
- 4. After an agreement has been reached, each party will have an agreed upon time limit in which to comply.
- 5. This committee does not have the authority to supercede existing ordinances or statutes of the Town of Candia, State of New Hampshire, or federal government. In legal matters, the Good Neighbor Committee will operate in an advisory capacity only, and direct the parties to the proper boards.

PURPOSE:

Every day the citizens in this country are faced with more and more laws and regulations. Many are necessary, but many are adopted as a result of disagreements between neighbors. We hope that by establishing this type of complaint procedure, we can restrict the number of laws and ordinances the Town of Candia will need to live in harmony.

#### SUGGESTIONS

### PROCEDURE:

- Secured suggestion boxes will be placed throughout the Town of Cancia, with prior approval. (ie. Town Office Building, School, two Post Offices)
- Suggestions for improvement of the Town of Candia (both municipal and school) will be placed in the boxes.
- Suggestions may be anonymous, but are urged to be constructive in content.
- Suggestions will then be directed to the proper board(s) and committee(s). (Copies will be retained for public viewing.)

#### PURPOSE:

The Town of Candia has an untapped source of creativity, good ideas and workable solutions. The degree of input that is received by the school and municipal bodies is influenced by several factors.....lack of time, fear of acceptance....just to name a couple. We hope that by establishing this type of suggestion process, people will feel free to share some of their invaluable expertise, and the Town of Candia will flourish.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

#### TOWN OF CANDIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE

MARCH 9, 1990

The Annual School District Meeting of the Town of Candia, was opened by Moderator A. Ronald Thomas at 7:21 P.M., in the Cafetorium of the Henry W. Moore School. Before discussing the basic ground rules of the meeting, Mr. Thomas turned the meeting over to Robert Claver, School Board Chairman, for two special presentations. The first being the presentation of a certificate of appreciation to all those persons from the Town and the staff at the school who put in a significant number of hours in the preparation of the long range facility plan that will be discussed later in the evening. The following persons were then awarded their certificates: Clay Caddy, Mary Caddy, Bruce Hardy, Gerald Lavoie, Sandy Allen, Jon Stanley, Joseph Silveira, Maryclaire Heffernan, Maria Gleason, Andrew Bilodeau, and the chairman of the committee, George Bergevine.

It was also Mr. Claver's great pleasure and sadness to present awards of appreciation to the two School Board members who are retiring this year. Presented to Andrew W. Maloney in appreciation for dedicated service to the School Board of Candia, New Hampshire from March 1987 to March 1990, and presented to Roger E. Leavitt in appreciation for dedicated service to the School Board of Candia, New Hampshire from March 1984 to March of 1990.

The business portion of the meeting was then resumed, as Moderator Thomas introduced the Assistant Moderators for the evening, Normand St. Onge and Brien Brock. Also introduced were those district officers and school administrators seated at the front table; Christine Dupere, School District Clerk, Steven Russell, Moore School Principal, School Board Members Joan Tancrede, Robert Claver, Roger Leavitt, Richard Robidoux, and Andrew Maloney. Also introduced were Robert Leslie, Attorney for the School District, Althea Bennett, Administrative Assistant for Business Services, Kenneth Severson, Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

ARTICLE 1: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money up to One Million, Two Hundred Thousand (1,200,000.00) Dollars for constructing an addition and renovations to the Candia Moore School and for the purchase of

equipment of a lasting character in connection therewith; to determine whether all or a portion of such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise; to authorize the School Board to spend any income derived from the temporary investment of bond or note proceeds for the project; or to take any other action relative thereto. Roger Leavitt moved that the District raise and appropriate One Million, Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,200,000.00) for constructing an addition and renovations to the Candia Moore School and for the purchase of equipment of a lasting character in connection therewith; that to raise this appropriation the School Board is authorized to borrow One Million, Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,200,000.00) under the Municipal Finance Act; that any income derived from the temporary investment of bond proceeds shall be spent for the project in addition to the foregoing appropriation; and that the School Board is authorized to take all other action necessary to carry out the project. Motion was seconded by Richard Robidoux. Mr. Leavitt explained that the proposal dealt with the construction of five new classes, a gymnasium, and the light renovation of the primary building of the Moore School, and is the result of several years of work. The cost would be spread out over a fifteen year period to lessen the tax impact to the Town. The Gymnasium would be finished by November of 1990. The addition would begin at the close of the school year in June and be finished for the school's opening in September, thereby causing little disruption to the school environment for the students.

In the ensuing discussion of Article 1, a wide variety of opinions were expressed. Among the post prevalent of sentiments was the fact that the citizens of Candia, during these difficult economic times, could not afford another increase in their tax rates. After an hour long discussion in a similar vein, Bonnie Spinazzola made a request to move the question. This was seconded by Susan Young. The vote to move the question was PASSED. The Moderator then stated that the assembly would move to a vote on the Bond Issue. This would be done by special Bond Issue secret ballots and would require a two thirds majority for passage. Mr. Thomas then declared the polls open at 8:32 P.M. A recess was then declared, to enable the majority of those present to vote on Article 1. Since, by law, the polls for a Bond Issue are required to be open for a minimum of one hour, and most of those present had voted, the Moderator requested the meeting come to order and continue with Article 2.

ARTICLE 2: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers of the District. Joan Tancrede moved that the reports of the agents, auditors, committees, and/or officers of the District as set forth in the annual report of the District be

accepted and placed on file. The motion was seconded by Richard Robidoux. Mrs. Tancrede explained that these were in the blue section of the Town Report. William Byrd then made a motion to amend Article 2 as follows: The District directs the School Board to each year, publish and include in the bound Annual Report of the Town of Candia, a budget report which shall list previous year's expenditures and next year's proposed budget. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Young. It was stated in discussion that this information should be available in order to make informed decisions. It is an accounting of actual finances, line by line. There was no further discussion, so the amendment to Article 2 was moved to a vote by a show of hands. The amendment passes. There was no further interest in discussing the amended Article 2, which reads as follows: The reports of agents, auditors, committees, and/or officers of the District as set forth in the annual report of the District, be accepted and placed on file. The District directs the School Board to each year publish and include in the bound Annual Report of the Town of Candia a budget report which shall list previous year's expenditures and next year's proposed budget. Vote was taken by a show of hands. The amended Article 2 PASSES.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1990-1991 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money. Andrew Maloney made the motion to accept the motion as read, seconded by Joan Tancrede. There was no discussion on Article 3, and when moved to a vote by show of hands, the article PASSES.

MODERATOR RON THOMAS DECLARED THE POLLS FOR ARTICLE 1, THE BOND ISSUE, CLOSED AT 9:37 P.M.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million, Three Hundred Ninety Thousand, Nine Hundred Ninety-Five (\$1,390,995.00) Dollars to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1990-1991 school year. One Hundred Fifty-One Thousand, Seven Hundred Seventy-Five (\$151,775.00) Dollars of such sum representing additional salaries and benefits attributable to the

increase in salaries and benefits over those obligations payable under the previous year of the Collective Bargaining Agreement entered into by the Candia School Board and the Candia Education Association. (This is the second year of a three year contract.) Mr. Claver moved to accept the article as read. This was seconded by Andy Maloney. Before discussion was begun on this article, Mr. Thomas informed the meeting that he had received a request for a secret ballot signed by eleven registered voters. Following Mr. Claver's explanation of the article, discussion was begun. Susan Young made a motion to amend Article 4 to read as follows: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million, Two Hundred Thirty-Nine Thousand, Two Hundred Twenty (\$1,239,220.00) Dollars to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1990-1991 school year. Also, to direct the Candia School Board to renegotiate the remaining two years of the current Collective Bargaining Agreement which was entered into on March 10, 1989. The renegotiated Agreement will be brought to a Special School District Meeting for final approval from the District voters. Motion was seconded by Charles Bowman. Mrs. Young stated she would like to see the teachers renegotiate their contract into something the Town can afford.

Mr. Leslie was asked to clarify the legality of the situation, using the Sanborn Regional School District as an example. The Sanborn District had experienced a similar vote to reopen the contract for the purposes of renegotiating. The teachers had refused, so the School Board took the teachers to the Labor Relations Board, charging them with unfair labor practice by refusing to reopen the contract. The Labor Board disagreed with the School Board and found that there was no unfair labor practice, and the Labor Board went on to say that the School District in having entered a three year agreement by having funded in the first year, automatically had been bound to the remaining two years of the contract. The School Board did not have the money to fund the contract and so appealed the decision to the New Hampshire Supreme Court. The Court's decision is still pending. Unless the Supreme Court reverses the decision of the Labor Board, the School Board would have to pay the teachers the monies agreed upon in the contract.

A lengthy discussion of the amendment then ensued. Many felt it was wrong to break the contract and spoke in opposition to the proposed amendment, stating that the teaching staff is the core of our educational system and should be given a vote of confidence. An equal number of persons voiced their support of the proposed amendment, stating they felt the contract should be renegotiated. It was also suggested that perhaps it would be

better to negotiate annual contracts in the future. Donald Coleman made a motion to move the question to a vote, seconded by Don Belcourt. The motion to vote on the amendment PASSES.

RESULTS ON ARTICLE 1, THE BOND ISSUE, WERE READ BY MODERATOR THOMAS, THEY WERE AS FOLLOWS: YES: 108 NO: 332 THE BOND ISSUE, ARTICLE 1 IS DEFEATED.

A vote by secret ballot was then taken on the amendment to Article 4. Results are as follows: YES: 199 NO: 187 The amendment to Article 4 PASSES.

Mr. Schwalb wished to have action on the amendment postponed until the Supreme Court arrives at a decision, since that will have a great impact on the actions of the School Board.

Since the previous vote was so close, Nancy Maloney made a motion to reconsider the question, seconded by Joseph Silveira. The reconsidered vote was taken by secret ballot. Results of the vote: YES: 143 NO: 236 Reconsideration of the adoption of the amendment to Article 4 FAILS.

Discussion then continued on the amended Article 4. The opinion of the majority who spoke was that the vote was not an indication that the teachers were not doing a good job, but rather that the taxpayers were no longer able to afford an increase. Many also felt the needed monies should be taken from administrative costs and not from teachers salaries. There was no further discussion. The amended Article 4 was voted on by secret ballot. YES: 220 NO: 161 THE AMENDED ARTICLE 4 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 5: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Richard Robidoux moved that the District raise and appropriate Two Million Four Hundred Thirty Thousand Five Hundred Thirty-Four (\$2,430,534.00) Dollars for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. The motion was seconded by Joan

Tancrede. Mr. Robidoux explained that this was the remainder of the budget that was to be voted on. An explanation of the individual line items then ensued.

Donald Coleman wished to amend Article 5 as follows: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million Five Hundred Eighty-Two Thousand Three Hundred Nine (\$2,582,309.00) Dollars for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Don Belcourt. Mr. Coleman explained that this amendment would replace the monies which had been taken from the teachers in the previous article, and would honor their contract.

Moderator Thomas explained to those assembled that a request for a secret ballot had been received, signed by eleven registered voters, for Article 5 and any amendments to the article. A vote on the amendment to Article 5, by secret ballot was then taken. YES: 125 NO: 233 The amendment FAILS.

Discussion then resumed on Article 5. There were further questions to have individual line items of the budget explained, as well as concern over what programs would be eliminated from the curriculum if these budget cuts take effect.

Motion to amend Article 5 to read: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million, One Hundred Sixty-Four Thousand, Seven Hundred Three (\$2,164,703.00) Dollars for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, was made by Susan Young, and seconded by William Byrd. Mrs. Young explained that this figure was taken from last year's budget. Mrs. Young also stated that there would be monies left over from this year's encumbered budget.

Discussion was then opened on the amendment to Article 5. The point was made by School Board members that they would not be able to operate the school with the proposed amount, without cutting programs. There were many fixed budget items which the Board has no control over, such as workmen's comp., insurance, high school tuition, heat, electricity, and bus lease. The programs the Board have decided to cut, will be, in order:

music, art, the talented and computer program, readiness, all cocurricular sports, health, curriculum review, and transportation to high school, whose cost will be entirely bourn by the family. It was also stated that these cuts would be crippling the school. Many individuals voiced the opinion that the students would be the ones to suffer. The opposite feeling was also voiced by many. The taxpayers could no longer afford to bear the burden of increased school budgets. The economy was such at this time, that it was impossible to bear these tax increases.

The meeting was then resumed with discussion on the amended Article 5. There was some concern regarding how the budget cuts would affect accreditation. Board members and Dr. Severson Assistant Superintendent, explained that we have till July of 1991 to meet the State minimum standards. If a school does not meet the minimum standards, a parent can petition the Commissioner of Education to send his son or daughter to a school which is accredited in New Hampshire, and the Town would be forced to pick up the tuition for that student. Though many expressed their feelings that too much had been cut from the budget, there were also many who felt they no longer could afford to have increased property taxes. It was time "to trim the fat" from the budget.

A request to move the question was made by Mr. Hyde and seconded by Susan Young. Vote to move the question was taken by a show of hands, and PASSES. The assembly then moved to a vote on Article 5, which as amended, reads as follows: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million, One Hundred Sixty-Four Thousand, Seven Hundred Three (\$2,164,703.00) Dollars for the support of the schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Results of the vote taken by secret ballot, were as follows: YES: 169 NO: 132 THE AMENDED ARTICLE 5 PASSES.

A request to move the question was made by Gary Cote, seconded by Donald Belcourt. With the agreement of the petitioners, a vote by show of hands was taken. The vote to move the question was PASSED. A vote on the ammendment to Article 5, by secret ballot, was then taken. Results were as follows: YES: 181 NO: 157. ARTICLE 5 IS AMENDED.

Motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Roger Leavitt and seconded by Andy Maloney. The School District Meeting was adjourned at 2:55 P.M.

# **Notes**

Many important events and activities during the 1989-90 school year were beneficial to the Candia School District and to the community. The entire staff at the school as well as community citizens have all contributed to the promotion of quality education.

Throughout the year the Candia School Board has continued to discuss future needs and attempted to plan appropriately for student growth. There was a Candia Facilities Needs Committee in place; then a Building Committee formulated by the School Board. This group worked with an architect and oversaw the building project which was presented at the March 1990 School District Meeting.

The School Board, administration and staff are working on a concerted basis to resolve the elementary minimum standards and to try and have those in place within the next several years.

Dr. Kenneth Severson, Assistant Superintendent for School Administrative Unit \$15, resigned effective June 30, 1990, and Dr. John Handfield was employed to serve in this position.

The Board recently signed a new three year tuition agreement with the Manchester School District for high school students beginning July 1, 1990, and ending June 30, 1993.

During the 1989-90 school year the Candia School District provided special education services to 102 students. Five of these students attended pre-achool programs, 12 were placed in private special education programs, and 19 attended public schools outside the district, including 17 high school students. The special education needs of the remaining 66 students were met at the Henry W. Moore School.

The Candia School District's commitment to providing appropriate education to all students is obvious in the Cooperative Resource Program. In nearly every classroom at the Candia Moore School students with identified special education needs are being instructed with their friends. Special education doesn't make a student so "different".

During the 1989-90 school year the Candia Moore School playground was renovated and new equipment purchased. I wish to thank the numerous people who helped with this project and the generous donation made by the Playground Committee for this great improvement to the Candia Moore School.

The Board and the administration are currently revising the Use of School Facilities Policies and hope these will be in place for the 1990-91 school year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Candia School Board members, administration and staff at the Candia Moore School, and the citizens of the community for their support during the past year.

This year's events have been dominated by issues related to school funding and a 17% reduction in the 1990-91 school budget. Some have argued that such a significant reduction is "penny wise and pound foolish", while others have argued that economic conditions and the need for fiscal austerity have required that these cuts in the school budget be made. The future will serve to judge the wisdom of these actions.

During the 1989-90 school year, the students at the Henry W. Moore School have continued to excel in a variety of areas. Academically, they have continued to score at and above state and national averages on the New Hampshire Achievement Tests, as we continue to work to strengthen our curriculum and upgrade the quality of our efforts. Competitively, our students work speaks for itself at our Invention Convention, Science Fair, Music/Art events, the Deerfield Fair, and through the countless activities that our students are involved in. And on a community-wide basis, our annual spring and holiday concerts, Memorial Day presentation, participation in the Old Home Day activities, Career Day, Colonial Crafts Day and countless other classroom activities have helped promote school and community spirit.

Our student's parents and many other members of the community are continuing to make many significant contributions to our school. During the 1989-90 school year, the curriculum committee completed the revision of the school's R-8 report cards and began work on updating our R-8 Science curriculum. The playground committee completed extensive renovations and the construction of our playground. The PTO and most recently, the CARE organization have also helped to support school activities. And, on a day-to day basis, school volunteers could be seen working in classrooms, providing clerical support, helping on field trips and involved in many other activities. They are truly our unsung heros who make a significant contribution to the quality of our efforts.

As we prepare for the 1990- 91 school year, many of the same needs outlined in my previous reports and discussed on numerous occasions remain as future challenges to this school district. Discussions on the school budget, facilities needs, program priorities and minimum standards will continue. 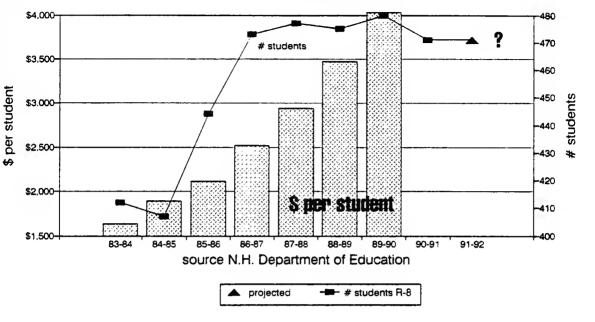

## Candia School Expenditures average for students R-8 (Moore School)

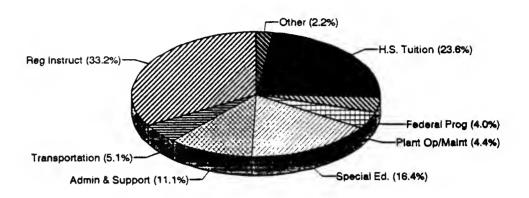

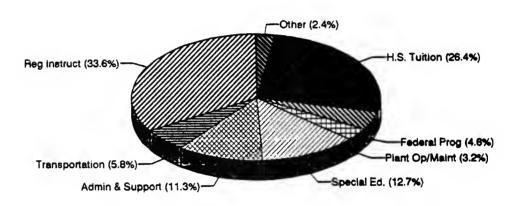

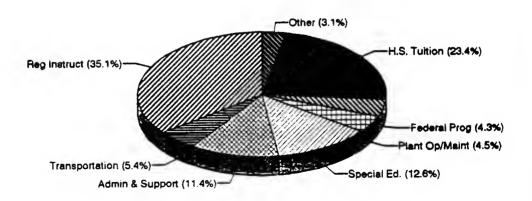
### Candia School Appropriations proposed for 1991-1992

voted for 1990-1991

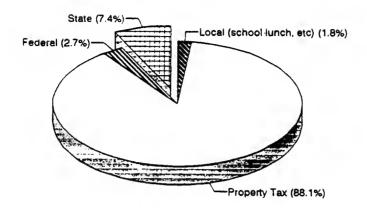


Candia School Appropriations

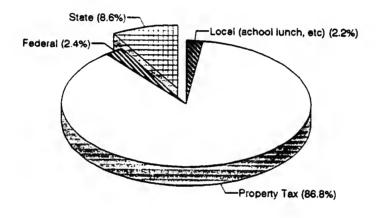


#### Candia School Revenues

projected for 1991-1992

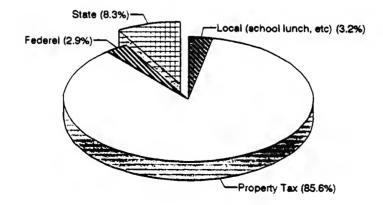


## Candia School Revenues reported for 1990-1991

WHO MAKES UP OUR SAU?

SAU #15 is comprised of the towns of Candia, Hooksett and Auburn.

WHAT VOTING POWER DO WE HAVE AT THE SAU?

Candia's vote on the SAU board is weighted on the percentage of the number of students at Moore School as compared to the number of students in the total SAU. At the present time Candia board members combined have 19% of the vote.

WHAT FUNCTIONS DOES THE SAU PROVIDE?

They provide personnel who are knowledgeable in the laws and applications of all the statutes regarding the education of the children of the communities who are part of the SAU.

The combined purchasing of supplies and materials for the schools involved.

The advertising and interviewing of applicants for the various positions available at the individual schools and at the administrative level.

To assist the School Boards in the hiring of teachers and staff.

To provide assistance to the School Boards in the preparation of school budgets.

To handle the accounting system and financial reporting procedures for all funds in accordance with local School Board policy and Local and State Law.

To be responsible for the development of an educational plan for the district and for recommending a program of suitable studies to the needs of the pupils and the community in accordance with local School Board policies, state statutes and State Board regulations.

To be responsible for the dismissal of a teacher or other employee of

the district in accordance with state statutes.

To be responsible for the dismissal of certified staff to the board, recognizing its authority to dismiss according to the statutes.

To provide for temporary vacancies and have the authority to secure supplies immediately needed for the operation of the school.

To maintain records and make reports as required by the State Board of

Education and the local School Board.

To admit pupils to school in accordance with the laws of the state and the regulations of the State Board and policies of the local board. The Superintendent shall assign them to such classes and grades as he/she finds their needs warrant.

To provide for the alleviation of hazardous conditions of an emergency nature that effect the health and welfare of pupils.

To be responsible for the evaluation of personnel and programs in

accordance with local School Board policies.

To be responsible for the implementation of polices and regulations of the State Board of Education: also to participate in the development and evaluation of said policies and regulations as requested by the Commissioner of Education.

To assist in the recruitment, selection, assignment and evaluation of the school instructional staff.

To obtain and study comparative prices and quotations.

To purchase by competitive bidding, informational quotations, and negotiation, items of school supply and school equipment necessary for the operation of the school districts.

To interpret the financial position of the school district to the

community at large.

To assume responsibility for the receipt and expenditure of school district funds.

To provide monthly accounting of all income and expenditures.

To prepare and analyze all financial statements.

To prepare reports to the proper staff officials concerning the status of their budgetary accounts and to guard against the overspending of any budgeted account.

To maintain general, revenue and appropriations ledgers on an encumbrance (how much has been spent to date) basis.

To approve all vouchers encompassed within this area of operation.

To recommend new accounting methods as desirable and necessary.

To supervise the supporting services, specifically plant operation.

To inspect all school buildings, grounds and installations on a regular basis to determine that high standards of workmanship, cleanliness, safety and security are maintained.

To keep informed of the latest trends, developments, and products in the areas of maintenance, repair and upkeep, and encourage innovation and experimentation as appropriate.

To work with individual Principals in establishing emergency evacuation procedures for each classroom and office.

To participate in the process of collective bargaining for each school of the district.

To supervise in the development of educational specifications for remodeling projects or new construction, along with those schools who face possible increasing enrollments.

#### BURNING REGULATIONS

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not completely covered with snow.

Permits will not be issued for the kindling of open fires between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining and the Forest Fire Warden is notified and grants permission to burn in the rain.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day the burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly-constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from the Candia Forest Fire Warden or a Deputy Forest Fire Warden and you may reach them at the phone numbers listed below. Permits may be obtained between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day the burning is to be done.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.00.

#### NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every dog owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall, annually, before April 30, register it with the Town Clerk. No dogs may be licensed without proof of rabies inoculation (which includes rabies tag number and date of expiration).

The licensed dog must wear a collar and a tag around its neck with its registration number thereon.
